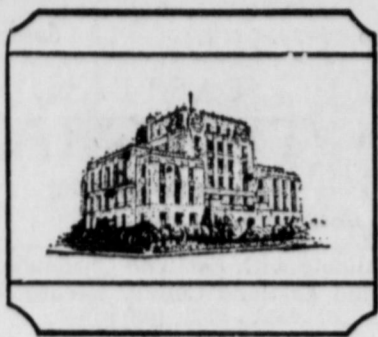

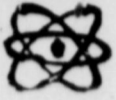

YOU READ in these columns a few days ago that J. W. Sittin is planning to slow down a bit and that H. V. O'Brien has become publisher. This bit of news has been met with various reactions: In Cisco, those who have read "The Editor's Report" (and prior to that, "The Gay Philosopher") columns for years have responded much as though they'd just heard that Lake Cisco was going to be moved. To his readers, he's more of a column himself — of the structural type: always there; to support something; to hold up principals of good citizenship; and to stand tall in the midst of what might otherwise appear to be confusion.

However, his slowing down is going to create a void that is going to be hard to fill — and our reaction to the news is first "Who, us?" Then remembering the lessons he's taught over the years: The people come first; ask what's best for the community; treat everybody the way you expect them to treat you; and a hundred more that have carried him successfully through 20 wonderful years of being, as he prefers to call it, "A Country Editor."

It's a big challenge to try to follow such a man. Frankly, we wouldn't even consider it if the people in this area weren't the kind they are. We see it as a chance to serve some awfully good people.

The responsibilities give us cause for trembling, but the pleasure and satisfaction of serving such fine folks makes us humble and thankful that we have the opportunity of working here.

For a while, we'll misspell some names and probably put some people in the wrong towns — until we get everybody placed, but with your patience, understanding and help plus the fine support from our efficient staffs and crews, we'll prove to the Philosopher that we were listening through the years when he surely thought we were dozing.—H.V.O.

George G. McBee, a U. S. Army reservist who serves in Bryan, Tex., as assistant operations officer, 4162d U. S. Army Reserve School in Austin, was promoted, July 1 to the rank of major. Col. Eugene R. Carter, commandant of the school, administered the oath during annual active duty training of the unit with the 90th U. S. Army Reserve Command at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio. County Farmers' Acreage Report Due By Aug. 1st

County Farmers will be required to report their acreage in the county office not later than Aug. 1. R. G. Lyerla, chairman of the Eastland ASC County Committee, has announced. This date is the deadline for reporting these acreages. This includes peanuts, cotton, feed grain, and diverted acreage. Wheat reporting has been completed.

Failure to report the acreages will result in loss of credited history for 1968 and loss in price support payments, Mr. Lyerla stated.

Mr. Lyerla went on to state that 901 farms will have to report, of which 150 farms had reported as of July 1. Farmers who have received or requested measurement service, either before or after planting, will still have to report their acreages in the county office. Mr. Lyerla further stated that all farmers will have to come in to the county office themselves and report this acreage before Aug. 1.

Mr. Lyerla urged full cooperation of the farmers with the county office on this matter.

Dead at the scene were Vincent C. Kaspazak, 19, of Carbondale, Ind., stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif. and Clinton J. Grass, 37, of Rapid City.

The body of Kaspazak was found beneath the wreckage of the Grass truck. It was believed that he was riding in the cab of the truck driven by Grass and owned by the Barber Moving and Storage Co. of Rapid City.

Indemnity Company Moves Offices From Houston To Eastland County

The First National Indemnity Company, a five year old firm that insures property improvement, mortgage guaranty and mobile home loans, has completed moving its general offices from Houston to Cisco, according to announcement Saturday.

The company, which was purchased three years ago by officials of the First National Bank in Cisco and several associates, was moved into the bank building and occupies the second floor back of The Gift House.

The company has assets in excess of \$1,500,000 and it has nine employees at this time. Virtually all of the firm's insurance dealings are with the banks and savings and loan associations.

R. A. (Bob) Hammett of Cisco is president of the company, and Charles E. Roberts of Cisco is the executive vice president. Larry Dorsey of Dallas is the vice president in charge of sales, and Don L. Johnston, formerly of Fort Worth, has moved to Cisco to become comptroller and secretary of the company.

The board of directors include Mr. Hammett, Mr. Roberts, and J. P. McCracken, all of Cisco. Tom Wilson of Eastland and Charles A. Spears of Sherman and others.

Mr. Hammett, the company president, is on leave of absence as a vice president of the First National Bank in Cisco. He has directed much of the detail work incident to moving the offices to Cisco. He has been with the Cisco bank 16 years and is currently serving as president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Johnston has purchased the Howard Turner home at 601 West 9th Street for his family. He and his wife, Sarann, have three children — Norma, 12; Mike, 11, and Mark, 6. They are Baptists.

Mr. Johnston is a native of Crane and holds BS and MA degrees from Sul Ross State College at Alpine. He resigned a position as an auditor in General Accounting in Fort Worth to accept the First National post. He is a veteran of Army duty in the Korean Conflict.

The parents of Mr. Johnston, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Johnston, will be moving soon from Russell, Kansas, to Eastland County. He has just retired and plans to return here to live. Mr. Johnston's late grandfather, W. W. Johnston, was a Cisco civic leader in the community's early days.

First National Indemnity Company has moved to Cisco to take advantage of the

economies and the benefits of a small town headquarters, Mr. Hammett said.

The company's long-haul truck insurance division was moved to Cisco two years ago and its progress has been satisfactory, it was pointed out by Mr. Hammett.

"We have every reason to believe that First National Indemnity Company will be a leader in its field," Mr. Hammett said. "There is a growing demand for the type of services that we offer, and we are charting a course to take

full advantage of our growth potential.

In readiness for the company's moving to Cisco, the building underwent substantial remodeling and considerable new air-conditioning equipment has been installed.

Miss Vivki King, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob King, has been named Sweetheart of the Eastland Rotary Club.

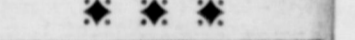

Olden, Carbon, Desdemona Exchanges Expected in Fall

Construction of new telephone exchanges at Carbon, Desdemona and Olden is underway and a completion date late September is expected, according to a report here.

Contractor is Caldwell Construction Co., Caldwell, Tex., a bid amount of \$229,000.

After completion of the all private line system, Desdemona will be able to dial direct to De Leon toll free; Carbon will be able to dial Eastland toll free, and Olden will be able to dial Eastland toll free and vice versa, the statement said.

The Stake Construction Co., Lennox, S. D., was successful bidder at \$440,877.39 to build a new telephone system at DeLeon and surrounding areas that now have phones of DeLeon. Construction will begin in 45 days, with contractors headquartered in DeLeon.

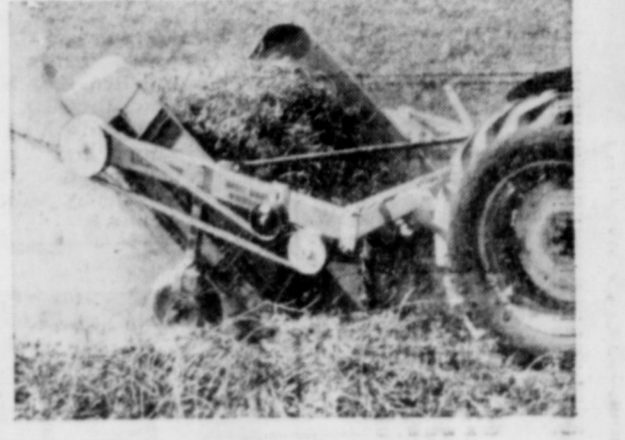

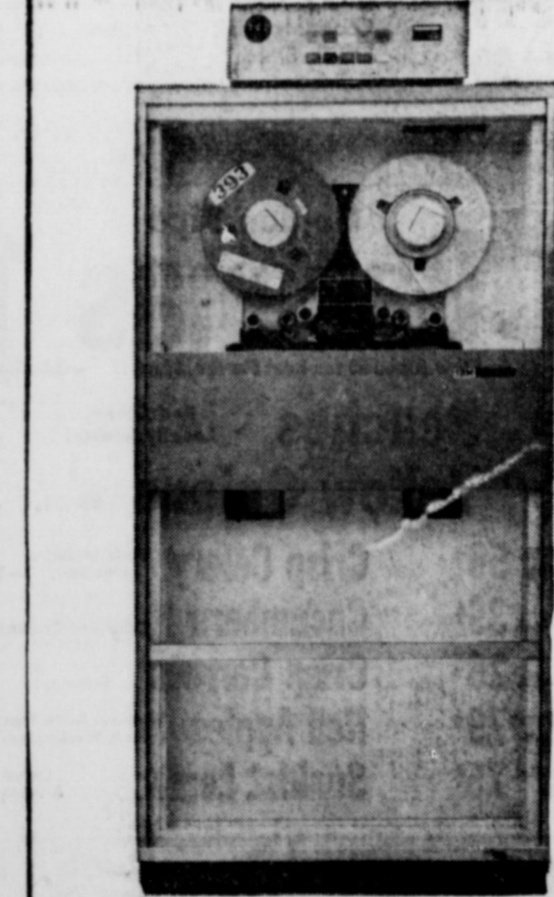
