Ed Ehrhridge was program chairman and introduced the girls who told of "all the wonderful things they'd done since they'd been here."

Mary Ann Ohlsson, who has visited in the homes of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Meredith and Dr. and Mrs. E. W. Mince of Ranger, said that she has been most impressed by the friendliness and hospitality of the Texas people. Since her arrival she has visited Fort Worth, the local cattle auction, the local jail and high school, Abilene, Casa Manana, Six Flags Over Texas, the LBJ Ranch, Lubbock, and has spoke for Lions and Rotary clubs in Eastland and Ranger. She also enjoyed a birthday celebration here, and a slumber party at Lake Leon. She also attended a Baptist Church and closed by saying, "I like your people here and I hope to come back here very soon."

Eva Brennan, who visited in the homes of Mr. and Mrs. Wendell Siebert and Mr. and Mrs. Ehrhridge, said that the three things that impressed

her most are the people, the heat and the number of automobiles. She'd found the food delicious ("The hamburgers are much bigger and better here"). James Vasher, 48, longtime Breckenridge resident and a cook in the White Elephant Restaurant in Eastland for six months, died Saturday as the result of a head-on collision on Friday afternoon near Breckenridge.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Tuesday in Melton Chapel of Memories in Breckenridge, with the Rev. E. J. Lott, pastor of the CME Church, and the Rev. Billy Delaney, Baptist pastor of Wichita Falls, officiating. Burial was in the Breckenridge Cemetery.

Born Oct. 23, 1920 in Dallas, he married Dorothy May Wynne June 1, 1949 in Abilene. The couple moved to Breckenridge in 1959.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Ann Davis of Massachusetts; and his mother, Mrs. Auburn Vasher of Wichita Falls.

## Arrest Expected Soon Arson Try In Carbon School

An apparent attempt to burn the cafeteria of the Carbon schools failed Saturday night. A fire which authorities said was "started deliberately" at the northwest end of the cafeteria resulted in about \$50.00 damage, according to Carbon School Superintendent Jimmy Hughes.

Hughes said the paint was broken and there were some broken windows.

The Eastland County Sheriff's office is investigating the incident.

Hughes said that Woodrow Mangum and I. D. Hogan, who have homes near the school, were the first there and began trying to control the fire. Carbon Volunteer Firemen Bill Carlton, Tim Warren, and Colin Campbell answered the call for help. The Eastland Volunteer Firemen also were summoned, but the fire was extinguished before they arrived.

The fire which was called "minor" by Carbon Fire Chief Max Stubblefield said the fire was at the outside of a wall at the west end of the building and that only a window area was damaged.

Eastland firemen extinguished a grass fire at 516 South Halbryan Friday.

## 5 County Banks Report Assets Over \$30 Million

Reflecting a high level of growth during the past 12 months Eastland county banks, with Gorman unreported, revealed total assets of \$27,633,987.96 as of June 30, the current call date.

The Gorman figure was expected to bring the total resources figure to above \$30,000,000.00.

Deposits and loans and discounts also showed sizeable gains from the totals of a year ago.

The reports were made in response to calls from the comptroller of the currency at Washington, D. C. in the case of nationally chartered banks, such as the Cisco First National and the Eastland

National Bank, and the State Banking commissioner in the case of state chartered institutions, such as the First State of Rising Star and the First State Bank at Ranger. The call date was June 30.

Total deposits for the Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Rising Star banks were reported at \$25,262,164.09, while loans and discounts, representing principally funds invested in loans stimulating to the economy of the area were reported at \$15,000,338.93 as of the call date.

Individually reported, the figures are:

First National Bank, Cisco — Total assets, \$9,254,695.06; deposits, 8,401,468.00; loans and discounts, \$4,456,107.40;

Eastland National Bank — Total assets, \$9,153,412.86; deposits, \$8,509,115.55; loans and discounts, \$4,975,249.95;

First State Bank, Rising Star — Total assets, \$4,784,785.36; deposits, \$4,353,952.16; loans and discounts, \$2,883,493.06;

First State Bank, Ranger — Total assets, \$4,441,094.68; deposits, \$3,997,628.38; loans and discounts, \$2,685,488.62.

## Mangum Gets 35 Years; Seabourn, 20

### Baird Denied Venue Change

Jerry Wayne Baird, being tried in 91st District Court for jail break, was denied a motion for change of venue which would have moved the trial to another court.

Defense Attorney N. R. Newman called H. V. O'Brien, Frank Pruitt, circulation manager of the Reporter-News, and H. A. McCanlies and questioned regarding the publicity regarding the case.

Prosecuting Judge Earl Conner denied the motion.

Prosecuting is District Attorney Emory Walton, who held with witnesses and affidavits that Baird could in deed get a fair trial in this county.

A 91st District Court jury Tuesday afternoon found Leroy Mangum of Cisco guilty of armed robbery and assessed a punishment of 35 years.

Testifying as a character witness for Mangum was Carlton Holder of Cisco. Witnesses for the prosecution included Cid Rhodes and Sheriff L. E. Sublett. The jury returned the verdict at 3:05.

Jurors in the Mangum trial were Mrs. H. G. Evans of Ranger, J. C. Stansell of Eastland, J. C. McDaniel of Carbon, Ted Hale of Cisco, I. J. Dobbins of Cisco, Foreman George Parrack of Eastland, Jamie Fry of Cisco, Kay Woods of Eastland, Mrs. J. D. Johnson of Ranger, Jerry Bob Greener of Ranger, James Brown of Gorman and Ray Judia of Cisco.

After deliberating only ten minutes Monday afternoon, jury in the 91st District Court found Kendyll Seabourn guilty of armed robbery and a few minutes later sentenced him to 20 years in prison.

Chief witnesses for the prosecution were Rev. and Mrs. Bruce McNair of Carbon. They testified that they were awakened by a knock at their door about 10:40 p.m. on June 2. When Rev. McNair opened the door he was greeted with a gun in his face and two young men forced their way inside.

The men obtained the pastor's car keys and a small amount of cash and then the one identified as Seabourn tied the pastor to his bed and his wife to a sofa in another room. The men then left in Rev. McNair's car saying they would leave it in Amarillo, but were captured the next day in Lonoke, Arkansas.

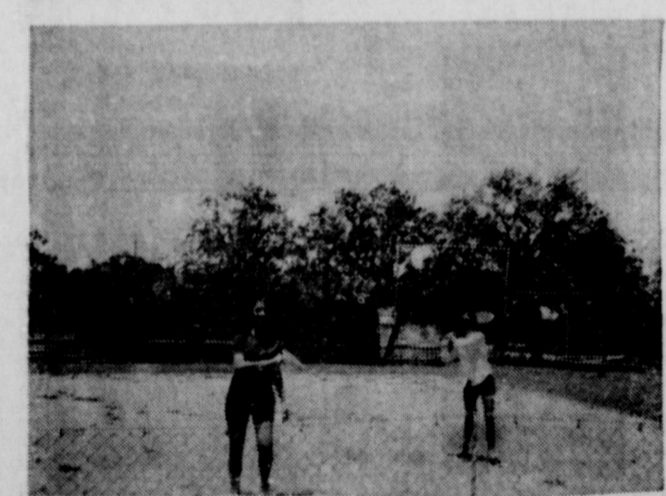

## Despite June's 4.17 Inches, Rain Needed for Topsoil, Growers Say

An abnormal June, weather-wise, marked with recurring thunderstorms, tornado scares, high winds and record rainfall in this section, passed into a thoroughly normal July which, before the first week of the month was finished, had farmers looking hopefully skyward.

June's 4.19 inches of rainfall provided one of the best peanut planting seasons in history, but by the Fourth of July week-end further moisture was needed, growers said,

to soften the already crusted top soil.

Records kept by John W. Lee, official U. S. Weather Bureau observer at Rising Star, showed total rainfall for the year at the Rising Star station to be 17.82 inches. Average for the year in this section is around 28 inches.

There is plenty of subsoil moisture, farmers report, but the excessive heat and dry winds have robbed the topsoil of its season. A good rain now would be welcome.

Peanuts, however can stand a great deal of dry weather during the early stages of growth. But rain during the fruiting season in August and early September is vital, growers said.

Pastures and stock water supplies are in good shape.

Hottest days during June, Lee reported, were June 20 and 21 when the mercury touched 100 degrees. A high rate of humidity increased the discomfort.

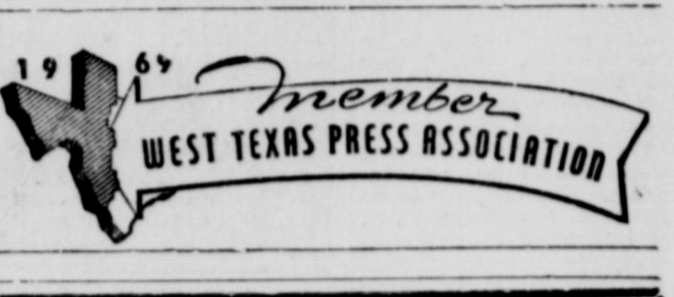

# Peanut Crop Foe Found Comanche; Locals Watch

Comanche County peanut growers were warned this week that the lesser cornstock borer has apparently begun its annual buildup in the area, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

The worm or larvae stage of the destructive pest was found on June 23 in three scattered locations in Comanche County. Earlier in April and May, entomologists at the De Leon Research Laboratory had caught moths in light traps which indicated that the seasonable pest might be starting its summer life cycle. As yet, the pest has not appeared this year in Eastland or Erath Counties.

but a close watch is being kept by department personnel, Commissioner White said.

The pest has a 30-day reproductive cycle. An increase of the peanut destroyer may be expected to show up between July 15-20.

Commissioner White repeated earlier warnings to farmers to inspect their fields frequently for the insect. The worms or larvae are approximately 3/4-inch long, turquoise and brown and are very active. They may be observed feeding on sprouted peanuts, roots and the stems of young peanut plants.

On older peanut plants, a few dead or dying branches may be seen. This can be the first indication of the presence of the lesser cornstalk borer. Farmers may have the larvae positively identified by bringing samples to the Texas Department of Agriculture research lab at De Leon.

While the pest has not yet been found in Eastland or it can be expected that the larvae are in the same cycle there as in Comanche County. The larvae, first found this season at Proctor, were fully matured and the silken cocoons were firmly attached to the peanut roots.

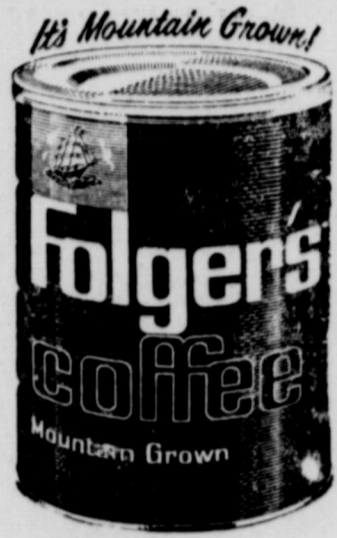
The County Agricultural Agents in the peanut areas have information on a control program which the farmer can apply against the insect, White noted. Insecticides used at the proper rate and time are effective in keeping down the borer populations.

# Mobile X-Ray Unit Due Here Thursday, Friday

The Christmas Seal Mobile X-Ray Unit will make its annual visit to Eastland County this week. All persons, age 15 and over, are invited to participate in the chest x-ray search for tuberculosis, lung

tumor, enlarged heart, emphysema and other chest diseases. The following schedule has been set:  
Thursday, July 10, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., downtown Ranger;  
Friday, July 11, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., downtown Cisco, and 12 noon to 6 p.m., downtown Eastland on the square.

All X-rays are given free by the North Texas TB-RD Association. Persons found to have suspected abnormalities, will be notified by mail within two weeks.  
Bill Forrester, of Ft. Worth, executive director for the association, said, "If your chest X-ray is okay, you will not receive a written report. It has cost several thousand dollars each year to mail 'negative'

report. We believe this money can be better spent giving additional service to other people."  
Forrester went on to explain that "No news is good news" in respect to receiving reports.  
If, however, for business or personal reasons, one needs or wishes written confirmation that his X-ray was negative, the association will provide a certified report for a small, non-profit fee.  
The association is supported solely by Christmas Seals and

other voluntary contributions. Donation jars will be located within the unit for the convenience of those persons desiring to contribute. The Association receives no United or Governmental funds.  
A visit aboard the X-ray unit will be a demonstration of your concern for better health in Eastland County.  
In 1968, 945 persons were tested in this county, and \$276.48 was collected, Forrester said.
