IdBits Opens Season

LOCAL VOTERS will decide on Thursday, June 5, if Eastland is to have the additional one-cent sales tax. The state presently collects a three-per cent tax and most cities in Texas have already added the 4th cent as a means of increasing revenue to operate city facilities. Eastland hasn't had the local portion, but it is now being recommended because the city needs it for present & coming needs. If passed, the new tax would be on the same items as now taxed by the state on the 3 per cent basis. Other games will The same items would be tax- Cisco Panthers vs. Eastland ed and the same items would Blue Sox; Cisco Cats vs. Ranbe exempted. The rate would just be increased. (You remember, the state's first sales first game. tax was for two per cent, which was upped to three).

THE KEY numbers to remember under the four-per cent rate is 13, 38, 63 and 88. If the cost of a taxable item is 13 cents through 37 cents, the tax rate ig one cent; if the cost is 38 through 62 cents, the tax is two cents, the cost is 63 hrough 87 cents, the tax is three cents; if the cost is 88 cents through \$1.12, the tax is (Continued on Page 6)

The manhunt, just north of Eastland continued and was being intensified Wednesday as an Army of lawmen search for the three Eastland County Jail escapees - one of whom has vowed: "I'll never be ta-

"A good trail" was reported by a lawman early Wednesday, commenting on the use of bloodhounds in connection with aerial surveillance in the gigantic search for the trio of convicted hoods who broke out of jail Tuesday.

The search began after the three knocked Sheriff L. E. Sublett unconscious and fled n his radio and arsenal-equip ped car. On horseback, on foot and on every farm road, the search intensified.

Tuesday's break was the second in four days. Officers concentrated their hunt in the area around Eastland Lake after Liuor Control Board Agent L. D. Adams spotted the stolen vehicle abandoned near there on the tributaries of the Leon River. The escapers were known to be armed with a shotgun,

pistols and teargas.

The trio included Harvey Webb, 32, convicted armed robber, rapist and "Clyde" of a "Bonnie and Clyde" gang. He told his Eastland court-appointed attorney here after his recent conviction in which he got 75 years in the state pen: "If I ever get my feet on the ground again, they'll never bring me back alive. I may go to a funeral home, but I'm not going back to jail."

The other two escapees are Wayne Baird, 18, of Abilene and Donald Gene Richardson, 22. of Sweetwater, who were convicted in 91st District ourt Tuesday morning. Baird got nine years for burglary and Richardson, seven years for felony theft.

Baird was convicted for the burglary of the Housing Authorty in Cisco.





THE VOICE OF THE TURTLE

(An Editorial) "The time has come," the turtle said, "to talk of many

Like climbing out of our complacent shell, perhaps. Five men have busted (BUSTED) out of County Jail here this week, and a county official was injured. Other lives were in danger. A dangerous manhunt ensued.

One of the breaks was by stealth and the other by brute force. In either case, had things gone differently, even the slightest, there could have been some people killed. Neither of the escapees were jay-walkers.

It might be foolish to lock the barn after the horse is gone - BUT. Some are saying "We need a new jail." (The first

escapers punched a hole through the roof with a broom handle). Perhaps we do need a new jail - but there are some other things we need before we get it.

For one thing we need to quit keeping prisoners in the one we've got so long. The two who busted out Sunday were put in jail in January, had been indicted, but had not even been arraigned in court, must less tried. Sure tney were tried in another county one day and returned here, They were imprisoned for at least five months went men, under out laws, for their indicted crime in this county. The Constitution guarantees a speedy trial. Our court isn't that flooded with cases and this 1898 jail wasn't built to hold a man that long.

In the second break, one of the men had been sentenced to 75 years in this county. He was being held, be-fore being transferred to the penitentiary, "To see if

any other counties wanted him . . . "
And another thing we need before we get a new jail, is more officers in the sheriff's department. The County Commissioners' Court has turned deaf ears to repeated pleas for more deputies. The Sheriff's Department could have easily been wiped out Tuesday.

As a John Doe citizen you get kinda tired of wondering if some hood is going to break your back door down

But let's not point fingers. Really, whose fault is it? Yours . . , and mine. We get no better than we demand. If we're serious about more vigorous prosecution of criminals, swifter movements of prisoners into and out of our antique jail, and an adequate sheriff's department, we're going to have to be heard.

The wheel that squeaks the loudest gets the grease. If we're ever going to change Eastland County's image as a joke on justice, we'd better start squeaking to our Commissioners, in our grand juries, and to our judges. We're going to get no better than what we
