There's nothing particularly difficult about tree planting. Just dig your hole deep enough and wide enough to give the roots plenty of space. As you cover up the tree roots, put some top soil in the bottom.

Young trees should be watered during the early years but not too much. Once every two or three weeks in dry weather will do the job.


