July 4th Family Fun Choices Many in County

Beauty Pageant At Lake Cisco Pool

The annual Miss Cisco Pageant at Lake Cisco Pool will be the highlight of July 4th activities for the Cisco area.

Several thousand people are expected to attend the pageant which will be held at 9 p. m. Thursday, on a stage in the water in front of the pool pavilion. Thirteen girls will compete for the title of Miss Cisco in the pageant. There will be no admission charges.

The program will begin at 3 p. m. with games in the park and contests in the swimming pool for young people. The pageant will begin at 9 p. m. followed by a big fireworks show. Entertainment during the pageant will be provided by a combo of folk singers headed by Dwain Fain and a musical combo. Roy G. Hathaway will serve as master of ceremonies.

President Jim Webb of the Cisco Jaycees, sponsors of the annual event, said that his club has contracted with an Oklahoma City firm to come here since about 1930 when works show. This will take place across the swimming pool from the pavilion immediately following the pageant.

The Miss Cisco Pageant has been an annual promotion here since about 1930 when the swimming pool, 400 feet wide and 700 feet long, was built. Huge crowds always turn out for the event.

Choice Tickets On Sale For 6th Annual Ranger Rodeo July 11, 12, 13

The final performance will be literally loaded with special events. The Rodeo Queen for 1968 will be presented. She will succeed Miss Donna Ainsworth who has held the title for the past 12 months. Winner of the 500 lb. steer, project of Ranger High School Quarterback Club, will be announced. In keeping with their custom of former years, Pulley's Jewelry will present a 17-jewel watch to the "hard luck" cowboy and Greer's Western Store will award a saddle to the holder of the winning program.

The usual capacity crowd is expected to fill the arena for the three performances and the Jaycee Hall, 120 W. Main St. where a Western dance will be held following each rodeo performance.

O'Brien, 36, a native of Carbon in Eastland County, is a graduate of Cisco Junior College and Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. He formerly worked for the Abilene Reporter-News as military editor before moving to Eastland in 1961. He is a veteran, having served with the White House Army Signal Agency in Washington, D. C. Mrs. O'Brien is a native of Rotan where she graduated from high school, attended Hardin-Simmons. She is the daughter of Mrs. Ted Rogers of Cisco and will assist her husband. The couple have two children, Vance 4, and Amy, 2. O'Brien is the son of Mrs. Fannie O'Brien of Eastland.

In other appointments, it was announced that Pat Collins of Ranger will continue to be editor of the Ranger Times and will become advertising director for the papers.

Mrs. Marie Boney will become associate editor in Eastland.

Mr. Sitton will continue to edit the Press until a replacement is named.

The papers will continue their basic policy of providing local news coverage in depth for the trade areas served.

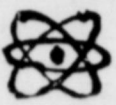
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TidBits

U.S. Fighting Men Believe Cause Is Right, Major Writes Cisco Man

American fighting men in Viet Nam aren't too hopeful that current efforts to end the war will succeed, but they believe in the cause that they are championing. That was the theme of a letter received recently by Charles S. Sandler, Cisco business man, from Major Prosper N. Walker, who is stationed in Viet Nam.

Major Walker is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Walker of Moran, and he spoke to the Cisco Lions Club just before going to Viet Nam last winter. His letter to Mr. Sandler, in part, follows:

"I have enjoyed an extremely interesting tour, and we are in no more danger than driving down the streets of our cities at home.

"I share your hopes that we may somehow see an end to this conflict soon but, realistically, I do not expect that to happen. The punishment that the VC-NVA forces are taking now is terrible. In their desperate bid for propaganda victories with which to influence the peace talks and our nation's choice for a new president, they have abandoned the tactics of guerrilla operations which favor their forces militarily and have chosen instead to sacrifice entire units in suicide frontal attacks which favor our tremendously superior firepower.

"The carnage is ghastly. Yes, we take casualties — heavy sometimes — but almost always at the ratio of one-tenth to one-twentieth that of the enemy. This, of course, upsets the minority of U. S. citizens who would have us turn our backs on South Viet Nam and leave her to her fate.

"Yes, it is a horrible war, but I would not for one moment even dream of any course of action other than the one we are taking. We are a nation made great and blessed because of our determination to do right in the face of adversity. The day we turn our backs on our commitments and refuse to honor them, we lose the pride and strength of character that has sustained us through the years, and we become, instead, a selfish, self-centered people oblivious to the suffering of our less fortunate neighbors.

"I take great pride in the fact that my country and her citizens have the backbone to stand up and fight tyranny and willingly undertake the dirty tasks that have to be done.

"I am proud to be an American and proud also of the heritage that gives us the staunch supporters like yourself and all the rest of the good people of the communities back home who dare to 'choose the harder right instead of the easier wrong and to know no fear when truth and justice are in jeopardy.'"

Major Walker and his family have many friends in this area. His wife and children are making their home in Abilene while he is overseas.

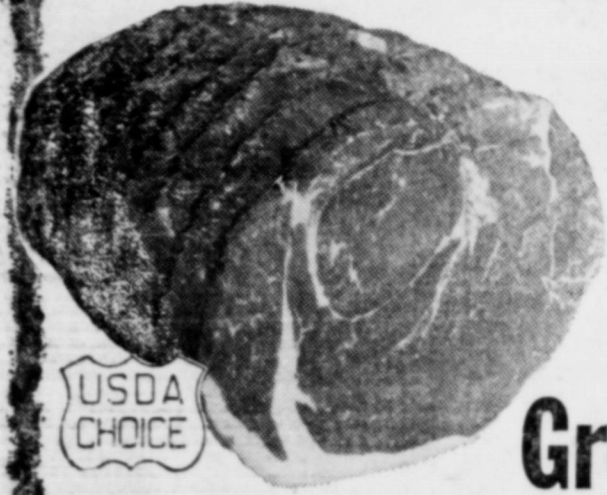

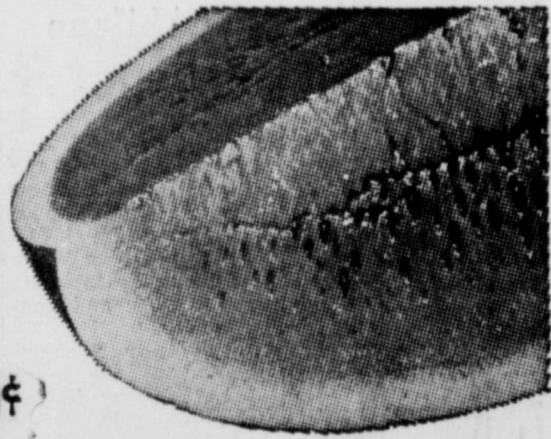
