



Male high school students who plan to enter college for the first time in the fall of 1969 may apply now for 800 fouryear Army ROTC scholar-ships, the Army ROTC Directorate, Fort Monroe, Va, announced today.

The scholarships are awarded annually on a competitive basis to outstanding high school graduates who are highly motivated toward a career in the Active Army.

Each scholarship pay for the student's titution, textbooks and lab fees and provides a \$50 per month subsistence allowance for the duration of the award except for a sixweek summer camp period when the student receives onehalf the pay of a second lieutenant.
