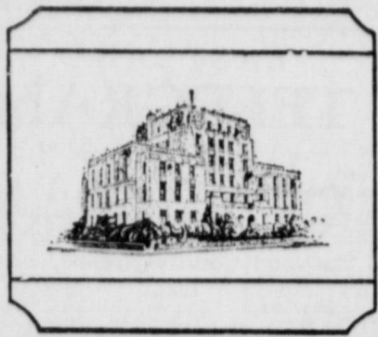

County's Annual Livestock Show Is Good Success; Record Entries

With a record number of entries, the annual Eastland County Livestock Show was concluded Saturday with the judging of fat lambs, steers and breeding cattle and the auction sale of champions Saturday night. The event was described as an outstanding success from all standpoints by show officials.

The event opened Friday with the judging of the dairy division and the swine division. The annual parade attracted a large crowd in Eastland Friday afternoon.

Frank Claborn, Eastland FFA youth, won grand championship honors in the dairy division, and Hardy Browder of Gorman showed the reserve champion. There were several grand champions in the various swine sections.

Record attendance is expected this week for the Eastland County Premiere Showing of the Billy Graham movie "For Pete's Sake!" Tuesday and Wednesday at the Majestic Theatre, it has been reported here.

Scheduled to open with Student Matinees at 12:45 p. m. each day, there will be evening showings beginning at 6:15 and 8:30 p. m. each day.

Admission is \$1 per person, and tickets bought in advance will be honored at either of the scheduled showings.

City Will Buy New Auto For Police Dept.

City Manager, Lewis Tiner, will ask permission to seek bids on a new city police car when the City Commission meets at the City Hall at 7 p. m. Monday. The city has been buying a new police car annually.

Also scheduled for the meeting is adoption of an up-dated agreement between the city and the State Highway Department concerning maintenance of Highway 80 and Highway 6 inside the Eastland city limits. Tiner stated there are no basic changes in the agreement that has been in effect in past years. The highway department maintains the highways and the contract specifies responsibility boundaries.

The city expects to hear after March 21, the exact date on which the city's new fire truck will be ready. Volunteer Fire Chief Wayne Jackson reports that Fire Marshall Guy Robinson will go to New York City to pick up the truck sometime after April 1.

Judge Rules Kirk Ineligible for Race

The 91st District Court handed down a ruling Thursday that Truman P. Kirk, instructor at Cisco Junior College, is not a legal resident of Eastland County and is not eligible to be a candidate for office in this county.

The ruling was made by Judge E. H. Griffin of Breckenridge, who was sitting on the 91st court bench in the illness of Judge Frank Sparks. Copies were handed to attorneys, the plaintiff and the defendant Thursday morning. Judge Griffin heard the case in the Eastland court on Friday, Mar. 8.

In his decision, Judge Griffin said: "It is my opinion that Mr. Kirk is not a resident of Eastland County in accordance with Section 7, Article 5, of the Texas Constitution, and I will sign the temporary injunction as prayed for by the plaintiff (Earl Conner, Jr.) and I hereby set the bond in the amount of \$5,000."

Mr. Conner, who was opposing Mr. Kirk for judge of the 91st court in the May 4th Democratic Primary, filed suit for the temporary injunction to keep Mr. Kirk's name off the ballot, questioning the legal residency of Mr. Kirk. Virgil Seaberry of Eastland served as attorney for Mr. Conner.

Judge Griffin's letter of decision was dated Wednesday, Mar. 13, and was addressed to all concerned in the case. Bryan Bradbury of Abilene represented Mr. Kirk.

The bond of \$5,000 was set, it was understood, to assure the payment of court costs in the event the suit goes to higher courts. It was understood that costs for the district court trial would be paid by the plaintiff.

The decision can be appealed by Mr. Kirk in a Court of Civil Appeals or to the State Supreme Court.

The Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee has scheduled a meeting for Monday, Mar. 18, to draw for places on the May 4th primary ballot, and absentee voting is scheduled to begin Apr. 15. With the injunction in hand, the county committee will be prevented from allowing the name of Mr. Kirk to appear on the ballot unless a higher court supercedes. It has been determined that if Mr. Kirk is denied a place on the ballot, his \$1,200 filing fee will be returned.

Mr. Kirk has been a teacher at Cisco Junior College since September, 1965, and has law offices in the K&K Building in downtown Cisco. His wife and children reside in a home they own in Abilene where he formerly practiced law. He has an apartment in Cisco.

Contacted by this newspaper, Mr. Kirk said that "I am, of course, greatly disappointed. I will have no comment until I have had time to study the decision and to discuss it with my attorney."

M. F. Williams, Here Since 1938, Buried Thursday

Melvin F. Williams, 67, died Tuesday night at Eastland Memorial Hospital after an illness of five years.

Funeral was held Thursday afternoon at the Gunsight Community Methodist Church, with the Rev. Len Layne, pastor of First Methodist Church of Eastland, officiating. Burial was in the Gunsight Cemetery under direction of Arrington Hamner Funeral Home.

Born May 12, 1900, in Stephens County, he moved from the Wayland Community in southwest Stephens County to Eastland in 1938.

Survivors include two brothers, Maco Williams and Luther Williams, both of Eastland.

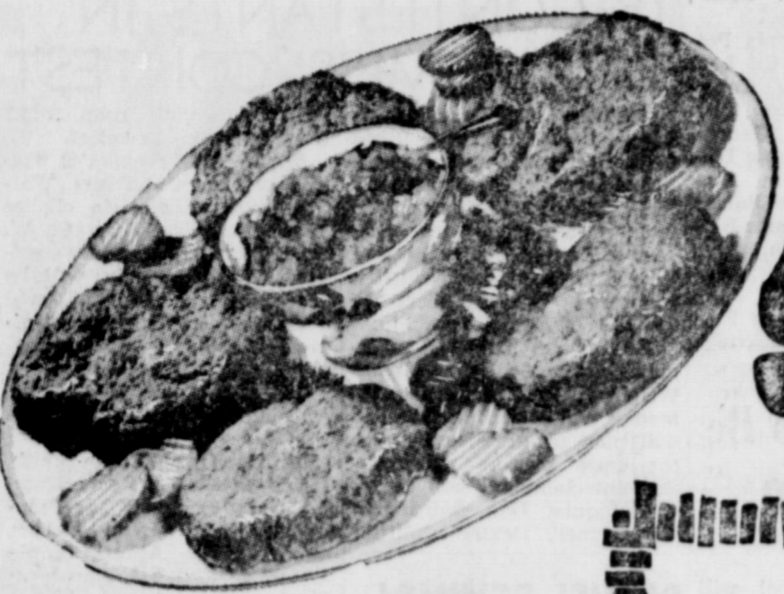

The play is in constant demand by high schools, colleges, and civic theater groups. It will be presented by Haskel High School the

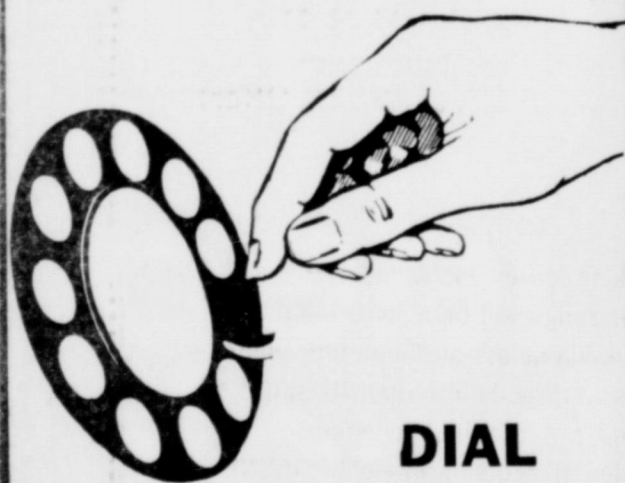

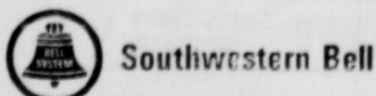

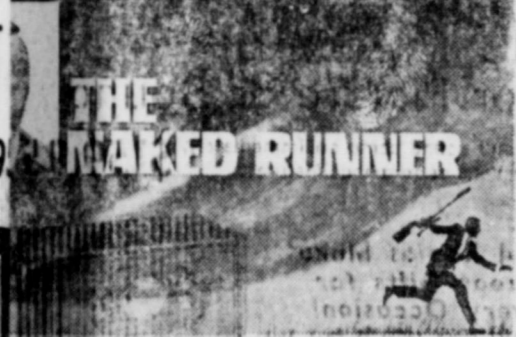

Large Number Received Easter Seal Society Help Last Year

Because of the steady growth in numbers of crippled children and adults in Texas, the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas has stepped up its rehabilitation services.

According to H. T. Wilson, who is the Easter Seal Representative for Eastland County, a total of 17,622 handicapped Texans received Easter Seal treatments during 1967.

Despite medical and scientific advances, Mr. Wilson explained, "the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accidents and medical treatment which saves victims of crippling diseases who might not have lived in past years."

State-wide Easter Seal services were provided for 17,622 Texans last year, he pointed out. Quoting the annual re-

port of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas he said that 21 affiliated treatment centers are in operation in Texas. They include treatment and rehabilitation centers, sheltered workshops, recreation and educational programs and many others.

"Through these programs persons with a wide variety of handicaps receive the help they need to lead normal lives," Mr. Wilson said.

The largest group served include those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis and stroke. The Easter Seal Campaign which provides funds for continuation for these services began March 1 and continues through April 14, Easter Sunday.

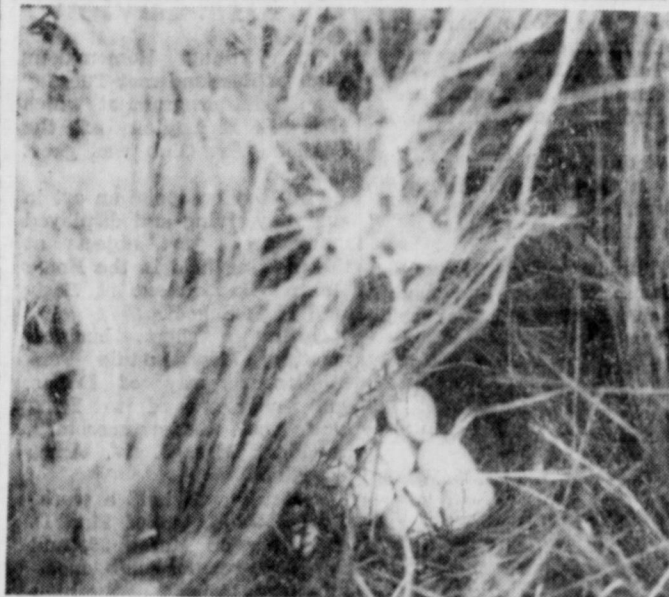

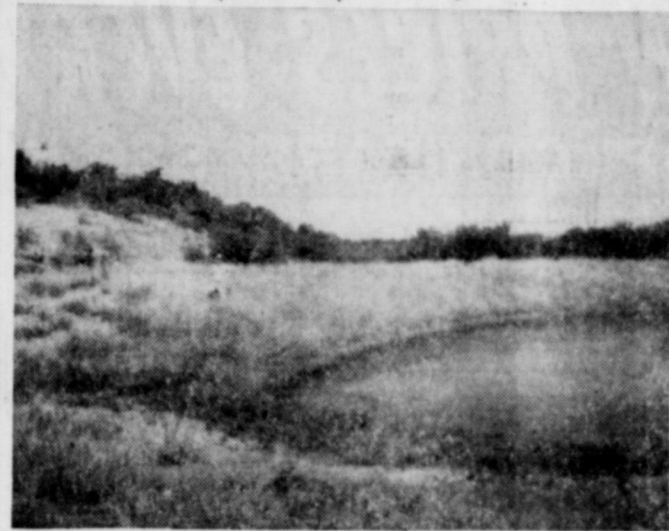

Wildlife WEEK Observance Is Planned In County March 17-23

The Soil and Water Conservation District is joining with the National Wildlife Federation and other conservation groups in sponsoring Wildlife Week 1968, Mar. 17-23. The theme, "Learn to Live With Nature," stresses the need for conservation education.

"People are sold on the idea of enjoying nature, but we must also sell them on the idea of learning to appreciate and care for all our natural resources," according to C. M. McCain, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Upper Leon Conservation district. "Conservation education," he said, "is an important part of any school program. It can also be a community project. People young and old should learn that they can help solve conservation problems such as erosion, water and air pollution, litter, endangered wildlife and waste."

Television and motion picture star Dick Van Dyke is national honorary chairman for Wildlife Week. In announcing the observance, Van Dyke said that the amount of resources we have is limited, and every day more demands are placed upon them - that is why we must learn to live with nature - not in spite of it.

"One of the most important Wildlife Week themes we've ever had is this one of conservation education," Van Dyke said. "Everyone should learn

to care for our natural resources. If we do not appreciate the value of clean water, fresh air, and a beautiful countryside, these things may disappear."
