## Abolishment Of 4 Boxes Is Considered

Expected to be considered at the Monday Eastland County Commissioners Court meeting is the possible abolishment of some four voting precincts in Eastland County in compliance with recently revised voting legislation.

The new law is quite explicit on the requirements for a voting box. The pertinent paragraph from the Texas Election Code, states:

"No election precinct shall be formed out of two or more justice precincts or commissioners precincts, nor out of the parts of two or more justice precincts or commissioners precincts; and no election precinct shall be formed out of two or more congressional districts or state senatorial districts or state representative districts; nor out of the parts of two or more such districts. If in September of any year there exists any election precinct in the county which does not comply with the foregoing requirements, the commissioners court shall make the necessary changes before the first day of October, either at a regular meeting or at a special meeting called for the purpose; and the order shall be published as provided in Paragraph (a) of this section. Subject to the provisions of the first sentence of this paragraph, no election precinct shall have resident therein less than fifty (50) nor more than two thousand (2,000) voters as ascertained by the number of registered voters for the last preceding presidential general election year; provided, however, that in precincts in which voting machines have been adopted for use in accordance with Section 79 of this code, the maximum number of voters shall be three thousand."

There are no voting machines in Eastland Counties. Voting boxes to be considered include Scranton, Nimrod, Pioneer and Kokomo. There are presently 12 voting boxes in the county.

Re-locating of the voting precincts probably will be easily decided, County Judge Scott Bailey said, with the possible exception of Kokomo, where voters could easily go to one of two boxes.

The Pioneer and Nimrod boxes are presently in County Commissioners Precinct No. 3, and, therefore, would be transferred to the only other box in that precinct—Rising Star.

The Scranton box, in Precinct No. 4, would go to Cisco, Judge Bailey said, and the Kokomo box could go either to Gorman or Carbon. This will be decided Monday, based on a check of the most logical location for the most voters in the Kokomo box.

The re-locations would simplify one aspect of vote announcements—the voting boxes would all be located in towns which have high schools in the county.

## Voters Will Elect Commissioner

Eastland voters will go to the polls Tuesday to elect a city commissioner from a slate of four candidates to fill the vacancy left by the recent resignation of Bill B. Hart.

Polls open at 8 a. m. at City Hall, with E. E. Layton as the presiding judge and Hoover Pittman as alternate judge.

Candidates for the commission post are John Foster, Henry Parsons, Roy Lee Smith and W. Q. Verner.

Three persons had voted absentee through Friday morning, indicating a rather light turnout.

The Commission presently is made up of Mayor Frank Deaton, Curtis Koen, Jay Staggs and James Reid.

Attorney Bill Hart resigned, giving as his reason the press of business.

Smith is a native of Eastland and was educated in local schools. He is owner-operator of Smith Plumbing Co. and North Hillcrest Trailer Park. He is married to the former Wanda Richardson.

They have four children—Mildred, 16; Kay, 15; Mike, 9; and James, 3. The family attends Eastland Assembly of God Church. Smith is a director of the Rotary Club and a member of the Ten-Ten C. B. Club.

Foster has been band director for Eastland schools since 1963 when he moved here from the Wingate Independent School District near Winters. He has a BA and MA degrees from Abilene Christian College in Abilene. He is a past director of the Eastland Civic Theater and the Boy Scout Council; past vice-president and a 1967 Outstanding Young Man nominee of Jaycees; and he and his wife are active in the Church of Christ, where he is song leader and taught Sunday School classes.

The Fosters have one son, four-year old Danny.

A native of Eastland, Parsons is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Parsons. He graduated from Eastland High School in 1950, from Ranger Junior College in 1956, and attended Hardin-Simmons University.

He is married to the former Neta Fay Massingale and they have two sons, Michael, 13, and Mark, 11. The family attends First Baptist Church.

He is employed by the Lone Star Gas Company and served

as corrosion technician in Dallas for 14 years before moving back to Eastland. He is a member of the National Association of Corrosion Engineers. Parsons served with the First Calvary Division in Korea.

Verner is sales manager at Bruce Pipkin Motor Co. and has been a resident of Eastland for 30 years. His wife, Thelma, is employed by Victor Cornelius Printing Co. They are members of First Christian Church.

The hard work and effort of local and youngsters, walls and ceilings have been scraped clean and re-painted, making for an over-all generally spruced-up appearance.

Under the general supervision of Supt. Jimmy Hughes, the fix-up project has been accomplished through the County School Superintendent's Office and the Neighborhood Youth Corps.

Among the projects were the re-decorating of the home-making cottage, refinishing and painting in the gymnasium, and painting in the cafeteria. A new football dressing room has been constructed. The school building, ag shop and bus barn has been provided with additional storage space.

Classes will begin Monday at 8:45 a. m. with a six-period school day until Oct. 31.

Custodian I. D. Hogan has been instrumental in overseeing the program. He and Supt. Hughes were busy this week helping the ten youngsters in the program get things back in place in time for the school opening.

Tuesday also saw work being done on the system's water well pumping equipment. Participating in the program have been Betty McDaniel, Faye Regian, Debra Garrett, Lois Hastings, Marcia Webb, Rocky O'Neill, Jim Rice, Martha Swan, Herbert Casey and Jamie Stanley.

Another project included the development of a faculty work room, where cabinet work was built by the students, providing a modern efficient work area for the teachers.

The Carbon School was completely remodeled and expanded in 1942 and has seen periodic renovation since, but this summer's work is believed to have been the first of this magnitude in quite some time.

Hunters are being reminded of Daylight Savings Time as they make plans to take to the fields on Sept. 1, opening day of dove season, according to Game Warden Maurice Dry.

The law specifies "2 noon, Central Standard Time", but that means 1 p. m., Central Daylight Savings Time, so Warden Dry is warning hunters not to "jump the gun" by an hour and be in violation.

One p. m., Friday, Sept. 1, is the legal opening time, he says, closing Oct. 30, with sunset still the daily legal time.

## Mystery Of Three Tragedies

One of the tragedies of Gunsight Pass is detailed, but what were the other two?

That's the question being asked by Mrs. T. E. Castleberry, long-time Eastland County resident and historian.

Long interested in the history of the Gunsight area, Mrs. Castleberry and her late husband lived for many years north of Eastland on what is now Highway 6, west of Morton Valley. Her knowledge of the area is vast. She now lives at 418 S. Connellee St. in Eastland.

Her most recent find of interest is a clipping, found

among the effects of the late Eugene Witt of Eastland. From the Dallas Semi-Weekly Farm News, dated Feb. 28, 1878, the story is datelined Breckenridge, Tex., Feb. 18, 1878, and reads as follows:

"So another tragedy by the Dalton Brothers, and this the third to happen in the last three years!"

"The Stage Coach was held up and the driver, Floyd Hoofman was killed as he reached for his gun. His wife Rita, witnessed it all. She said they were very nice to her. One of the robbers forced her to ride behind him on a gray horse, to Mr. Shoogs house five miles away, left her there and went back."

"When the authorities got there, two of the horses had been shot and the other two were tangled up in the harness. The coach was empty of everything identifiable and the Dalton Brothers had disappeared in thin air."

"No trace of them yet, but we hope they will be captured. This happened between two mountains (Gunsight Mountains) now known as Gunsight Pass, in the South edge of Stephens County."

"About \$60,000 or \$70,000 was taken from the stage coach which was on its way to Wichita Falls."

"Everyone should be on their guard, for these notorious desperadoes. The next night the Wichita Falls bank was robbed of several thousand dollars."

The other two tragedies mentioned in the article?

Well, Mrs. Castleberry guesses that maybe one was the massacre at Gunsight Pass, generally considered to have been an act by Indians. The other?

Anyones guess.

## Peanut Growers To Convene In Stephenville September 1

D. B. Warren, President, Southwestern Peanut Growers Association has announced that the Annual Meeting of the big peanut growers organization will be held at Stephenville, on the campus of Tarleton State College beginning at 9:30 a. m. on Sept. 1. The meeting will be held in the Student Center. Warren explained that this year's meeting will again feature production research findings of scientists at Texas A&M University and Oklahoma State University as these findings relate to practical everyday application of the peanut grower on the farm. This, he said, has proved to be the most popular type program with peanut growers in previous years. For example, the topic of "Disease Prevention" will be discussed by Dr. Wendell Honne, Plant Pathologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, one of the noted authorities in this field. Peanut growers are known to have lost from 28 to 30 percent of their production in the field the past two years because of plant diseases. Therefore, this topic should be of prime interest to all peanut growers because to some degree all growers in peanut producing areas in the Southwest experience serious difficulties due to diseases. Another common problem, that of "Insects in Peanuts", will be explored by Mr. Philip J. Hamman, Assistant Entomologist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In the area of peanut quality the most critical period probably exists from the time that peanuts are dug until the time that they are actually processed by shellers. This phase of maintaining quality through the best known practices will be discussed by Mr. William S. Allen, Agricultural Engineer, Texas Agricultural Extension Service under the

## Levenworth Written-Writ Asks Removal of Writ

Hocking things in somebody else's name can prove to be well, sticky — particularly if one expects to ask favors later in one's own name.

This fact was indicated last week from a writ of habeas corpus document filed in Eastland County which names Sheriff L. E. Sublett as respondent.

The story goes back to last year when five expensive band instruments were stolen from the Cisco Junior College band. The sheriff's department in Eastland, through a great deal of detective work, found three of the instruments in Fort Worth pawn shops under the name of George H. Freed. A local grand jury indicted one George H. Freed for theft.

Shifting over to Alanta, Ga., the sheriff there picked up a man for car theft who listed his name as Freed. Acquainted with Sublett through previous police work together, the Atlanta sheriff called to ask if Eastland County wanted the man for anything.

"Yes, indeed," said Sublett. And a "detainer" was placed on the man for prosecution in Eastland County.

Through fingerprint identification, it developed that the man in question wasn't using his real name, so when he was found guilty of car theft in

Georgia, he was sentenced to four years in Levenworth Prison, Kansas. He went in under his real name — but the "Freed detainer" went right along with him.

But now, with the detainer hanging over his head, he doesn't get any "privileges" — thus the hand-written writ asking that the detainer be removed or that he be given a fair and speedy trial.

But the man named on the writ isn't charged with anything in Eastland County or doesn't have a detainer on him.

It's among quite a few interesting cases that were on Judge J. Frank Sparks' desk as he returned to 91st District Court Monday after a vacation.

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election, and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which have been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

irement of an after issued and pay interest thereon with any amount herein, in any resolution or ordinance authorizing the issuance of such additional bonds, there are sufficient moneys in the Fund to retire all of the bonds after issued and sold, time all such moneys remaining in the Veterans' Land Fund after becoming a part of said Fund shall be elsewhere provided.

"This Amendment intended only to basic framework of a comprehensive plan of the Veterans' Land Fund, there is hereby Legislative authority to amend and supplement the same, including the delegation of such duties, functions, and powers to the Veterans' Land Board as it may deem necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any law which shall have the effect of repealing or amending this Act, the same shall be null and void from the date of its passage.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its passage.

Sec. 2. The Constitutional Amendment submitted to a qualified elector at an election on November 11, 1968, election all ballots printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of purchasing lands in Texas to be sold to veterans who served in the United States Armed Services between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of purchasing lands in Texas to be sold to veterans who served in the United States Armed Services between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Government of Texas shall necessary proclamation election and this shall be published in the State Register and in the manner as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Rest Stop To Be 'Downtown' Labor Day

The rest stop has formerly been held on the outskirts of town, along U. S. 80, but club members agreed this week during the regular meeting Thursday night, which lasted until 1:30 p. m., that the visitors would be given a better look at Eastland if they were stopped "downtown" rather than on the edge of town.

The rest stop has been considered a great boon in helping saving lives over the Labor Day Weekend Holiday, which traditionally claims many lives in the state.

A chance to get out of a crowded auto, to walk around, to sip hot or cold refreshment gives the tourists a safety break, and also gives them the opportunity of seeing "our town" the Jaycees feel.

Permission has been granted by the city, and the club doesn't begin setting up its facilities during the four-day period until late in the afternoon, so no traffic problem is seen, it is said, by Club President Dale Bakker.

Special mementoes, including newspapers, and other items are traditionally given the visitors and a log kept of tourists.



The Texas Department of public Safety announced today that its Statistical Services has estimated that forty-five persons will lose their lives in traffic mishaps during the Labor Day holiday weekend.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, pointed out that this is the last holiday of the summer and thousands of motorists will be crisscrossing the state in their travels.

"This increased travel increases the chances of an individual being involved in an accident," Garrison said. "We urge every motorist to exercise caution and to stay alert."

"There is always the possibility that the estimate of forty-five deaths for this period can be proved to be too high, but only if all drivers put forth every effort toward avoiding traffic accidents."

"The Department of Public Safety will continue in its all-out effort to curb traffic accidents and to stop reckless and illegal driving on the highways," Garrison said. Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other DPS services will be on the road to supplement the highway patrol enforcement action.

During the holiday period, from 6 p. m. Friday, Sept. 1, through 11:59 p. m. Monday, Sept. 4, the DPS will tabulate each traffic death and the totals will be announced three times daily from DPS headquarters in Austin in order to call public attention to highway dangers.

A coordinated effort involving several state agencies and private organizations will be directed toward holding down the number of traffic accidents and fatalities. The Texas Safety Association will conduct a public information program stressing the need for courtesy and caution on the highway, and pointing out the responsibility of the individual driver in remaining alert.

TSA Vice-president W. F. (Bill) Leonard will coordinate the efforts of over 12,000 members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce over the state in operating some 200 "rest stops" for serving free coffee to fatigued drivers.

The Texas Highway Department will carry on a program utilizing radio and television materials and news releases instructing drivers in freeway driving and in the need for caution near highway construction areas. They have available a special mailing of maps showing the construction sites along Texas highways.

And the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and the Texas Motor Transportation Association will sponsor a fleet of 35 to 40 cars which will be used to assist stranded motorists over the state.

McCracken Will Head Drive For Rehab Center

James McCracken of Cisco has been appointed area chairman of the 1967 Cattleman's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

"We have the WTRC at our disposal only because we cattlemen care," Morris said, in emphasizing the need for an especially good Round-Up this year. "The cattlemen of West Texas haven't let us down yet, and we don't expect them to this year."

Any livestock donated to the Round-Up will be transported free of charge to the Abilene auction site, the chairman added. Anyone wishing to donate livestock to the sale should contact his area chairman or the WTRC in Abilene, Morris said.

FOR SEPTEMBER 1, 1967

Beginning September 1, 1967, Federal Reserve Banks will not accept customers' drafts or checks on which the printed name of the bank has been changed.

The avalanche of checks has caused automation of banking, and only those personalized checks which carry the customer's coded bank number printed on each check, can be used.

In order to serve your banking needs best, we're asking that after September 1, you do not accept any draft check or any check on which your customer has changed the bank's name. We solicit your help in encouraging your customers to use their own personalized checks for each transaction.

In the event that is necessary for you to accept such checks, we'll ask you to handle them separately from your regular deposit, because special handling will be required. Make a separate deposit slip for such checks.

WHAT IS A "CHANGED" CHECK? — One on which the printed name of a bank has been scratched out, and another bank's name written. High-speed, electronic scanning equipment, now in use cannot 'read' such changes.

# History Of Rotary Club To Be Distributed Mon.

The manuscript and photos were turned over to the publisher, The Longhorn Press of Eastland, last March. Mr. Bender, club historian, died April 29, 1967.

Working with the publisher, Mr. Bender's daughter, Mrs. Pat Miller, and Mrs. Bender expanded the format and design of the book in order to include all the material that Mr. Bender had compiled for this, the complete history.

Included in this ideal history of the club, is a section on the organization and early history with a list of the 30 club presidents. Mr. Bender overlooked few details in outlining his club history. Master of the dry wit, Mr. Bender's section of "Incidents" gives background on some of the many club stunts.

Among the in-depth biographies included are those of Tom W. Crutcher, Jack Williamson, Homer Brelford, John Lewis, Joseph Weaver, Gady Pipkin, Curtis Hertig, and Jim Horton.

The names section gives a complete tabulation of club members, their classifications, firms and dates they came into the club and went out.

## PARENTS WILL ACCOMPANY TEXAS TEENS TO THE COURTS

A little publicized provision of the States new traffic safety laws requires that one or both parents of juvenile traffic offenders appear in open court with the youthful

Patrolman Roger Sosebee reports. The law, now in effect, also states that juveniles can plead guilty only in open

court before the judge and that parents or guardians must be present before the teen is convicted or fined.

"In today's busy world it is difficult for many well-meaning parents to keep up with the actions of their teen age children. This provision of the new law should benefit conscientious parents and their youngsters, Sgt. Sosebee said when commenting

on this phase of the new traffic laws.

"Up until now," he says "teens could be arrested and fined without the parents knowledge. Teens could and did build terrible driving records. In many cases, the parents could have called a halt to the dangerous driving; if only they had known what was going on."

It has also been pointed out that the driving records of all members of a family household effect auto insurance rates under the Texas Driv-

ing Insurance Plan.

A bad driver, either young or old, male or female, can cause a family's insurance rates to climb. At least under this law, parents will have an opportunity to do something about their teen age children's driving habits.
