Surface Mail - If regular postage rates are to be used, five pounds should be mailed from Oct. 14 to Nov. 9. Packages must not weigh more than 70 pounds nor be more than 100 inches in length and girth combined.

Space Available Mail - If regular postage rates are to said. be used, parcels which weigh less than five pounds and not measure more than 60 inches in length and girth combined should be mailed from Oct. 21 the citizens of Eastland f o r to Nov. 24.
