Last year was the worst in recorded history for tornado incidence in the United States. There were 912 tornadoes re ported, causing 116 deaths, approximately 2,000 injuries and untold millions of dollars in damage.

A new tornado preparedness plan for community protection has been developed by the Weather Bureau, and is expected to be placed in operation during the next few vears at all locations subject to tornadoes and severe thunderstorms.




