Gordon says if very promising, especially it does not rain within a week, those where southern blight the dry land peanut yields and leaf spot were controlled, will be reduced considerably, reported the county agent. A two or three inch rain this Some of the early planted peaweek would be worth a million nuts had to be harvested prematurely because of southern blight. Some yields were as low as 25 bushels per acre an dthe grades were mostly in the 50's. Gordon said more farmers have used chemicals to control southern blight and leaf spot this year than in the previous years.

The lesser corn stalk borers have caused damage in some fields this year. but the infestation is not as bad as last year. Gordon says that most peanuts are too large to treat for borers now. Since they are soil insects the insecticide must be applied to the soil around the vines. This is just about impossible to do after middles.






