




On older peanut plants, a Eastland or Erach Counties first indication of the presence of the lesser cornstalk borer. Farmers may have the larvae positively identified by

> there as in Comanche County. The larvae, first found this season at Proctor, were fully matured and the silken cocoons were firmly attached to

the peanut roots. The County Agricultural Agents in the peanut areas have information on a control program which the farmer can apply against the insect, White noted. Insecticides used at the proper rate and tme are effective in keeping down the borer populations.






