Entries may include such items as quilting, knitting, crochet, ceramics, oil and water color paintings, handmade decorative items for the home, wood craft items, and any other miscellaneous items. Display items requiring special equipment to exhibit them, such as an easel, etc, exhibitors are asked to bring their own.
