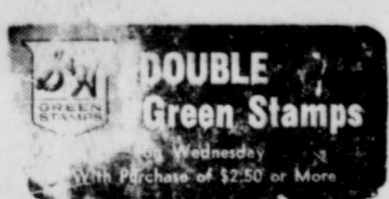

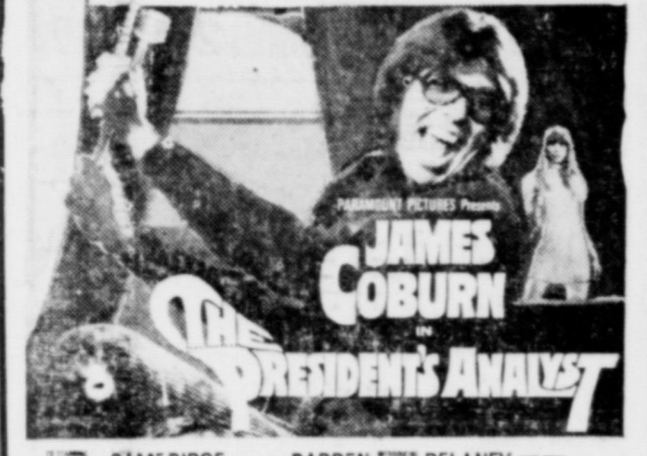

'You'll Like Eastland' Newcomers Were Told -- Sure Enough, They Do

In August, 1967, Mrs. Walter Herman of New York City, widow of a New York state trooper, was introduced to William M. Pace, also of NYC, a widower who was a retired Chief Petty Officer, United States Navy.

"You would like Eastland, Texas," she assured him. The couple married March 19, 1968 and moved to Eastland on April 21. They bought a home on the corner of Valley and Walnut and plan to stay here. And he does like Eastland, Texas, although he had never seen it before. His wife was here for six weeks four years ago, when she visited in the John Lee Roper home. The

Roper's daughter, Mrs. Thea Jeter, and Mrs. Pace had been friends for several years. When Mrs. Jeter and her family moved back to Eastland County, Mrs. Pace decided she would move here too, someday.

Mrs. Pace was born in Vienna while her mother was attending medical school there. She came to New York City in 1913, planning to visit for a year. World War I prevented her return, however, and she stayed in the states. She has been to Europe to visit her family eight times, in 1920, 1930, 1937 and five times between 1950 and 1963. She says, "I usually go to Europe by boat and return home by plane. I had planned to go again this year -- I have a brother and two sisters in West Germany -- but I moved to Eastland instead. We will probably see Europe next year."

Mr. Pace was born in Buffalo, New York, and moved with his family to NYC early in this century. His father built many of the subways in the city. In 1905, Pace joined the Army and spent three years as a soldier. In 1908, he joined the Navy, where he stayed until he retired in 1945. He saw action in both World Wars, but was not injured in either. He was docked at all the major ports in the world and has toured most of the countries in the world. His only previous trip to

Texas was "a long time ago and very brief." Keeping a lawn is not new to Pace, who says, "We always had a yard, even in the Bronx where it is crowded." It is new to his wife, however, who lived in a 54-apartment building on West 20th Street. The recent garbage strike in New York City did not affect either of them. She says, "We had no garbage problems in our building for we never had any garbage cans outside or anything like that. We just walked to a door which opened off the hall of each floor and emptied our sacks. It was all very nice and very well run in this neighborhood."

Christmas in NYC was a favorite time for the Paces, although neither liked the crowds in Manhattan during the season. Mrs. Pace liked to ride a bus up and down Fifth Avenue at night to see the decorations in store windows and to visit Rockefeller Center. "I don't now if the center is prettier at Christmas or at Easter," she says. Getting lost is a problem. Mrs. Pace says, "I sometimes look around and think what am I doing on this street? But I try to find Seaman and then I know where I am."

Lots of Talent Awaits Your Summer Needs

In an effort to help Eastland High School students locate summer work, the Chamber of Commerce printed and distributed summer employment questionnaires, which the stu-

dents filled out during assembly prior to the end of the semester.

The forms called for name, telephone number, address, name of parent or guardian,

state of birth, age, sex, height, and weight. Students, especially female students: "Why do we have to list how much we weigh?" School superintendent Wendell Siebert: "Now you wouldn't want them to try and place a seven foot, 250 pound girl in a small office, would you?" Students then listed time of family vacation (thus time student would be unavailable for work), and types of employment preferred. Two questions were to be answered "Yes or No": "I can type"

and "I have already made arrangements for a summer job." Some 122 students filled out applications; the others had jobs or were leaving for the entire summer and unable to take a job. Of the 56 who could type, almost all added the word per minute speed, which ranged from 20 to 80. They were not estimating speeds, apparently, or guessing at round figures: speeds listed include 22, 32, 37, 53. One student merely said "one-half semester." Twenty-one boys and 35 girls could type.

More than 40 different jobs were listed, with boys interested in all but nine of them (cashier, public service, nurses' aides, library, car hops, modeling art work sewing and ironing) and girls omitting 23, including hay hauling, highway construction and butchering.

Both boys and girls liked office work, working inside cafes or drug stores, clerking in stores, house cleaning, baby-sitting, yard work or mowing, and typing. Boys wanted to be farm workers, truck drivers, plumbers, welders, mechanic helpers, welders, and tendants at service stations. Forty-one boys listed "any kind of manual labor."

One boy asked to help repair TV sets and one wanted

to work on air-conditioners. Two girls wished to work in the library, two wanted to model, and two wished to be car hops.

These students are realistic: typing speeds, which did not have to be listed, were given with a no-nonsense attitude. They are hard workers: no student who passes from grade to grade in the local school system is a stranger to hard work, for the system is set up to require work. They are experienced in many fields: most high school girls know what an iron is, most can sew.

Perhaps most important of all, these kids want to work. They would make good employees.
