Early Survey Reports Reflect 'Inner' Thoughts

An in-depth analysis of your community with no holds barred is being made, and the end result should be an even better Eastland in the future. Your friends and neighbors are making their feelings known on subjects from A to Z — and if you're not availing

yourself the opportunity to do likewise, perhaps your views will never be known.

That's the statement from Eastland Chamber of Commerce President J. T. Gregory as survey questionnaires come in. Deadline for returning the questionnaires was to have been Wednesday, April 17, but all that come in through Friday will be tabulated, he said. The special committee which launched the survey will meet Friday to study the returns.

A report will be made to the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors at the regular board meeting, Thursday, April 18, Gregory said. Through Tuesday morning, some 160 questionnaires had been returned, and information from these is being compiled. A separate, sample testing was given to Eastland High School students last Thursday, and the opinions of the young people will likewise be analyzed for possible future development of the city.

The compliments and grips from the questionnaires so far run the gamut: "Too much rutty water," "Need more opportunity for young people," "Too many stray dogs and cats," "Need better streets, and garbage collection," "Need a drag strip at the airport," "need to move the dump ground," "need more street lights," "need more eating establishments," "need more meeting places," etc.

So far, no category has been ignored. The people are saying what they think, and that was the intention behind the survey—to find out what the local people think needs to be done to make this an even better place to live. Sure there are some "far out" complaints, and some "weird" suggestions, but they will all be catalogued and taken under consideration. If for some reason you have not returned your questionnaire, be sure to do so this week. You may use the form sent you through the mail, or use the form from the newspaper.

THE COMMISSION STATEMENT

The City Commission has been requested to pass an ordinance prohibiting the sale of obscene literature in the City of Eastland. The Commission is in sympathy with those who desire to stop any such sales. However, it appears that the State of Texas already has statutes on the subject. The Commission is advised that where the State defines an offense and fixes a penalty or punishment for its violation, any municipal ordinance must conform to the state law as to punishment or penalty, and that the City here does not have authority by ordinance to match the penalties and punishment fixed by the State in such laws. It therefore appears that the proper remedy is to enforce the State laws instead of attempting to pass a void ordinance.

The Commission does request that local merchants examine such publications as they offer for sale and that they not offer for sale any such publications as might be obscene. Each merchant will doubtless appreciate being advised by individual citizens if such individuals note any publications which might be considered obscene in such merchant's place of business. The Commission feels that all reputable local merchants will be happy to comply both with the spirit and letter of the law and to cooperate in avoiding any distribution of obscene literature. If anyone in this city seeks to profit by distributing obscene literature, the Commission believes strongly that such a person should be prosecuted in accordance with law.



Importance of Auction Co. Spotlited at Rotary Meet

The 200,000 Eastland Livestock Auction Co. and its expanding importance to the city and this area were spotlighted at noon Tuesday when the Eastland Rotary Club met at the East Main St. facility for its luncheon and a special program on the company. Bernard Hanna was program chairman and outlined the extent of the operation, calling on co-owner and manager Lloyd Coan to answer questions and explain the auction company's procedures.

With sales every Tuesday, the Eastland company averages 1,000 head of cattle weekly, as well as some 250 hogs and 75 sheep and goats going through the ring. That amounts to from \$175,000 to \$200,000 in cash changing hands every week, it was pointed out. With sales every Tuesday, the appeal to buyer and seller is greater, with both coming from near and far to utilize the modern facilities for the exchange of cash and stock.

An extensive ten-year modernization is underway, Coan explained, with certain improvements being made constantly.

Rotary guests were J. T. Gregory, Wendell Siebert and Lewis Tiner. The privately-owned facility employs six people regularly and has about 40 on Tuesday sales-days, for an average weekly payroll of about \$1,500.00. Partner in the firm is Lloyd Hutchinson, a Stephenville cattle buyer.

And with a sale of this type, there are always plenty of buyers. Eastland Auction Co. has the reputation of having a lot of good cattle to be sold, and that's where the buyers gather.

Four cases of illegal sale of beer were filed Tuesday in the County Attorney's Office by Officer L. D. Adams of the Liquor Control Board reported Assistant County Attorney Emory Walton. Officer Adams also filed one case for the illegal sale of whiskey. The defendants have not yet entered a plea, Walton said. Highway patrolman H. D. Welch filed a charge of driving while license suspended against Lloyd J. Sitton of Dallas. The defendant entered a plea of guilty before Judge Scott Bailey who fined Mr. Sitton \$75 and 72 hours in jail, reported the Assistant County Attorney.

Statement Issued By City on Vile Material

Mayor Deaton Re-Elected, Chevy Bought for Police

The Eastland City Commission re-organized, bought a police car and issued a statement on the distribution of obscene material in Eastland, during a brief meeting at the City Hall Monday evening.

Mayor Frank Deaton was unanimously re-elected to chair the Commission. James Reid was re-elected chairman pro tem; Curtis Koen treasurer; and Jay Staggs, assistant treasurer.

All commissioners were present with the results of the April 2 election returns canvassed and approved. Two petitions bearing over 100 signatures of high school students and a letter affirming the Parent-Teacher Organization's support of the text of the petitions were presented to the commission. The wording of the petition follows: "We the young people of Eastland are seriously concerned with the vulgar and obscene literature so prominently displayed in many of our local stores. We feel this literature has contributed to an increase in juvenile delinquency and in sexual crimes. We appeal to the moral conscience of those persons who have the opportunity to rid our town of this type of objectionable literature."

The commission issued a statement relative to the material.

A bid by Fullen Motor Co. for a Chevrolet Biscayne to be used as a city patrol car, was accepted. The amount of the bid was \$1,478.14. Other bids included: Pipkin Motor Co., on an Ambassador, \$1,827.34; Muirhead Motor Co., Pontiac Catalina, \$2,200.

Eric, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie W. Baker of Fort Worth, drowned after falling into a creek on a family fishing outing four miles south of Nimrod on the property of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Moon, great-grandparents of the victim.

The Rev. Jesse Cassle, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiated at the funeral. Burial was in Nimrod Cemetery. The child, who was taken to Graham Hospital, was pronounced dead upon arrival. Charles Moad, investigating officer, said the child did not respond to artificial res-

piration efforts at the accident scene. Officer Moad said the boy fell into the creek after having a fish he caught removed from the line.

Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis ruled the death an accidental drowning. Eric was born in Cisco Aug. 25, 1966.

Back Home For
Easter Recess**

ABILENE, APR 12 - Congressman Omar Burleson returned to the District April 12 to spend the Easter recess of the Congress visiting about over the 31-County 17th Congressional District. The Congressman left the Nation's Capitol as it was quieting down following more than a week of rioting, looting, and burning, which he described as unbelievable. He expressed complete impatience with the lawlessness of recent rioting, looting, burning and killing in many of our major cities.

Congressman Burleson spent the weekend in Jones County with members of his family and will spend all of this week visiting about over the District. He is scheduled to make an All-Day Soil Conservation Service Tour of the Middle Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District the first of the week; will be near Brownwood for the celebration of the 200th SCS Conservation Project; will tour a number of watershed projects in McCullough and San Saba Counties and will speak at the Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquets at Brady on Thursday night and at San Saba on Friday night. He will address the Annual Installation Banquet of the Menard Junior Chamber of Commerce on Saturday night, after having toured several watershed projects in Menard County.

The Congressman is a candidate for re-election and is completing his 22nd year in the U. S. House of Representatives. He is unopposed in the Democratic Primary. He has seven new counties added to this District effective in January 1969, including Menard, McCullough, San Saba, Lampasas, Mason, Llano, and Burnet. The 17th Congressional District as it now stands includes 31 counties. Nearly 30,000 square miles, approximately 11 percent of the entire area of Texas, and over 422,000 people.

As the Congressman pointed out, it is very difficult to get around over the District very often, when the Congress stays in session so long each year.

The free pecan budding and grafting school, sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers' Association and the Isoco Chamber of Commerce, will be held Friday at the Isoco Junior College campus and at the B. 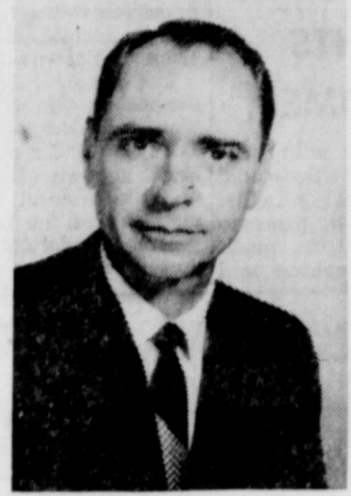
