Senior Citizen Fair To Be Saturday at Courthouse

Senior Citizens of Eastland County are invited to participate in the Senior Citizen's Fair to be held on the Courthouse lawn and lobby in Eastland. The Fair is to be held on June 14, and is the first Fair of this type to be held in the county.

The Aging Committee members are sponsoring and hosting the fair which will be held in conjunction with the annual Flag Day ceremonies.

The purpose of the Fair is for anyone 60 years of age or older to have the opportunity to show any article that they have handmade during recent years. Those wishing to sell their entries may do so during the day.

All entries are to be in place by 10 a.m. on Saturday, June 14, and removed by 5 p.m. that same day. Aging Committee members will be present throughout the day to assist. Those entering the Fair are asked to man their own exhibits during the day, and act as sales person where entries are to be sold.

Entries may include such items as quilting, knitting, crochet, ceramics, oil and water color paintings, handmade decorative items for the home, wood craft items, and any other miscellaneous items. Display items requiring special equipment to exhibit them, such as an easel, etc., exhibitors are asked to bring their own.

Exhibits should have a card attached giving the name and address of the owner. If article is to be sold, state price on the card.

Co-Chairman for the Fair are Mrs. Marene Johnson, of Eastland; Mrs. W. E. Herweck, in Ranger; and Mrs. Arlin Bint, of Cisco. The public is invited to attend the Fair throughout the day.

Ranger Woman Charged With Murder Try

A 40-year-old Ranger man was listed in fair condition at Ranger General Hospital Wednesday with gunshot wounds and his 38-year-old wife has been charged with assault with intent to commit murder, District Attorney Emory Walton reports.

Paul Hoisington, a construction company worker, was shot in the upper chest at his home at 603 Walnut St. about 1:30 a.m. Tuesday, by a .22 caliber rifle shell. Charged in Justice of the Peace M. D. Underwood's court, bond was set at \$1,000 for Mrs. Hoisington. She is in Eastland County Jail.

County Sheriff L. E. Sublett said the incident followed an argument, and that an 8-year-old son was in the home at the time.

2 Plans Being Studied For More Protection

The county commissioners court is considering two possibilities for improving law enforcement in Eastland County, County Judge Scott Bailey said following a semi-monthly commission meeting this week.

A large delegation of interested citizens appeared before the court Monday asking that more deputy help be provided for the Sheriff's Department.

"We're interested in getting more protection for the people of Eastland County," Bailey said, "not necessarily in getting more help for the sheriff."

Under consideration is the possibility of arranging professional training for present police officials in the county, possibly in conjunction with a West Central Texas Council law enforcement school.

"Upgrading, Judge Bailey explained Tuesday as being increasing the salaries of the constables (now paid \$125 a month) and allowing them some auto expenses. The five constables are Steele Hill of Eastland, Albert White of Gorman, W. H. Kornagay of Rising Star, A. W. Dawson of Cisco and Ralph Veal of Ranger.

Judge Bailey indicated that the commissioners would be talking with the constables to determine their willingness to step up their participation in county law enforcement. The commissioner's next regular semi-monthly meeting will be Monday, June 23, and the Judge indicated that perhaps some program could be announced at that time.

"If it weren't for all the people in Eastland — particularly my parents — I probably wouldn't have won it," commented Norman Rhodes, who fired a closing round 75 and outlasted a two-man challenge to win the Lone Cedar Invitational Tournament.

Norman was especially proud of this victory because he had practiced only about two months since having surgery for a severe shoulder injury late last summer.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Rhodes of Eastland, he has been playing golf for about ten years. In 1965 he graduated from Eastland High School where he was on the golf team for four years. He is presently senior majoring in finance at North Texas State University. He was on the NTSU Golf Team his freshman and sophomore years.

The Lone Cedar Tournament was Norman's first major tournament victory although he has placed high in several others, including second in the State Left Handers' Tournament and second in the Lone Cedar Tournament last year.

He played his best game Saturday, he said.

Norman plans to enter the Men's West Texas Golf Tournament, the Lakeside Golf Tournament and the State Left Handers' Tournament later this summer. His interests other than golf include flying, water skiing, and bowling.

Industry Push Revived With SBA Loan OK

The Eastland Industrial Foundation Fund-Drive has been re-emphasized this week with the announcement by Cong. Omar Burleson & Sen. John Tower that the Small Business Administration has approved a loan of \$99,000 to the Foundation in conjunction with Aztec Mobile Home Corp.

This money to buy land, build a plant and major equipment for Aztec and in effect SBA will guarantee the \$99,000 or 90 per cent bank financing in the project. Aztec is the first industry to be located at the new Eastland Industrial Park located on the Airport property north of Eastland.

Construction of the large plant is nearing completion at this time. Local people are investing some \$30,000 in the development of the Park — providing water, sewer and road way facilities at the Park location. Fund Drive Chairman Jay Staggs, reports \$13,000 in cash and pledges amounting to \$5,000, has been secured. He emphasized the need of new pledges and donations as expenditures have already exceeded \$20,000. He stated that local money spent in the Industrial Park is an investment that will come back to all many times in the future as more people are employed and larger payrolls received.

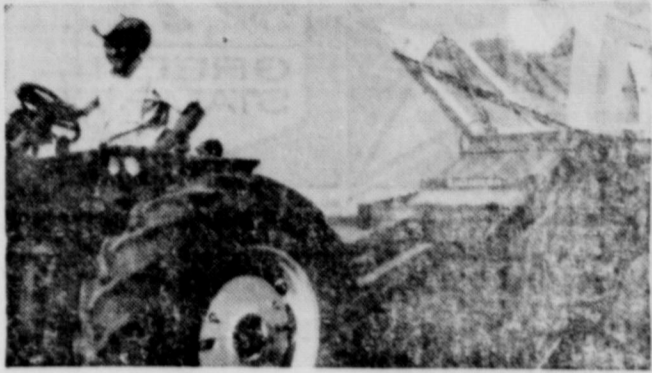

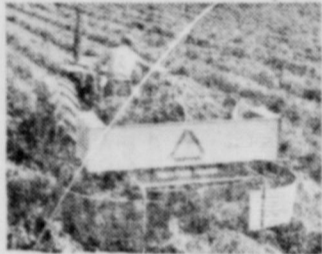

Norman Rhodes, Eastland home town favorite came through Sunday afternoon to win the annual Lone Cedar Country Club Invitational Golf Tournament Sunday by a margin of two strokes.

Rhodes survived a field of 74 golfers and a pressing challenge by Abilene's Wayne Jowers and aggressive Larry Smith of Cisco to take the title, field last year by Roy Pearson of Ranger, with a 75 in the final round, making his 36-hole total 145.

Smith finished the course with a 147 total, tying with Wayne Jowers of Abilene, who also shot a tournament 147.

The 22-year-old Rhodes, a student in North Texas Uni-

versity, really won his title with a hot first round par 70, enabling him to survive last round challenges by Smith and Jowers despite a 75 card in the final round championship play. He had trouble with his driver during the closing round.

Pearson, last year's titlist, managed 150.

Smith finished with a 74 while Jowers, an Abilene fireman who began the final nine with three birdies, carded a 73 in the last round.

Then in a one-hole play-off, Smith birdied the first hole to take the tournament run-up spot.

Rhodes, the winner, played the 5,900-yard course Sunday without a birdie. A birdie

\$253,000 Government funds Okayed for County Projects

Key financing by government agencies affecting projects and institutions in Eastland County has been approved according to information here this week.

The Small Business Administration has approved a \$110,000 loan to Eastland Industrial Corp., for assisting build facilities for Aztec Mobile Homes, according to Sen. John Tower. The SBA is loaning 95 per cent of the total \$122,250 project which is to provide 100 new jobs, it was said.

The Industrial Foundation is building the building and

leasing the facilities to the mobil home builder on a 20-year lease.

The Farmers Home Administration has approved a loan of \$130,000 to the City of Carbon for installation of a water system to serve 110 homes, according to word from Cong. Omar Burleson. The loan is for 40 years at 5 per cent interest. Water will be bought from the City of Eastland.

A \$13,652 supplementary college work study award has been granted to Ranger Junior College for 37 students, according to Cong. Burleson.

Low Income Farmers Must File For Social Security

Are you a member of farmers in the Abilene area who are not getting social security credit for their earnings? R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager, said today that some farmers do not file tax returns because they don't earn enough to owe income tax.

These farmers are losing social security protection that they will need someday — or that their families may need tomorrow.

Tuley said even if a self-employed farmer does not have enough income to owe income tax, he still needs to file a tax return in order to receive social security credits.

If a farmer's gross profit is \$600 or more and his net profit is \$400 or more, the law says he must report his income for social security and pay the social security tax on his net earnings, Tuley pointed out.

If he has a net profit of less than \$400, or even a loss, but had a gross profit of at least \$600, he may file, using what is known as the optional method, and receive social security credits for his earnings.

Under the optional method of filing, Tuley said, a farmer whose gross profit is between \$600 and \$2,400 may report and get social security credit for two-thirds of his gross, regardless of the amount of his net income.

If his gross profit is over \$2,400, but his net is less than \$1,600, he may nevertheless report and get credit for \$1,600.

Tuley said that a farmer who has not reported his earnings for social security has about 3 years to make the report, pay the back taxes due, and get the earnings credit to his social security record.

Early Disability Filing Speeds Claims

"Claims for social security disability benefits should be filed early," R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security manager stated. They take a bit longer to process than most retirement and death claims, since the medical evidence in each case must be evaluated in detail to determine whether or not the disability is severe enough to meet the requirements of the law, he explained.

Persons having disability which will prohibit their working or 12 months or more ought to apply for benefits as soon as possible. Since disability payments can begin no earlier than the seventh month after the disability began, a disabled worker has six months in which to apply before any checks are due.

"The earlier the claim is filed, the more time you and the claims specialists have to get all the necessary facts to pay the claim," Tuley emphasized.

He urged any worker who might qualify for such benefits to check with the social security office at Room 2321 of the Federal Building, Abilene, as soon as possible.

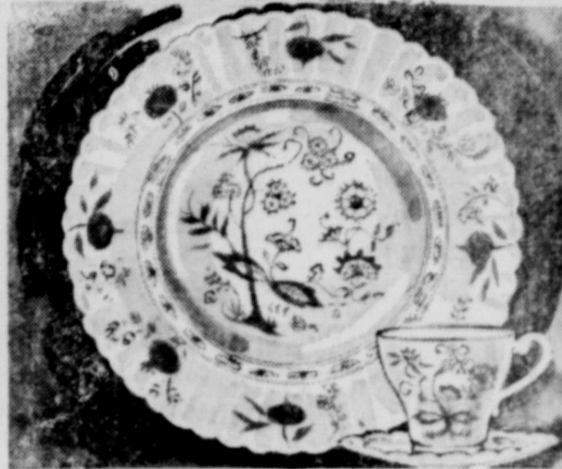

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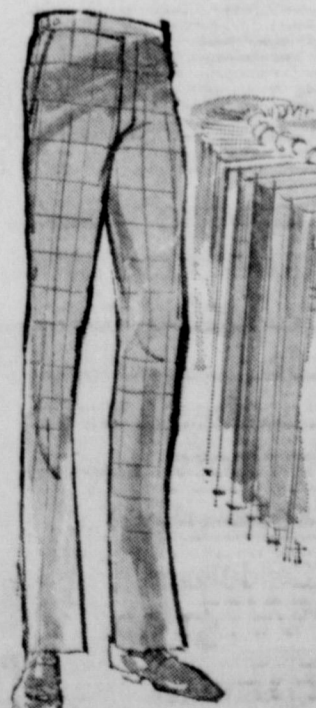
