The chamber has help aplenty, in a new program to help place local and area people in jobs this summer. All kinds of help. Firms and individuals are welcome to all the chamber office, telephone 629-2332 or inquire of Secretary Mrs. Emma Lou Benton about the applications.

Full and part-time help is handy as your phone, the chamber says. Regardless of your needs, these young people are standing ready to help. Just give 'em a ring.

Among the many categories listed are service station at-

tendants, housework, office work, store clerks, baby sitting (including light nursing aide help), yard work, to obtain help and manual labor.

The chamber is offering the service to the public at no charge and the rates are to be worked out between the employer and the young people. Some half dozen have already been placed in summer jobs, and the lists are out of those categories to work. Among the skills listed are truck driving, welding, butchering and any number of other talents.

The program is especially pleasing to businesses and individuals who may have inventory, fix-up or other temporary help needs for the summer. At the same time it affords the young people the opportunity of earning money and learning the ropes in the business and service world.

## Teachers, Students Will Attend U-T Symposium

### Under TESCO Sponsorship

The Symposium, held annually at the university, is sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the university. Texas Electric Service Company and nine other electric power companies in Texas make up the foundation.

Some 500 outstanding science students and their teachers will attend the meeting in Austin. They will have the opportunity to hear scientists from the fields of both industry and education discuss nuclear physics and related topics. Two afternoons will be spent touring the science laboratories of the university. Included will be visits to the experiments being carried on in thermonuclear (fusion) research by scientists at the university for the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

"Texas Electric Service Company is interested in this research as a future source of generation of electricity," F. N. Sayre, Company Manager, said.

"These experiments are aimed at eventual control of the nuclear reaction which takes place in the hydrogen bomb. When harnessed, the energy released in this nuclear reaction could be used for such peaceful purposes as power generation."

Representative Craig Hosmer of California, ranking minority member of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy of Congress, will speak at the Symposium.

Other noted speakers include Dr. Peter Murray, director for an atomic division of Westinghouse Electric Corporation; Dr. John R. Bradford, dean of engineering at Texas Tech; Dr. Peter Almond, physicist at M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston, Tumor Institute in Houston; and B. G. Harper, research specialist for Dow Chemical Company.

Several on the program are also speakers from the university, including Dr. Norman Hackerman, president; Dr. T. A. Griffy, Dr. A. E. Robson and Dr. Alfred Schild of the physics department; and Dr. W. R. Upthegrove, chairman of the mechanical engineering department.

Chairman of this year's symposium is Dr. Harold Hanson, chairman of the physics department at the university.

Established some 15 years ago, the White Elephant has for many years been a favorite stopping place for locals and travelers on Highway 80. Its reputation for good food and good service was well known for hundreds of miles in all directions.

Remodeling is complete, including the installation of new flooring, lowered ceilings, carpeting in the dining rooms, complete refurbishing of the kitchen and lounge areas, as well as complete new lighting inside and out, and painting of all wood surfaces. The famous White Elephant motif still greets visitors outside and in.

## JAYCEES INSTALL, DINE ON SUCKLING PIG HERE

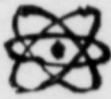
Approximately 50 Eastland Jaycees, wives and guests dined on roasted suckling pig at the Annual Jaycee Officer Installation Banquet Friday night.

## 2 Escapers Cleburne Jail Are Caught

James Vernon Judkins and his wife, two of the five persons who escaped from the Johnson County Jail in Cleburne about a week ago, were arrested early Thursday morning in Eastland and returned to Cleburne.

Eastland County Sheriff L. E. Sublett was contacted shortly before 4 a. m. by Texas Rangers and sheriffs from Johnson and Lampasas counties and asked to assist in the arrests. The law enforcement officers found the fugitives hiding in a room above a downtown beauty salon. Entry had been gained by forcing a back door.

The door had been wired up from the inside after being forced and the officers had to break in. The couple offered no resistance.

The five escaped after overpowering the jailer, who was tied and gagged and locked in a cell.

Henry Elias Birk, one of the five, surrendered in Cleburne Monday morning. Still at large were Everett E. Williams and William A. Ruskus. All were being held on forgery and passing charges except Williams, who was charged with misdemeanors for defrauding and passing.

## He's For Smith... CREIGHTON URGES LARGE VOTE JUNE 1

"It is the solemn obligation of every Texan to go to the polls on Saturday, June 1, and cast their vote in the second primary election," said Senator Tom Creighton of the 22nd Senatorial District, which includes Eastland County, in a visit here last Tuesday.

Senator Creighton was on a tour of his district in the interest of the campaign of Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith for Governor of Texas. Mr. Smith is in a runoff with Don Yarbrough of Houston on the basis of returns in the first primary.

Absentee voting began Wednesday, May 15, and will continue for five days — through May 28 — at the county clerk's office. Those who expect to be out of town on election day were urged to cast absentee

ballots. "I have served with Preston Smith as a Texas senator and for six years as our lieutenant governor," Mr. Creighton said, "and I know that he is highly qualified to serve the people of Texas as their governor. Moreover, he has earned this office through dedicated service."

Senator Creighton noted that a large turn-out of voters would be necessary for Mr. Smith to be assured of victory. He pointed out that Governor John Connally's margin over Yarbrough two years ago was only 26,000 votes due to a light second primary turnout.

Every county in the 22nd district except Tarrant gave Preston Smith a lead in the governor's race. He carried Eastland County. The vote for governor included these figures in this county: Smith 1572, Yarbrough 746, Carr 641, Briscoe 551, Hill 538, Locke 379 and O'Daniel 289.

The county, which has more than 8,000 qualified voters this year, had only 4,887 total votes cast in the first primary. With no election contest except the runoff for governor on the ballot, observers doubted that as many as 4,000 votes will be cast June 1.

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## EASTLAND'S AMBASSADORS DO GOOD JOB IN NORTHEAST

"There's only one way to travel, and that's in a fire truck," declares Mrs. Guy (Ola) Robinson.

She should know. She and her husband, who is Eastland's Fire Marshal, came from Elmira, New York, to Eastland in the city's new fire truck. The city commissioners reasoned that Robinson could drive the truck from the factory in order "to break the truck in" before it was needed. Expenses were paid with the amount which would have been used for shipping charges had the truck been delivered.

Leaving Eastland by bus on May 1, the couple arrived in Lebanon, Penn., May 3. They were guests in the home of the Rev. and Mrs. Otto Marshall, former Eastland residents. Pastor of the First Christian Church here from 1950 to 1954, Rev. Marshall now is pastor of the Calvary Hill Christian Church in Lebanon.

They toured the surrounding counties, visiting steel factories and sausage plants; studying the Amish and Hittite religious groups; and watching candy-making at Hershey, Pa. "The light fixtures at the candy plant are shaped like Hershey kisses," Mrs. Robinson remembers.

Guy and Ola especially enjoyed attending worship services with the Marshalls.

The four of them went by bus to New York City, where they stayed at the Gramercy Park Hotel, near the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. David Marshall. David, son of the Otto Marshalls, attended Eastland High School and is now part of a magazine editorial department. His wife is a secretary in the UN complex.

A Circle Line boat tour, visit to the Statue of Liberty, tours of Rockefeller Center, Radio City Music Hall, Chinatown, United Nations, NBC studios and walking tours of Fifth Avenue and Times Square filled two days.

"The view from the Empire State Building," was chosen by Ola as the most memorable NYC experience. (Guy,

dressed in his customary West Texas boots and hat, presented tickets to an attendant there. "Thanks, Sheriff," said the attendant.

May 10, the Robinsons left for Elmira, a nine-hour bus ride northeast of NYC. "That's when the real fun started," Ola says. "Never have we been the object of so much attention. Everyone noticed us and many, many drivers pulled over and stopped. Sometimes we were glad, too—not all states have nice wide highways like Texas has, you know."

"Nearly everyone commented on the truck and we never minded, because we knew it was their way of being friendly to us. Except once. This woman asked where Eastland was and we told her a town in West Texas. 'Just about like Texas,' the woman said, 'putting an east LAND in West Texas.' I didn't even answer her to tell her she wasn't pronouncing it right. But you know Guy and I didn't like criticism of Texas."

"Usually people just said, 'Aren't you afraid the fire will burn it all up before you get there?'; 'Is this for real?'; or 'Is this a gag?'"

Guy explains that traveling speed was about 50 to 55 miles per hour and the couple spent four nights -- in Shippensburg, Pa.; Bristol, Tenn.; Forest City, Tenn.; and McCloud, Okla.; -- before reaching Oklahoma City. There they were met by Mr. and Mrs. George Cline, representatives of the equipment company, who escorted them into town and had the truck washed. "You should have seen that beautiful red truck," Ola says, "after five days of travel. We were so glad to get it cleaned and shined up."

Two days were spent displaying the truck at the North Central Fire Chief Convention, which was attended by delegates from Texas, New Mexico, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Missouri.

"But the most wonderful moment of the whole wonderful trip was when we were met outside Eastland by our friends and neighbors who had made the trip possible for us," the Robinsons say.

"Next best was seeing the Marshalls," Ola believes. "They were dear friends of ours as well as being our pastor and his wife. Brother Marshall performed our daughter's wedding ceremony and of course he did so much for the hospital when it was being built. They still feel a part of Eastland."

Guy says, "The most beautiful drive was through the Shenandoah Valley." His wife adds, "Except for Texas, of course."

The Robinsons had knowledge of the trip for several weeks before they left -- "I'd been packed to leave since the middle of February," Ola insists. But belief in the trip is slower coming. "I still can't believe this happened to us," she says. "If you hear a thud noise in the south part of town, you will know Ola Robinson fell from cloud nine. If the people of Eastland could just realize how much bringing the truck home meant to us..."

The people of Eastland had good ambassadors this month: there is no substitute for obvious enthusiasm and joy in life, nor for sincere pride in one's town and friends. -- By MARIE BONEY.

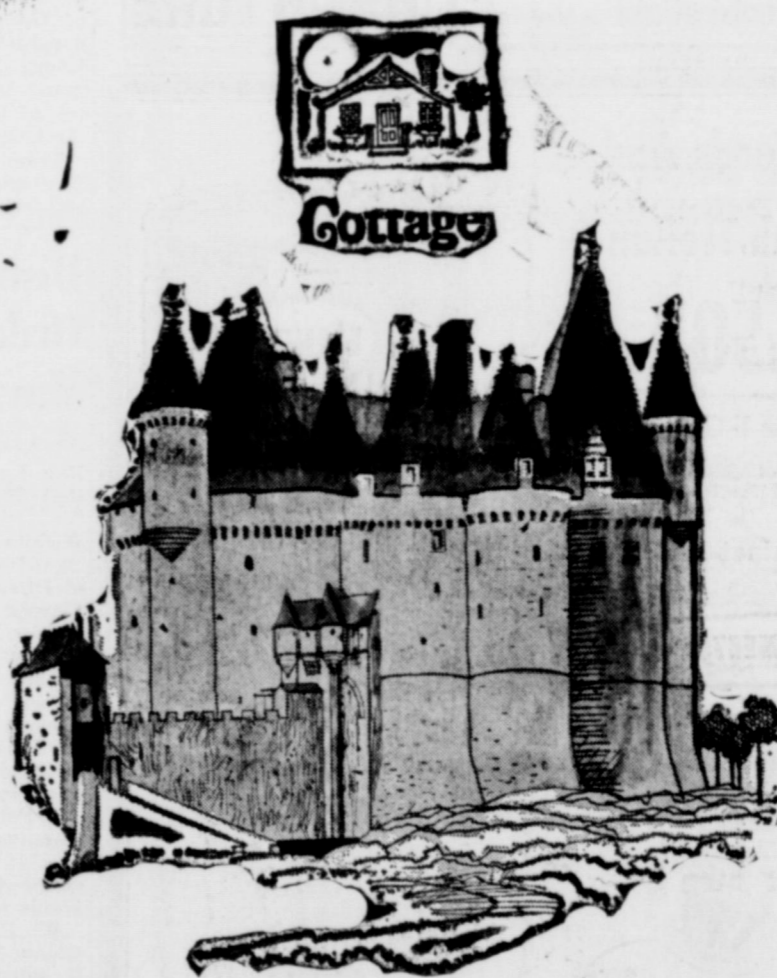

## WHY THE EVANGELICAL METHODIST CHURCHES?

"In 1729 two young men in England reading the Bible, saw that they could not be saved without holiness, followed after it, and incited others so to do. I felt I did trust in Christ alone for salvation; an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.'"

The above is taken from the discipline of the Evangelical Methodist Church, which serves as guide and history, church and government doctrine as well providing the historical setting for today's Church councils and applications leading to the life in Christ who alone has power to redeem.

Recently via a special radio panel discussion, Malcolm Boyd, an Episcopal priest stated that he thought the Church as a body of religion and Christian teaching should no longer exist as such. Two Bishops of the Australian Church have both stated like sentiments. For instance, a Rev. David Pope of St. Mathias' Church, Richmond, Australia made the following statement: "I don't believe in Divine intervention; man is the one who can make or break the earth and we've got to acknowledge our responsibility for this."

Another clergy said this: "I am an agnostic. That means I do not know whether God exists." Later in an interview Rev. Lane, commenting on his statement, said: "There is nothing odd or new in these views."

Why the Evangelical Methodist Church? Well, from the comment of these two clergy, we believe that something like terms are gnawing away at the structure we call Christianity, and we will refuse to sit idly by and watch the world burn without teaching and preaching the views and the beliefs of John Wesley. Further, the Bible was the main stay of Wesley's ministry. We count it ours today, as well. A divinely authored book to wisdom; a book that has been tampered with and ridiculed by the world, but still it stands.

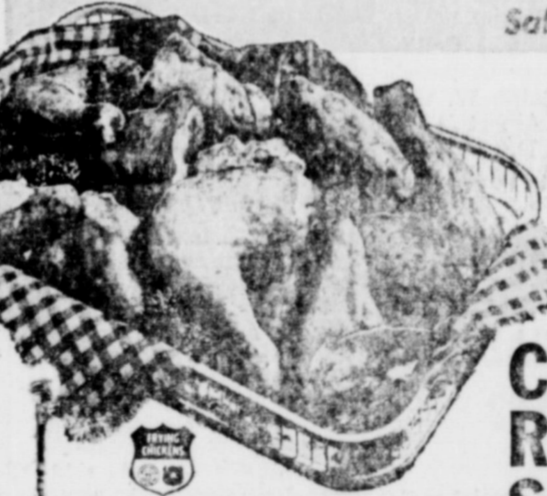

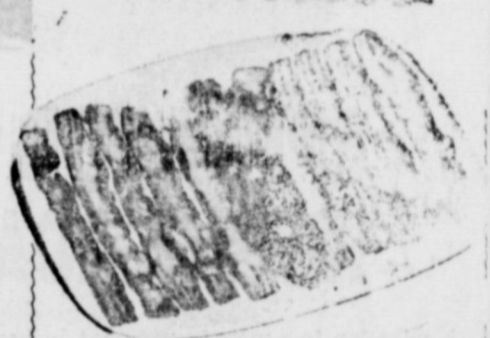

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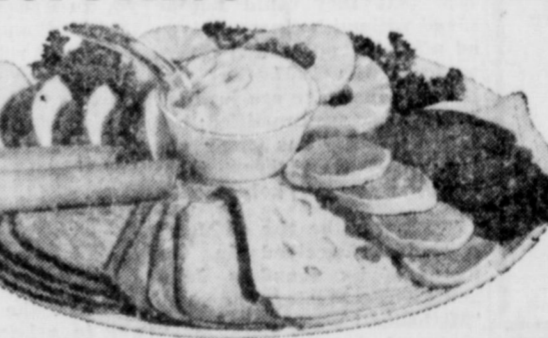
