Referee D. L. Kinnaird Jr. will officiate.

Present officers are Dale Bakker, president; Bond, first vice-president; Freeman, second vice-president; Reese, treasurer; and Phillips, secretary.

The Outstanding Young Man of Eastland will also be presented at the banquet.

Directors to Get Survey Report

Members of the Jaycee board of directors will meet Thursday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce to receive a survey report on the community.

The meeting has been called for 12 noon.

Workers were tabulating furiously Tuesday and were expecting to be finished by Wednesday in order to have a report ready for the directors. The item-by-item tabulation of the results is a tedious, time-consuming job, but it's already showing a lot about the town, officials report.

A three-man team working Monday afternoon were processing about 25 questionnaires an hour, and workers Tuesday were accomplishing about the same speed. In all, approximately 300 questionnaires came in from adults and there are some 220 from high school students. The results from the adults and young people are being kept separate in order to compare the evaluations.

Approximately 1,200 questionnaires were sent out, so the returns on a direct-mail program of this type is considered very good, officials report. Almost every possible facet of the city's life is being examined and recorded.

Preliminary totals indicate some obvious general thoughts: that the hospital is held in high regard; that the city's streets need much work after a long, freezing winter; and that there needs to be more opportunity for young people. Many, many other problems and suggestions will come from the survey, it is already seen.

The chamber board will consider whether to enter into an extensive program of trying to solve the problem areas and undertake the task implementing the ideas which are believed to be necessary to make this an even better place to live, work and play.

Sparks Resigns Post As 91st Court Judge

Judge Frank Sparks, who is resigning as presiding judge of the 91st District Court, gave his reasons, "To rest, travel and do the things I haven't had time for before."

In a letter to Gov. Connally, Judge Sparks expressed appreciation for the 1965 appointment by the governor to the bench upon the death of Judge Turner Collie. Judge Sparks was elected to fill the unexpired term of Judge Collie in the '66 general election. The resignation is to become effective at noon on May 6.

Indications Tuesday were that the Eastland County Bar Association would seek an early appointment by the governor, and most likely choice would be Eastland attorney Earl Conner Jr., unopposed candidate and sure to be the Democratic nominee for the 91st Court bench in the May 4 Primary Election.

In the event no appointment is made by the governor, a judge would serve as needed in the Eastland County, by appointment by Administrative Judge J. E. Holland of Montague County. Judge E. H. Griffin of Graham has been presiding in the local court recently when it is necessary for Judge Sparks to be absent.

Having practiced law in Eastland County for 50 years, Judge Sparks says that he is just going to "take it easy" for a while and visit with brothers and sisters, and "do what I want to do."

Judge Griffin was to hear some tax suits Wednesday and it's possible he will be here Monday for some jury cases.

Most agree that it would be to Eastland County's advantage to have a regular judge appointed so that when the legislature meets next January, or in special session, possibly in June, the court would be less likely to be abandoned, or consolidated.

With Gov. Connally's own political future unknown, it is impossible to guess locally what his opinion of the 91st District Court and its future might be.

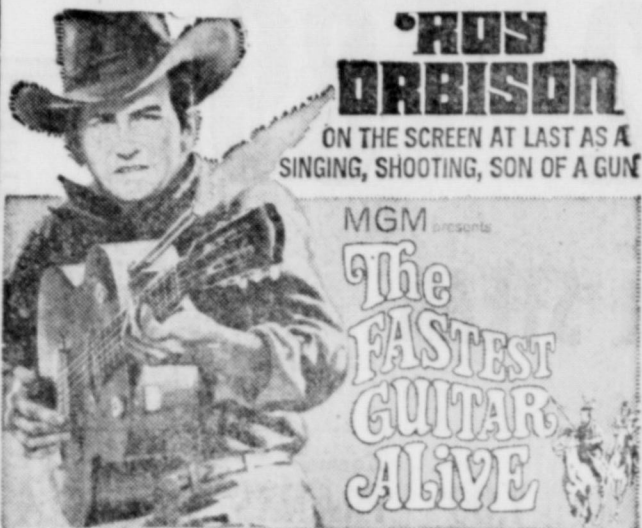

AUSTIN — Sen. Ralph Yarborough has taken himself out of contention with Gov. John Connally for Texas Democratic favorite son designation. But he has drawn battle lines for party conventions.

Liberals, if they follow Yarborough's lead, will oppose the favorite son device, demand selection of an uninstructed state delegation to the Demo national convention and oppose the traditional "unit rule."

Conservative-moderate forces, rallying behind the governor, will offer resolutions backing Connally for favorite son and head of the 104-vote Texas national convention. In all probability, they too, would require all of the state's 104 votes to be cast as a package, without consideration to preference of a minority viewpoint among the delegates.

That, in a nutshell, is the main issue to be decided in some 5,260 Democratic voting precincts May 4. In selected

precincts, supporters of Sens. Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene McCarthy are expected to push resolutions seeking to commit delegates to their presidential candidacies. Neither of the senators at this point appear to have any substantial support over the state.

Some of the nation's Democratic governors at a St. Louis, Mo., conference last week gave Connally a boost by urging him to become a serious contender — a sort of favorite son among the governors — for vice-president. Connally said he has no aspirations for the job, and does not expect it to be offered. Nevertheless, he is expected to play a major role in charting the course of the 24 Democratic state chief executives at the nominating convention.

Meanwhile, although they are traveling widely and speaking frequently, the 13 candidates for governor of Texas continued to find themselves overshadowed by world, national and partisan events. And the election is only a little more than a week away!

Herring told all kinds of jokes — racial, religious and political — in good taste, proving that humor, properly handled, does not offend.

The combined club event was an outward expression of the Rotary's first object: "The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service."

Total voter registration this year is a record 4,072,397 — nearly a million more than the last presidential year (1964) but still shy of predictions.

Figure compares with 3,014,597 in 1964 and 2,970,966 in 1966.

Five biggest counties of the state alone account for nearly 1,633,000 of the total eligible

voters, and if all major metropolitan areas are counted, city voters overwhelm the rural area residents. That statistical fact figures strongly in campaign plans of gubernatorial candidates who are busily scouting the big cities during the windup weeks of their vote drives.

Last county to report to Secretary of State Roy R. Barera on registration was Harris (Houston) with 583,721 voters. Dallas County has 466,925 Bexar (San Antonio) 237,359, Tarrant (Fort Worth) 242,693, and Travis (Austin) 102,264.

Texas draft quota for May is 2,131, compared with 2,378 for April, reports Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

However, local draft boards actually will forward more men to the armed forces examining and entrance stations for pre-induction physical and mental exams. May call in this category is 9,000 compared with 8,500 for April and 7,200 in March.

Schwartz also announced that the state must provide 42 medical doctors and two doctors of osteopathy for the Army during July-September.

Thackerson Will Attend Meeting On Cable TV

DALLAS — Roy Thackerson, Ranger Southern Television Systems Corporation, will attend the 1968 Convention of the Texas CATV Association (Cable Antenna Television) in Dallas April 25-27. More than 250 cable system owners and operators from Texas and surrounding states are expected to register for the three-day meeting.

The program of the Association's Eighth Annual Convention will range from a seminar on new sales techniques to discussions on members' responsibility in political affairs.

In addition, new CATV products and equipment will be introduced, the training of cable system technicians will be discussed and considerable time will be allotted to the programming and techniques of "local origination."

"Local origination" programming differs from regular cable viewing in that it is introduced directly into the cable system rather than being received from a transmitting TV broadcast station. For example, "local origination" makes possible such additional cable services as weather information, "spot" news bulletins, coverage of local events including elections and high school athletics, etc.

At the Convention, cable system operators will have the opportunity to learn more about "local origination" from equipment manufacturers as well as from other operators who have successfully utilized this method of programming in their system.

Cable television has grown nationally from only 70 systems serving a total of 14,000 subscribers in 1952, to an industry today with over 2,000 cable systems with more than 2,500,000 subscribers. In Texas alone, there are more than 150 operating cable systems.

Conditions Good For Controlling Mesquite Trees

COLLEGE STATION — The best conditions in 20 years now exist for controlling mesquite, reports a range, brush and weed control specialist at Texas A&M University.

G. O. Hoffman, Extension specialist, said that mesquite started budding about April 8 around Abilene, northwest to the Caprock and into the Spur, Wichita Falls and up to the Childress area; and also in the Ozona-Fort Stockton area.

"It takes the mesquite tree from 30-50 days under normal growth conditions to mature before it is susceptible to foliar application of 2, 4, 5-T applied by airplane," Hoffman said.

Aerial spray work should begin 40-90 days after green growth at the buds is noticed. Generally, beyond 90 days after leafing begins, spraying should not be done. Spraying should be done after the leaf color has changed from light green to dark green.

When the leaf color is beginning to change is the optimum time for spraying for best control of mesquite using 2, 4, 5-T," the range specialist said.

If there is an effective rain during the spray season, postpone spraying for a week to ten days or until new growth at the tips turns a dark green color. Aerial spraying should not be stopped if there is only a light shower, Hoffman said.

When the leaves are light green color, they are developing and using food reserve stored in the root system. After the leaves are fully developed and turn a dark green color, the food flow is reversed from the top back to the root system," Hoffman said.

At this stage," the specialist said, application of 2, 4, 5-T should be made so the material will be translocated down to the root system to control the trees."

Hoffman pointed out that the main objective of controlling mesquite is to be able to grow more grass rather than have dead trees. Unless more grass is grown, it is not economical to control mesquite, he said.

The year 1968 is a special year for Mrs. Baird's Bread in Eastland and other West Texas communities. The company is observing its 60th anniversary across the state and the Abilene bakery is observing its 20th year of baking products for Eastland area residents.

The business, which was founded as a home-kitchen bakery in 1908, has grown to become the largest independent bread making business in America.

The story of Mrs. Baird's Bread is a story of Texas Opportunity and the story of four generations of one family. It began in 1908 in the home of Mrs. Ninnie L. Baird, a gentle lady who had earned a reputation in her neighborhood for baking good bread. In those days, Mrs. Baird did all the baking for her family and often gave extra loaves to neighbors as gifts. Many of them asked her to bake for them, too.

When her husband became too ill to work, Mrs. Baird decided to go into the baking business to support her family of eight. She bought an oven from a hotel, enlarged her kitchen, and made every day baking day. Each afternoon after school, the boys delivered the freshly baked loaves on their bicycles.

The fame of Mrs. Baird's Bread grew. Soon the delivery job was too much for the

boys. A horse and wagon were purchased. Then, a little wooden building was built in the back yard to house the baking plant and the first truck was purchased.

By 1919, the business had expanded so that it was moved into a small one-story brick building. Still the demand grew for Mrs. Baird's Bread and new bakeries were built in other Texas cities.

Visualizing the future growth of West Texas, the Baird family built the Abilene Bakery in 1948. There, as in other locations, bread is baked under the personal supervision of a member of the family. Allen Baird, who has lived in Abilene since 1948, is Vice President for all West Texas. He is assisted in Abilene by Don Heinze, General Manager.

Most folks in Eastland know Mrs. Baird's local Sales Supervisor, Gene Green, who has lived in Eastland since 1955. Doyle Maynard, salesman for the Eastland area, joined Mrs. Baird's in 1963, and has lived in Eastland three years. Gene and Doyle make sure that customers have plenty of Mrs. Baird's Bread "as fresh from the oven as possible."

Across the state, there are nine Mrs. Baird's Bakeries. W. Hoyt Baird, who drove that first sales wagon, is the Chairman of the Board. In addition to Mr. Hoyt Baird, there are eight grandsons and one great-grandson carrying on the tradition for the

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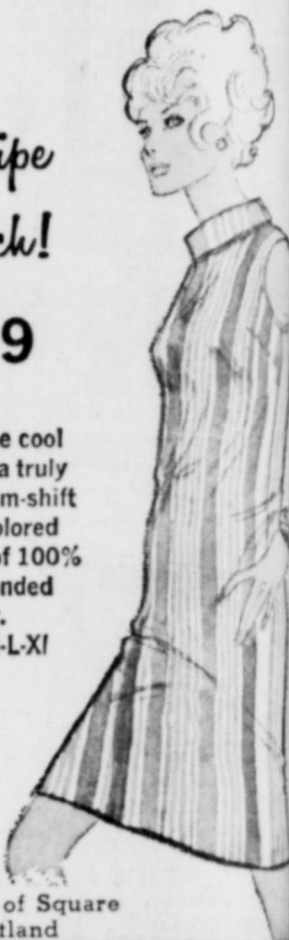

Post Office Has Booklet on Mail To Men Overseas

An illustrated pamphlet — Mail or Servicemen — outlining the expanded program for airlifting letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through local Post Office window clerks, the Postmaster announced.

The Postmaster said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad. We hope this guide will help more American families be familiar with these services and use them."

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford, the speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personnel messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Viet Nam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address military mail.

A family sending a 10-pound package to Viet Nam, for example, pays only \$2.75 on a package marked "PAL", while the air parcel rate for the same package is \$6.59, the Postmaster said.

On parcels weighing less than 5 pounds it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older (SAM) Space Available Mail service, which provides surface transportation to the port of embarkation and airlift overseas. A four-pound SAM package to a European military post cost only \$1.10. On packages weighing under two pounds air parcel post is often the patron's "best buy" for through airlift service, the pamphlet suggests.

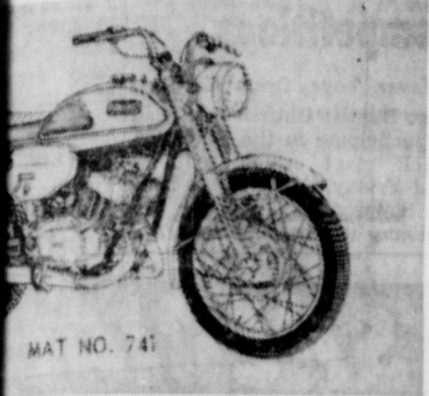

Improvement Programs Starts This Week At Boy Scout Camp

BROWNWOOD — After de-
lays caused by weather, con-
struction begins this week at
Camp Billy Gibbons, the
campsite of the Comanche
Trail Council, Boy Scouts of
America, Paul A. Cunyus,
Chairman of the council's
camp Development committee
has announced.

The long-awaited work is
the result of a long-range
study conducted by the council
in 1965, and is being paid
for by funds provided by a
challenge gift from the Ter-
rell Foundation and the mon-
ies contributed by citizens of
the eight-county area served
by the council, given to match
the funds from the foundation.

Highlights of the develop-
ment plan approved by the
Executive Board of the Co-
manche Trail Council last
June are: establishment of
four new troop camp sites
(Nos. 1, 5, 6, and staff")
the combination of two pre-
vious troop sites; complete re-
building of latrine facilities at
all existing campsites, and
new latrines at the new sites;
complete re-building of the
camp's water system includ-
ing the installation of new
tanks to triple above-ground
storage, extension of water
lines to all troop campsites to
provide drinking and washing
water at each site, pressuriz-
ing the water system for ad-
ditional fire protection, etc.

In addition, service trails"
are being built into the nor-
thern area of the camp for
the first time to provide ac-
cess to that area, and the
trail" past the dam toward
the Blue Hole is being im-
proved.

Additional work is being
done to solve problems relat-

ing to dining hall sanitation,
and a new parking area is be-
ing created.

Three years ago the Mills-
San Saba County unit of the
USDA Soil Conservation Ser-
vice prepared a "land use"
plan for Camp Billy Gibbons.
Among the recommendations
being carried out at this time
will be conservation earth
work needed to reduce ero-
sion below the dam on Brady
Creek. Further work will be
done in reseeding, creation of
nature trails, etc. as suggest-
ed by the S.C.S.

Future plans call for the
addition of a .22 cal shotgun
range, a storage area attach-
ed to the activities lodge dis-
posal of the staff" to add an
additional troop site and re-
moval of accumulated silt
from the swimming area just
above the dam. The archery
and rifle ranges will be im-
proved, new tables and seat-
ing will eventually be provid-
ed in the dining hall, Mr. Cun-
yus added.

the chemical will also damage
flowers and other ornamen-
tals. A wax bar containing 24-
D may be used to kill broad-
leaf weeds in the lawn. This
is much safer since there is
no danger of the chemical
drifting to the trees and orna-
mentals. The wax bar is sim-
ply dragged over the weeds.

Another method of killing
burclover, henbit and many
other weeds is the application
of ammonium nitrate fertiliz-
er. Dissolve one pound of
ammonium nitrate per gallon
of water. Allow the solution
to settle a few minutes and
strain it, if it is to be applied
with a sprayer. Apply the so-
lution broadcast with a
sprinkler can or sprayer at
the rate of four gallons per
1,000 square feet. The solu-
tion is very corrosive and
sprayers or sprinkler cans
used to apply it should be
rinsed thoroughly.

Dry ammonium nitrate may
also be used, although it is not
as effective because coverage
is not as good. The lawn
should be mowed three to
four days before treatment.
Wet the plants thoroughly
and apply 10 to 12 pounds of
ammonium nitrate per 1,000
square feet while the leaves
are wet. The fertilizer will
help the grass in your lawn at
the same time. For this rea-
son spot treatment should be
avoided since the nitrogen will
cause green spots that are dif-
ficult to eliminate.

It still takes work and time
to control weeds in the lawn.

THE GORDON SPOT

Weeds are already a prob-
lem around the home and
farm this spring. The good
supply of moisture in the soil
is causing more weeds and
causing the weeds to grow
faster than usual.

Even though we have chem-
icals to control most weeds
there is no easy way to control
weeds. There is no miracle

chemical that will kill all un-
desirable weeds and grasses
and leave the desirable plants.

A vigorous turf is the best
control for weeds in a lawn.
Weeds and weedy grasses
usually are not a problem
when a well-adapted lawn
grass is properly established,
fertilized, mowed and wa-
tered.

Chemicals should be ap-
plied when weeds are growing
rapidly and before seed are
formed. Chemicals to control
weeds such as burclover, hen-
bit, rescue grass and sandbur
should be applied when the
weedy plants are no taller
than three inches. If taller,
they should be mowed closely
and the chemical applied after
three to four days regrowth.
A weed killer containing
24-D is most commonly used
to kill broad leaf weeds. It is
very effective, but the user
must be very cautious since

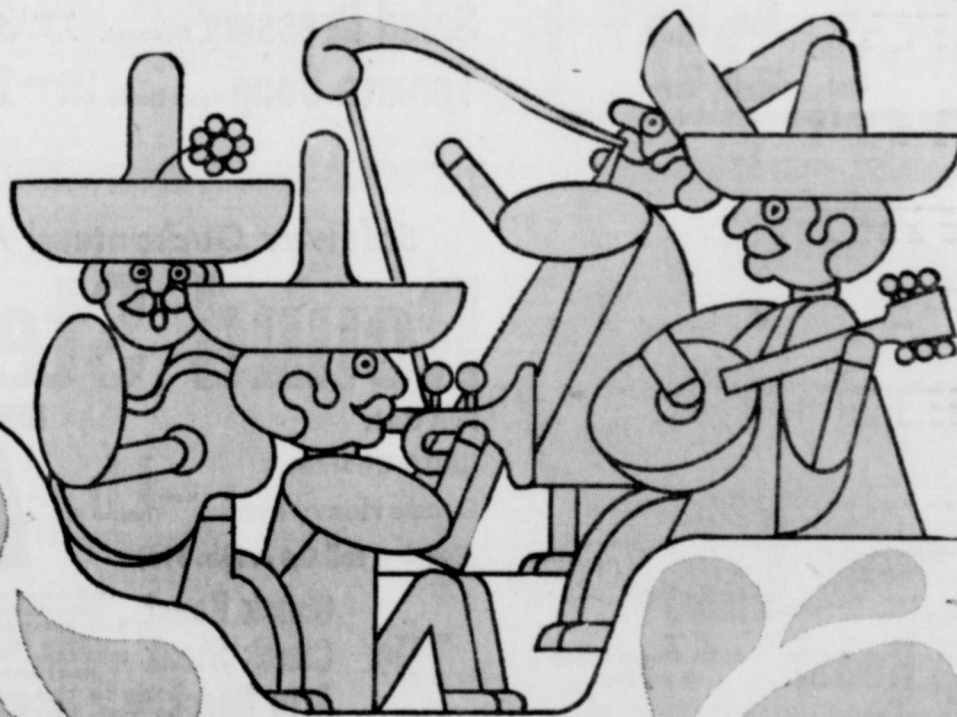

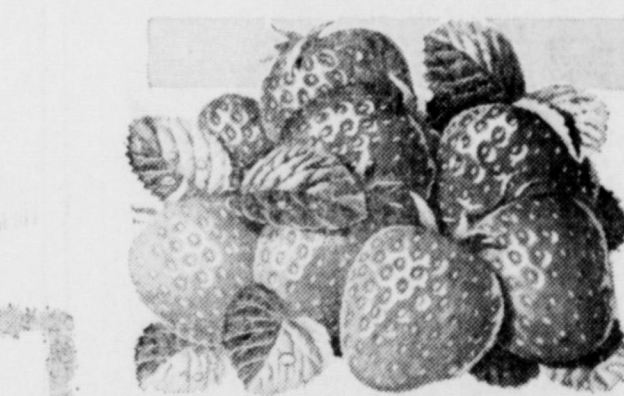
