



Time for the meeting will be 10 a.m. and all persons who signed the petitions and school officials from Olden and Eastland are invited to attend and participate in the date setting, he said.

Judge Bailey said he has found the petitions to be sufficient in number of names of qualified voters.


The following proceedings were had in the Court of Civil Appeals, Eleventh Supreme Judicial District of Texas:

APPEALS COURT

AFFIRMED






