## Cotton Harvest Gains Momentum

### Around Muleshoe

Muleshoe City employees were feted with a Christmas dinner at noon on Thursday.

Mayor Ken Henry gave a brief resume of the activities and things accomplished during the year. City Manager Dave Marr also presented brief remarks. Both expressed their appreciation to all the city employees.

In the story about dissolving the hospital committee, a sentence should have read: "With the vague dream becoming the reality of a new hospital the Citizen's Action Committee will NOW turn over some \$17,000 - \$19,000 to the hospital still in the operating fund."

The Muleshoe Hospital and Nursing Home Auxiliary accidentally deleted the name of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Williams from the Christmas Card list in the Thursday Journal.

They also added the names of Mary Finley, Rosie McKillip, Erney Little and Kathy and Rachelle Hardage.

All the people wished to extend holiday greetings to their friends.

Rev. Herman J. Schalter announced that on December 24 at 6 p.m., a worship program with the children will be held. The Christmas day worship service will be held at 10:30 a.m.

The Muleshoe Fine Arts Booster Club presented Journal employees an 'appreciation' gift last week. The employees enjoyed a coconut frosted angel food cake.

First Assembly of God Church will again open its doors to the general public at 8 p.m. on Friday, December 29, for another community gospel concert featuring the King's Kids singers.

The local group of gospel singers are well known in this area. Singers are Wayland and Janet Ethridge, Wanda Kemp and Keith Taylor. Musicians are W.T., Pat and Clifford Watson, Steven Ethridge and James Meason.

Pastor Joe Stone said the church would like to issue a special invitation to anyone interested in gospel singing. No admission will be charged and no offering will be taken, he said.

### Tax Rebate Check Reflects Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that Texas cities will end 1978 receiving more than \$424.8 million as their share during the last 12 months of the local option one percent sales tax.

Bullock said that is 17.5 percent more than Texas cities received in 1977. The totals were included in Bullock's announcement of the December allocation of city sales tax. The state will rebate \$74.9 million to some 900 Texas cities as their share of this month's allocations.

The December total will boost the yearly total about \$63.2 million ahead of payments made during 1977.

Muleshoe's share was \$22,413.01, up 14 percent from the \$18,838.35 they received at the same time last year. Muleshoe showed the largest increase in the area. This brings the year's total to \$140,566.62, compared to \$122,747.59 at the same time last year.

Morton had a nine percent increase, with their payment being \$8,968.88, compared to their 1977 figure of \$5,718.31.

Littlefield also had a nine percent increase, receiving \$34,606.25, compared to \$27,943.10 at the same time last year.

In Friona, the increase was only five percent with their payment being \$9,910.63, compared to the 1977 figure of \$7,742.99.

Farwell showed a one percent decrease, receiving \$17,154.24 so far this year, compared to \$17,481.71 at the same time last year.

Houston's check this reporting period will total \$15.5 million, raising its total for the year to \$88.8 million, up 22 percent over 1977.

The city of Dallas will receive \$8.9 million, bringing its total for the year to \$49.8 million, up 12 percent over the 1977 total.

San Antonio will get a check for \$4.2 million, making its year to date total \$24.4 million -- an increase of 11 percent over 1977.

Fort Worth's check for the month totals \$3.07 million, raising its total for 1978 to \$17.5 million, a 16 percent increase over last year.

Austin will get \$2.5 million, for a total of \$14.2

million for the year -- an increase of 17 percent over 1977.

### Open Murder Charge Filed On Area Man

Dumas Joe 'Boots' Inman, 63, remained in the Curry County jail in Clovis late this week after he was arraigned before police magistrate Ralph Duty in Clovis.

The magistrate ordered Inman held without bond after he allegedly shot his estranged wife, Elizabeth Ann Inman, inflicting fatal wounds.

Inman had an apartment in Muleshoe and also was reported to have owned a mobile home in Muleshoe. He also showed residences at Portales and Lingo, N.M.

According to Det. Dave Ash of the Clovis City Police Department, Inman went to his wife's residence in Clovis, and intercepted a man coming out the door late Monday afternoon. The man said Inman, carrying a handgun, ordered him back into the residence. The man told officers he eluded Inman, who then went into the residence and dragged his wife outside, according to police.

After shooting the woman twice, the police said Inman drove away in a car. He was later seen in Muleshoe and finally apprehended on Kakawate Road near Highway 70 in New Mexico.

Officers recovered the gun Inman was said to have used in the shooting after Inman told them where to find the gun near Muleshoe.

Funeral services were conducted for Mrs. Inman in Clovis on Thursday. Officers also said Mrs. Inman was a registered nurse who formerly worked in Muleshoe and Portales. However, Jo Blackwell, assistant administrator at West Plains Medical Center, said Thursday that Mrs. Inman had never been employed at the local hospital.

### 1978-'79 Basketball Off To Flying Start

Mule Mania is alive and well, but some people don't know it. If you were not at the Muleshoe Junior High School gymnasium Thursday night, you couldn't realize what fantastic fast action you missed in three basketball games.

Winding up the evening were the Muleshoe Mules, nine strong, who held a leading command over the Lockney Longhorns.

Getting off to a fast start, the Muleshoe Mules racked up an 18-6 score by the end of the first quarter, before being held to only two points in the second and the halftime score finally widened out to 31-14 in the last three minutes of play before halftime.

Coming back in the second half, the Mules had widened the lead to 47-24 at the end of the third and then widened even more to the final 67-30 score.

Coach Mike Mayberry's Mules again had some impressive records as Charles Briscoe hit on 28 points; Terry Shafer, 16; Jeep Shanks, 11; Dickie Sudduth, six; Dennis Patterson, four and Donnie Long, two.

In the varsity girls' game, the Mulettes came from a halftime deficit of 15-17 to take a 27-20 lead by the end of the third quarter and on to the final 34-26 victory.

High scorer for the varsity girls was Shelly Dunham with 13 points.

JV girls were never in danger during their game that started the action off. They had a 18-10 halftime lead that widened to 42-24 at the end of the game.

Janie Richards had 14 points to lead the scoring, and Shelly Hawkins had 12 points.

With only two experienced players with the Mules' varsity basketball team, the team is inexperienced and presently in a rebuilding stage, according to head basketball coach Mike Mayberry. However, the coach, in his first year at Muleshoe High School, was fast to praise his young players.

"They play hard," said Coach Mayberry. "and shoe a great enthusiasm for the game. Their great strength in the game is their enthusiasm at this time."

Coach Mayberry said he is teaching the players the fundamentals and how to control the ball, and expects some good action from the players by the time they start district action on January 12.

Muleshoe's first district game will be in Muleshoe on January 12, and prior to that time, the Mules will have several weeks of practice games.

"While rebuilding the basketball program," commented the coach, "we will be taking some of the licks early. The team is improving weekly, and are looking better. I think basketball fans will be able

to see the Mules really compete against their opponents."

Talking about his team, Coach Mayberry said he is starting them out slow, because when they get on the basketball court, he wants the players to do everything right.

Several school records have already been broken by the inexperienced team, whose impressive and awesome records belie their 0-5 record to date.

With 52 defensive rebounds against Abernathy recently, and maintaining an average of 48 rebounds per game, the school records are topping.

### Yield Reports 'Up' From Early Guesses

Cold, windy weather failed to stop most cotton gins, as they took advantage of drier weather this week in a 'catch - up' attempt with the very late 1978 cotton harvest.

Gin fires since last weekend have kept firemen busy, with the first fire being reported at the Fairview Gin in eastern Bailey County. Most of the fire damage was to a burr pile, although some trailers were in slight danger of

burning. Tuesday afternoon, firemen were summoned to the Lariat Gin where a fire was reported in the high, dusty winds. Firemen from Muleshoe and Farwell fought a stubborn blaze which burned four to eight cotton trailers and left a heavy smoke trail across the highway for several hours. Firemen used a tractor and pulled trailers out of the heavy smoke while wearing their Scott Air Packs to be able to stand the smoke.

Late Tuesday night the fire continued to burn. It was still smoldering through Wednesday.

Wednesday morning, and again Wednesday afternoon, firemen were called to the Muleshoe Co-op Gin to battle a smoldering burr pile fire. Sporadic blazes continued to break from the burr piles which were far away from the gin and the loaded cotton trailers.

At least one gin, the Needmore Co-op Gin, was closed down during the time high wind was blowing Wednesday. Gin Manager Glen Kleasel said he didn't want to take such a chance with the wind and sand as high as it was blowing during a part of the day.

Almost all ginners reported they will be ginning cotton well into January as the harvest was held back until very late by adverse, wet weather.

Bennie Claunch at Claunch Gin in Bula said they are running day and night and have ginned 5,800 bales by Thursday morning. He said the yield will run slightly above early predictions, and estimates he will be ginning around 3,000 more bales.

"If the weather stays pretty, it won't take too much longer for us to get through," added Claunch.

Bob Newton at Farmers Co-op Gin at Enochs said they have ginned 6,500 bales and figures the yield is rather close to what had been predicted earlier in the fall.

He said the yield will still be far short of last year's bumper crops, however.

At Maple Co-op Gin, Jack Feagley said Thursday morning, they had ginned Cont. page 3, Col. 1

cont. 8,800 bales and figured the yield in that area was down slightly from early predictions.

Boll worm damage was heavier than anticipated in the Needmore area, and Glen Kleasel from the Needmore Co-op Gin said they had ginned 3,800 bales and expected a total of 5,500 to 6,000 bales by the end of the season.

Clay's Corner, Don McDonald said the Clay's Corner Gin got off to a late start and are trying to run around the clock. He said they have ginned some 2,600 bales and expect the final total to just about double the present figure.

In Muleshoe, 6,600 bales had been ginned at the Muleshoe Co-op Gin early Thursday afternoon, and 'quite a bit' of cotton was on the yard. They also expect to be ginning well into January to complete the season for this year.

National Weather Service has predicted a few more days of good weather before winter conditions invade this area again, and both producers and ginners are working long hours to try to complete the harvest.

yields above those expected were obtained, an increase in fertilizer application may be needed.

"Soil tests cost only a fraction of what is spent on fertilizer application. It is probably the best investment a producer will make." the county agent states. "Money spent on the wrong fertilizer could result in less net profit for 1979."

Anyone interested in soil tests can obtain information sheets to accompany soil samples, instructions for sampling and mailing cartons at any County Extension office, adds Tanksley.

been completely used or spoken for, if the bill is interpreted literally. Graf explained that if a water importation program is implemented then storage reservoirs would not have to be constructed in an area between the High Plains and the water supply point. Once the reservoirs had water, its movement to the High Plains would be impeded by the literal interpretation of the bill because one reservoir would have to be emptied completely before the next one could be utilized.

In the Supreme Court case, the justices ruled that a defendant would be held liable for subsidence in property caused by a negligent removal of groundwater according to Graf. He said he does not think that the ruling currently has any application in the High Plains area but could at some time in the future.

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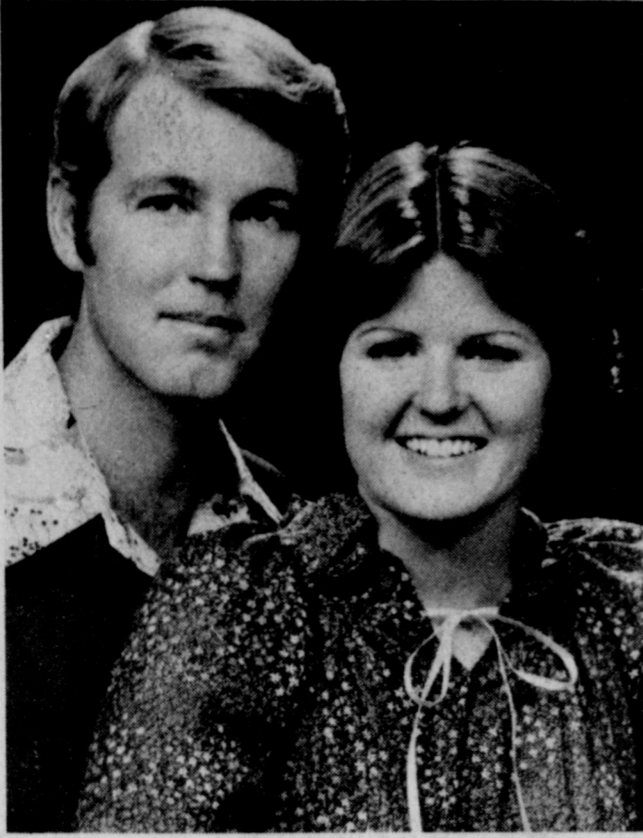

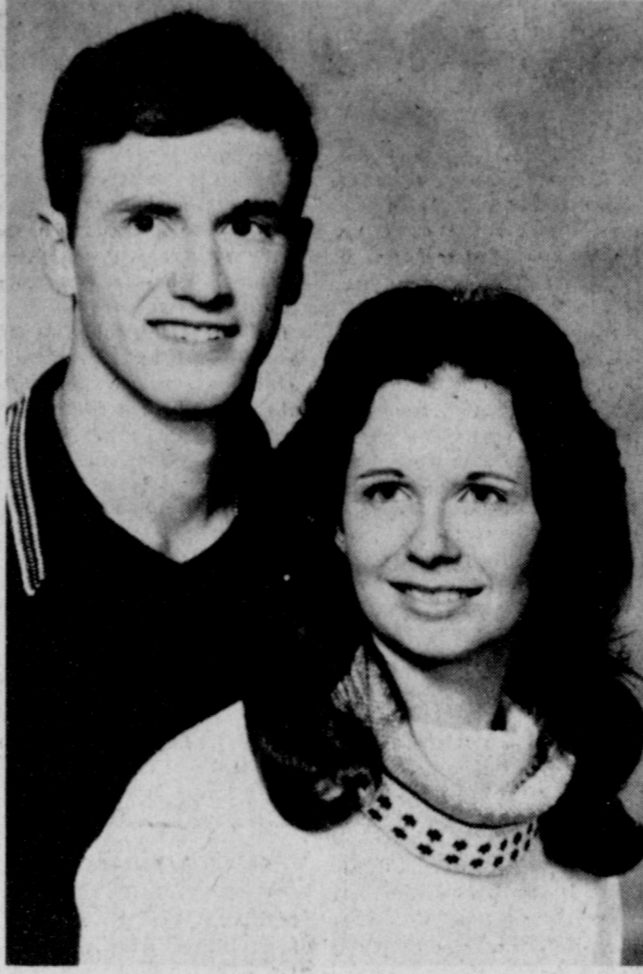
## Holiday Recipes

"Take five" is a musician's term for a quick break or rest period but "Take Three" is today's featured recipe and, appropriately enough, it uses only three ingredients. One package - the 4 serving size - instant pudding and pie filling. Choose from coconut cream, lemon, vanilla or French vanilla flavors. The second ingredient is one 20 oz. can of crushed pineapple in juice and the third is one cup prepared whipped topping. Combine pudding mix and fruit with juice in bowl. Blend in whipped topping, then spoon the mixture into individual dessert dishes. That is all there is to preparing dessert to serve 6. Very little cleanup for a very tasty dish.

There are a number of ways to vary this dessert. Instead of crushed pineapple, you may prefer to substitute a 17 oz. can of fruit cocktail, pitted dark sweet cherries or diced apricot halves. Combine the fruit of your choice with your favorite flavor of instant pudding, blend in the prepared topping and Take Three takes on a whole new look.

**PUDDING CLOUDS**  
Here again, three ingredients are all you need for a light, fluffy dessert that is an ideal choice for a heavy holiday meal. Combine 2 cups cold milk, 1 package, the 4 serving size, of any flavor instant pudding and pie filling and 1 envelope whipped topping mix in a deep narrow bottom bowl. Blend thoroughly at low speed of electric mixer then beat at high speed for 5 minutes. Spoon into individual dessert dishes or your prettiest serving bowl and chill. A happy serving suggestion might be to add a separate tray of garnishes like flaked coconut either plain or toasted, chocolate sprinkles, crushed peppermint candies, toasted slivered almonds or after dinner mints - and let each guest decorate his or her own dessert.

**HOLIDAY DESSERT SHELLS**  
Three is the magic number. One envelope of whipped topping mix is prepared according to package directions, adding one tablespoon sugar and 1/4 teaspoon almond extract just before whipping. The spoon in mounds onto wax paper covered baking sheet or tray. Make a depression in each mound with a spoon to form a nest or shell. Freeze until firm - at least 1 1/2 hours. Then fill with fruit, prepared pie filling or ice cream and serve. This recipe makes about 4 or 5 shells and the ways in which it may be varied are endless. For example, canned cherry pie filling, flavored with a dash of grated lemon rind, ground cloves or cinnamon, makes a colorful yet light holiday dessert. If you favor fresh fruit, try a mixture of sliced bananas, seeded grapes and diced melon. About 1/2 cup of fruit per shell is all you need for a refreshing light dessert.

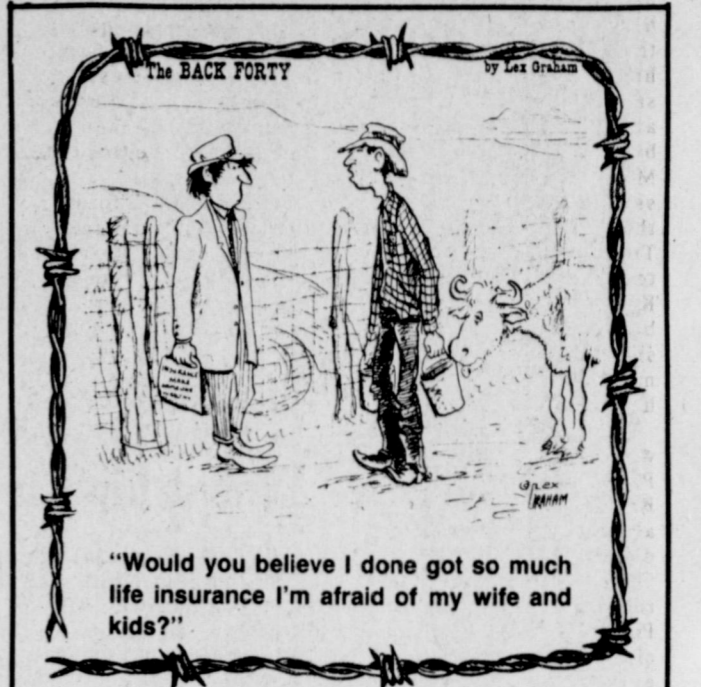

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# New King Heralded By Star In East

(Editor's note: This article is a hypothetical eyewitness account of the events leading to the birth of Christ as it might have been viewed by a contemporary news reporter.)

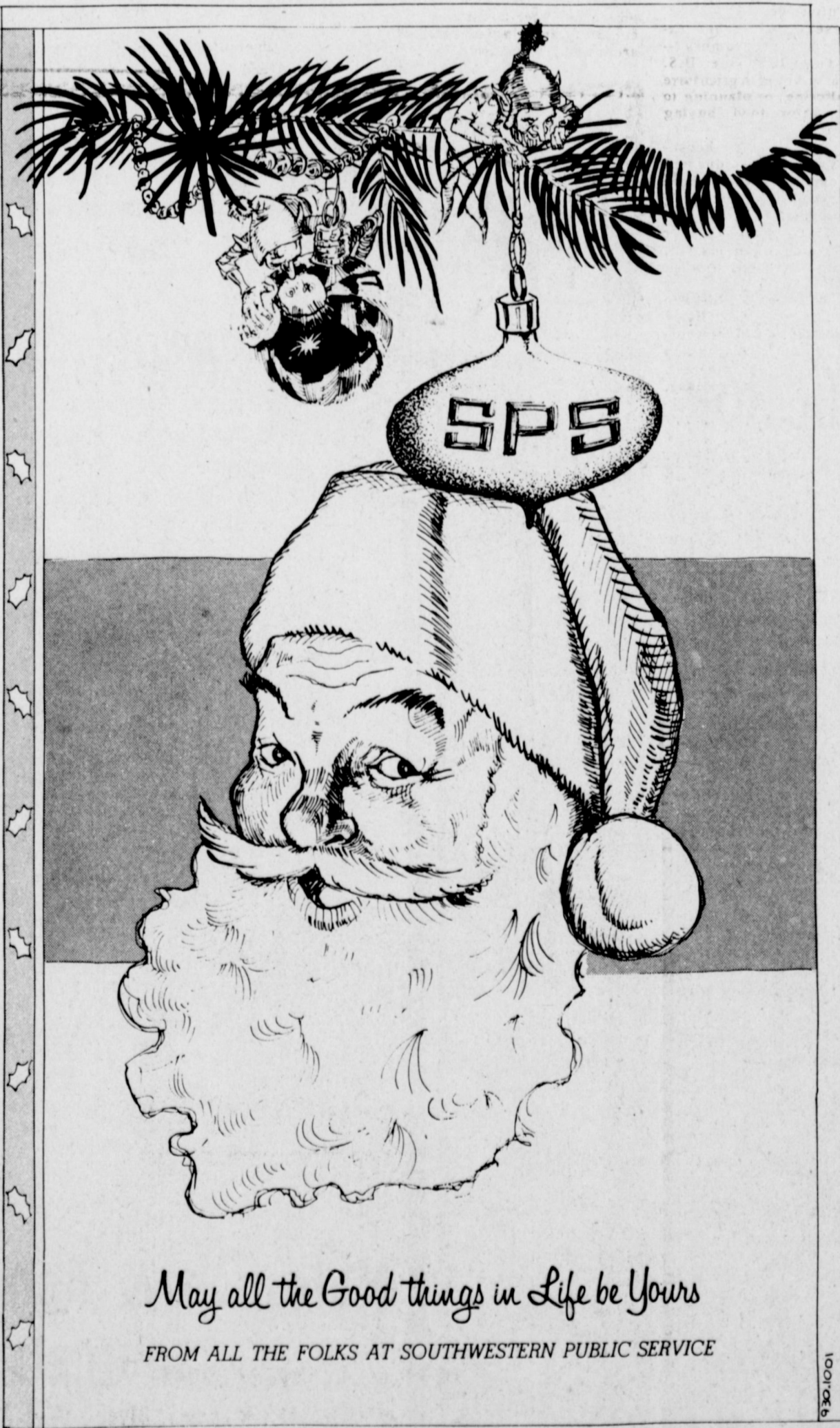

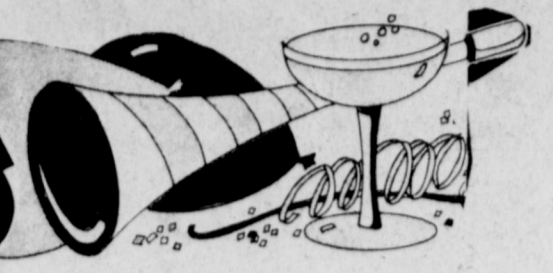

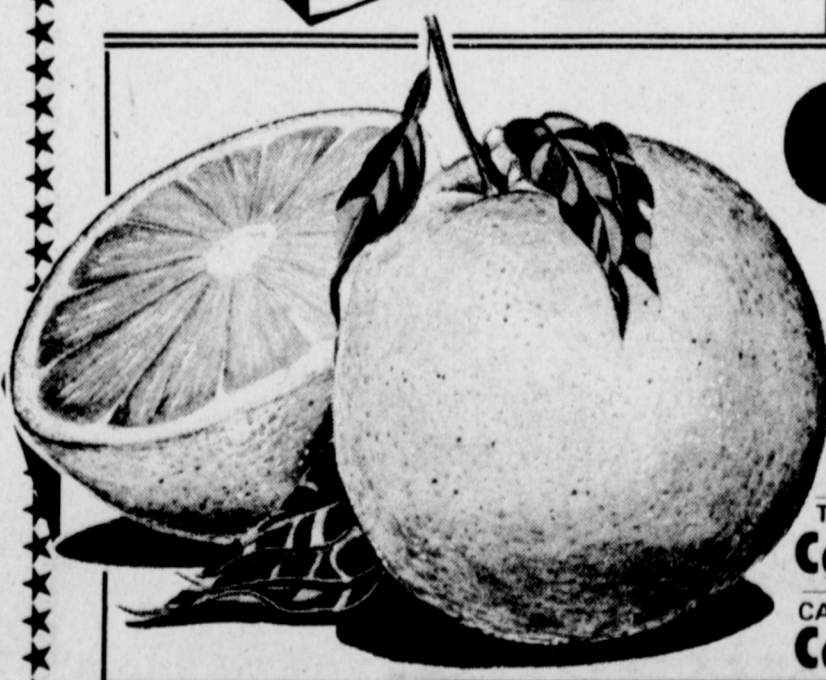
