14th Annual Flag Day Saturday Feature Military, Patriotism

Sponsored jointly by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Post Office, the event is generally being planned by Mrs. Marene Johnson, former post master and active local patriotic leader. Approximately 55 military

personnel from Camp Wolters are expected, and the 328 U. S. Army Band will lead a downtown parade, set to begin at 8:15 from the Post Office, to make the square and return to the post office lawn for the 8:30 Flag Day Ceremony.

Capt. Lee Overstreet, just returned from Viet Nam, is coordinator for the program. The Fort Wolters troops are under the command of Gen. Robert N. McKinnon.

The band will be under the direction of C.W.3 Herbert J. Bilhartz.

Eastland women are being asked to bring boxes of sandwiches and cookies to be shared with the visiting Army personnel on the lawn in a rest break after the ceremony. Coffee and soft drinks will be furnished by the local planners. Purpose of the snack break is to give local residents to a chance to visit with the servicemen before they have to return to Camp.

Also attending will be eight Allied students from Camp Wolters, and Lt. Col. and Mrs. Lewis J. Co. Rochat Jr., II, assistant battalion commander. It will be Col. Rochat's fifth visit to Eastland's Flag Day Ceremony. He will be remembered by many Eastland county landowners as the liaison man who arranged for permission to use pastureland around here for helicopter landstrips.

Camp Wolters presently has some 500 Vietnamese students in helicopter training in preparation for the withdrawal of American troops in Vietnam.

CofC President Ben McKinnis, CofC Vice President Jeff Glazner and Mayor Pro Tem James Reid will extend official welcomes. Jay Staggs will be master of ceremonies. The band will provide music and the Pledge of Allegiance will be led by Scout master Dick Johnson of Troop 163. The Rev. Eugene Williams will give the invocation and the Rev. Bill Goff, the benediction.

All citizens are urged to participate in the event.

Sgt. 4 Roy G. Burns, 22-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Burns of Carbon, has been awarded the Bronze Star for heroism and the Air Medal for meritorious achievement while on duty in Vietnam.

The medals were accompanied by citations and sent to his father. The bronze star citation stated that he along with six other squad members, without regard of their personal safety, held enemy fire and laid down such a heavy volume of fire, on a much larger enemy force, that the enemy was forced to retreat. Their squad leader had lunged behind a fallen tree and after their action was able to rejoin the group. The citation continued, saying, "Specialist

Here's Our Power Source In Year ?? If All Goes Well

Moderns take a lot for granted. Okay what about nuclear power? Isn't that the new thing? Yes, and no.

The electrical power being generated by nuclear energy on a commercial basis now has a time limitation.

Nuclear fission (the energy source of the atomic bomb)

is used in all of today's atomic power plants. In nuclear fission, the nuclei of heavy atoms such as uranium are split and energy is thereby released. And therein lies the next hurdle—the fissionable fuel (uranium, etc.) will be exhausted in another century.

What then? In both fusion and fission, mass is converted into energy in accordance with Einstein's law; E=mc².

The fusion process requires temperatures many times hotter than the surface of the sun. In the fusion reaction, energy is produced by bringing together the atoms of light elements at tremendous collision velocities and fusing (or locking together) their nuclei. Scientist around the world engaged in nuclear fusion research are attempting to solve the problems of producing such tremendous temperatures and of containing the ultra-hot gases—known as plasma—long enough for fusion reactions to occur.

Practical control of the fusion reaction has not yet been achieved, but progress is being made—right here in Texas, at University of Texas laboratories.

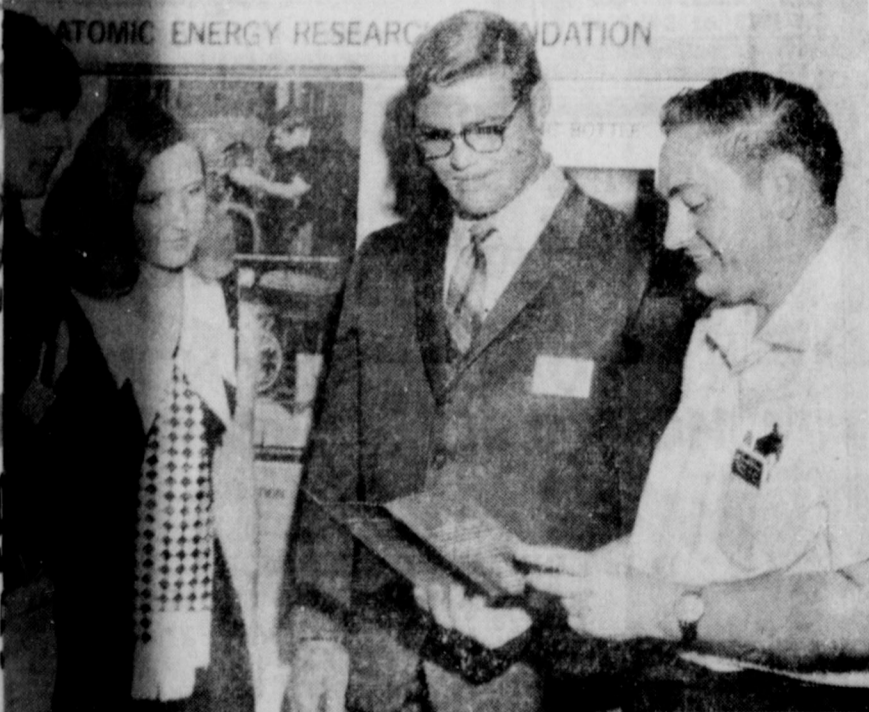

Eastland Co. Project Among Highway Awards

AUSTIN — Contracts for highway construction in the Brownwood district have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer E. M. Pritchard, and will be in Eastland, Lampasas, San Saba, Coleman and Brown counties.

In Eastland County, Big State Construction Company of Arlington, Inc. was awarded a contract for signing on 6.1 miles of Interstate Highway 20. Low bid was \$39,817.61.

The project is located from 0.8 mile west of Ranger east to 1.5 miles east of Ranger. R. P. Hawn Jr. of Eastland is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 60 working days.

Acme Bridge Company, Inc. of Austin was awarded a contract for a bridge and approaches on 0.6 mile of Farm to Market Road 590 in Lampasas and San Saba counties. Low bid was \$650,214.72.

Glen Trotter of Comanche is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the work at the east approach of the Colorado River Bridge. The project will take an estimated 220 working days to complete.

J. P. Brocksch Construction Co. of Brownwood was awarded a contract for grading structures, base and surfacing on 5.0 miles of FM 1176 in Coleman County. Low bid was \$199,402.47.

The project extends from the junction of FM 2902 south to the junction of FM 588. T. P. M-Williams of Coleman is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 180 working days.

Census Figures May Be Down But Social Security Increases

Although Eastland county is shown with a decline in total population over the past ten years, the number of those receiving monthly social security checks almost doubled during that time, according to figures released by R. R. Tuley Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

This social security increase however, is comparable to increases in most of the counties of the so-called Big Country area.

The Eastland county figures reveal that there were 5,006 county residents receiving retirement checks from the social security fund, an increase of 2,288 since 1959 when there were 2,716 persons on the rolls.

Total amount of social security payments on December 31, 1969, was \$382,000 as compared with \$143,247 on the same date in 1959.

The dollar amounts increased even more as a result of raises in the rate of retirement pay in 1965 and 1968. The recent 15% raise in January 1970 is not reflected in the total.

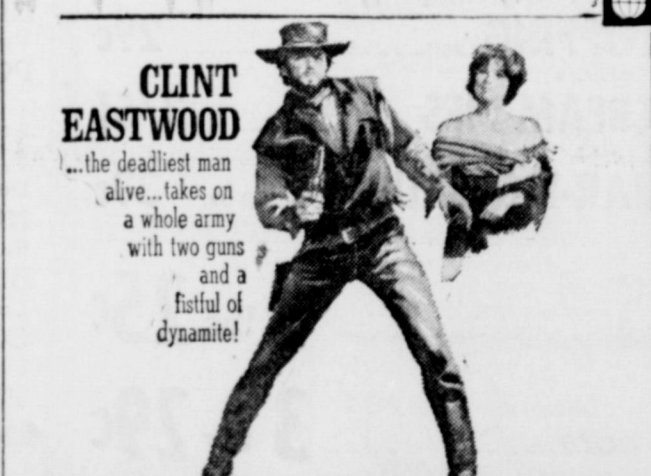

Boating Is Fun, But Observance of Safety Rules Is Called For

Boating is a traditional pastime for Eastland citizens and warm weather gives them a special advantage of excellent lakes to be enjoyed for skiing, swimming, fishing and boating. To make the whole season for a needless loss, Game Warden Payne, in a recent patrol, gave several suggestions for a safer boating vacation that abides by all the laws.

"To be safe, all motorboats must have a Coast Guard approved life saving device aboard for each person. This does not include Ski Belts," advised Payne. "Coast Guard approved life saving devices will have an approval number on them."

"Motorboats 14 feet in length and propelled by a 10 horsepower motor or less are exempt from numbering," he continued. "But any motorboat longer than 14 feet or propelled by a motor larger than 10 horsepower must be numbered. To number a boat, applications are available from local game warden or register in Abilene Parks and Wild Life Department." Payne also pointed out that when a boat is in operation the certificate of numbering must be aboard and available for inspection.

that progress is definitely being made by the experts hard at work in the modern UoT labs. With some 30 Ph.D. physicists on hand, and a gigantic center now under construction, the brains hope to be demonstrating that their theories are correct—by this time next year. The next group that goes down will see the most advanced experiments. It won't be commercially-produced electricity from nuclear fusion, but it'll undoubtedly be a big step in that direction. The scientists expect a long development time, and the initial steps will probably be a conversion of nuclear power to steam generating, but eventually hopes are that nuclear energy will be converted to electrical energy with 100 efficiency.

Today, the Russians are ahead in the development, but they haven't solved some big containment problems.

The top national laboratory (Princeton) is now off working on a tangent, and the University of Texas scientists believe they have a beautiful opportunity to prove their theories in actual experiment. Time will tell.

Some 550 outstanding science students and teachers from high schools throughout the state attended the Symposium.

The annual event is co-sponsored by the university and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. The foundation, made up of ten investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas, is supporting research as a future source of electric energy.

Students are selected by their schools to attend the four-day symposium for their scholarship and interest in science. They represent high schools from the areas served by the ten power companies.

The program includes talks by a number of engineers and scientists from both industry and education, speaking on the latest achievements in nuclear science in their particular fields. Two afternoons were spent touring the science and engineering laboratories of the university, including

those projects being sponsored by the foundation where scientists are working to harness the vast energy release in the fusion reaction.

Dr. C. A. Preskitt of Gulf General Atomic Corp. in San Diego, Calif., spoke on basic nuclear physics Wednesday morning.

Also on Wednesday, Dr. W. E. Drummond, director of the center of plasma physics and thermonuclear research at the university, discussed nuclear fusion and the new "Texas Tokamak," an experimental machine under construction in the university's laboratory. This machine is an advanced version of one built by the Russians which made a significant breakthrough in the fusion reaction.

A research associate from the National Science Foundation, Dr. Raymond J. Seeger of Washington, D. C., spoke Thursday morning, and Friday morning's program included Dr. Theos J. Thompson a member of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, of Washington, D. C.
