PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, and sa to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations as may by the Legislation and any other services included in the Federal funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States for such purposes; provided that the States or nonetilizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for a least twenty-five (25) years;
