Mr. Walker was born Dec. 5, 1906, in Rising Star. He retired two months ago after selling the drive-in theater, which he had operated for 18 years. He had lived in Cisco since retirement.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Walker was married Feb. 4, 1920, to the late Gladys Kirkpatrick in Abilene. She passed away in 1967.

Surviving Mr. Walker are one sister, Mrs. Nadene Sprayberry, of Clifton; two brothers, Earl B. Walker of Cisco and Jerry Walker of Goldthwaite; and his mother, Mrs. Ada Walker of Rising Star.

TICKETS ON SALE NOW — Tech Coach J.T. King To Be QB Club Banquet Speaker

Texas Tech Red Raider Coach J. T. King will be featured speaker for the Eastland Banquet to be held Monday, Dec. 16, it has been announced here.

When J. T. King took the job as head coach at Texas Tech in 1961, it had just completed its first year in the big league of college football, the Southwest Conference. The school had managed only one victory and one tie throughout its venture in that fearsome competition in 1960.

What King has done is to build Texas Tech a solid football program which continues to draw national recognition.

In King's very first year, he posted a remarkable 4-won, 6-lost mark. The Raiders slumped back to a 1-and-9 the next season, but King's widely respected recruiting talents were about to bear fruit.

The Red Raiders rolled to a 10-5 record the next season, and in 1963 posted a 6-3-1 season and a berth in the Sun Bowl. King's 1965 eleven record set an 8-2 season mark and a date in the Gator Bowl.

Highlight of a rebuilding and injury plagued 1966 season was a 21 to 16 victory over Arkansas, a result hailed as the "upset of the year" throughout the nation. Last fall, the Red Raiders were in contention for the conference crown right down to the last week of the season, posting a 6-4 record good enough for undisputed possession of second place in the final standings.

A sound football technician, King is respected by his peers, Texas sports writers named him senior college coach of the year in 1965, and he had a great deal of support for national honors in voting by his rival coaches.

This summer King was in Rochester, N. Y., as one of 13 football coaches in the nation selected to lecture in the sixth annual Physical Fitness Task Force program sponsored by the American Football Coaches Association and the Tea Council of the U.S.A. He is again scheduled to coach in the East-West Shrine game for three years beginning in 1969. He coached in the East-West game after the 1966 season. Following Tech's Gator Bowl appearance in 1965, he flew to Honolulu to coach in the Hula Bowl. King coached in the Blue-Gray contest at Montgomery last fall.

King was born near Hamberg, Ark., and educated at Houston's John Reagan High School. Lettering at guard for the Longhorns, he was graduated from Texas in 1938. King coached high school football in Oklahoma and served as an assistant coach at Tulane, Texas and Texas A&M. When Paul (Bear) Bryant moved to the University of Alabama following Texas A&M's Gator Bowl appearance, King came to Texas Tech as an assistant in 1958.

Tickets at \$2.50 each are on sale now for the event which will be held at the Elementary School Cafeteria. Tickets are available from all QB Club members with Joe Cuipepper, Bill Harrison and Walter Maynard in charge of tickets.

Coach King has promised the Eastland grid supporters that he will try to bring maybe a couple of Tech standouts, including Eastland's own Jimmy Moylan and maybe Roger Freeman, if at all possible for the banquet. Moylan is scheduled to leave Friday, Dec. 20, for the Blue-Gray Game.

Early ticket purchase is recommended, according to publicity Chairman Bruce Pipkin, because of the outstanding program. The Club is host to all footballers — Seventh Grade,

Eight Grade, Junior Varsity and Varsity, as well as Junior High and Senior High Cheerleaders at the banquet. Tickets will be necessary for dates.

Supt. Wendell Siebert will be master of ceremonies and Dr. F. H. Lund and Coach Shirley Frazier are in charge of menu. Bill Anderson will handle decorations and Walter Maynard is in charge of printing.

The meal will be catered by Vance Godby of Fort Worth and will be a steak dinner, it was reported.

Awards will be made and new QB Club officers installed. Elected at the meeting Friday to serve during the next year are Ralph Stephens, president; W. J. Stone, vice-president; and Bill Anderson, secretary-treasurer.

Strawn Woman Killed in Wreck At Desdemona

A two car accident at 2:55 p. m. Tuesday in Desdemona claimed the life of one woman and injured two others. The accident occurred at the intersection of state highways 8 and 16.

Dead on arrival at De Leon Hospital was Mrs. Rosa Irene Orsini, 60, a passenger in the car driven by her son, Michael Jack Orsini, who was uninjured.

The driver of the other car, Mrs. Linda M. Alexander, 57, of Breckenridge, was charged with negligent homicide in Eastland court of Justice of the Peace L. W. Dalton, and was released on her own cognizance to make the \$1,500 bond before Dalton on Wednesday.

Mrs. Alexander suffered minor injuries but was not hospitalized, but a passenger in her car, Mrs. Daisy Thomas of Ranger was admitted to DeLeon Hospital with knee injuries not believed to be serious.

Highway Patrolman Ken Perry of Eastland said the Orsini car was totally destroyed and the Alexander car "probably totally wrecked."

Funeral arrangements for Mrs. Orsini were pending at press time with Edwards Funeral Home in Strawn.

Survivors included her husband, two sons and two daughters.

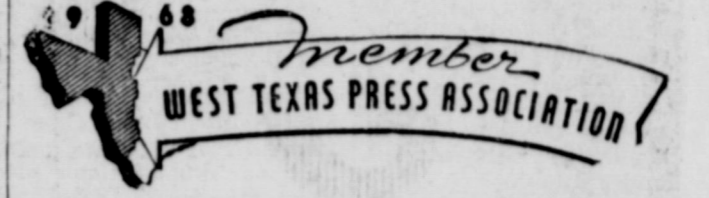

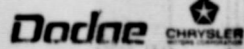

'Hog-Wallow' Is Sample Of County's Many Soils

"HOG-WALLOW" SOIL

Eastland County has 50 different kinds of soil, and of those 50, Tobosa clay stands out as a distinct individual soil. Although it is of fairly small extent, approximately 15,000 acres, it is agriculturally important to Eastland County.

Tobosa soils are high shrink-swell clay soils. When the soil is dry, it shrinks, causing cracks about 1 inch wide and 20 inches deep. When it becomes wet, the clay swells. The end result is an area of "hog wallows". No other soil in Eastland County has such a high coefficient of expansion and contraction with changes in moisture. Buildings, highways or practically anything built on this soil is likely to be damaged because of the twisting and turning of the "hog wallow" soil.

Tobosa clay is important because of its ability to self-mulch and also because it particularly always "lays good". It occurs in broad valleys with flat to gentle slopes. It usually receives additional moisture as runoff from other soils at higher elevations. This soil is high in natural fertility. It is calcareous or high in free lime. It is very plastic and sticky when wet, causing tillage problems. It takes in water rapidly when dry, but when the cracks close, the water enters very slowly. It has a high water holding capacity but also has a high wilting point.

Tobosa soils are especially adapted to small grain and grain sorghum. Alfalfa is also well adapted. The main limitation on the flat areas is on plant root depth. Water erosion is the main hazard on the more sloping areas. Rangeland areas support a dense stand of Texas wintergrass, buffalograss, and other short grasses. White tridens usually grow in the "hog wallows" of depressions with the short grasses growing on the low knolls. As the picture shows mesquite trees are usually present unless controlled. The picture shows water from recent rain standing in the "hog wallows".

When the soil survey of Eastland County is completed by scientist with the Soil Conservation Service, each soil will be described in detail, located on aerial photographs and published in book form.
