## Kay Hoffmann Is Sweetheart; Frank Claborn Star Farmer

Two Eastland students received top honors at the Future Farmers of America's Area IV Convention in Stephenville Friday and Saturday.

Kay Hoffmann, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hoffman, was elected Area IV Sweetheart at the banquet on Friday night, and Frank Claborn was elected Area IV Star Chapter Farmer at the meeting on Saturday.

Timbers District Sweetheart, is completing her sophomore year at Eastland High School where she is president of the Double-7 Club. She was runner-up for Pecan Queen in the fall.

As the sweetheart of one of Texas' 10 areas, she is now a nominee for the title of State FFA Sweetheart.

Claborn's honor, which names him as the top second-year vocational agriculture student in the 24-county area, competed with others on the basis of leadership, project programs documented with record books, and participation in livestock show and judging contests.

Eddie Blair, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Blair, and Jeff Germany, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Germany, received approval at the area level of their applications for the title of Lone Star Farmer.

Each presented with his application three years of record books showing total profits in excess of the required \$500.00.

Germany was elected an Area IV vice-president. He will serve under the presidency of Carter Housel of Rising Star.

Claborn's election resulted in part from a project program which included 73 Shropshire and Southdown sheep, 36 lambs, 9 beef cows, 8 calves, 24 goats, 10 kids, 50

## Absentee Vote On New 1c Tax Begins Friday

Absentee voting on the one percent local tax question will open Friday, May 16, at the City Hall, and will continue until May 30.

The election will be held at the City Hall Thursday, June 5.

City Commissioners called the election May 5 after a special committee appointed by Mayor Frank Deaton recommended the tax as the best way to raise additional revenue needed for higher salaries and materials.

The one percent local tax would be collected in addition to the three percent state tax already in effect.

Hardy Dee Warren, 72, died at 3 a.m. Tuesday in Eastland Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient five weeks.

Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

Born Sept. 10, 1896 in Mississippi, he had formerly worked for the City of Eastland. He lived in Eastland 39 years, moving here from Fort Worth. He was self-employed for a number of years before he retired about three years ago. He married Alberta Pryor on Dec. 8, 1917, in Mount Calm.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church. Survivors include four sons, H. D. Jr. of Wichita Falls, Bobby W. of Fort Worth, Benjie C. of Abilene and Terry D. of Levelland; three daughters, Mrs. Faye Rainer of Dallas, Mrs. Margie Butler and Mrs. Nelda McDuffey, both of Midland; one sister, Mrs. Maudie Davis of Hobbs, N.M.; three brothers, Raymond of Longview, Auton of Odessa & Elwood of Teague; 15 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

## Dr. James H. Caton Buried Here Monday

Dr. James H. Caton Jr., 90, died at 8 a.m. Sunday in Eastland Memorial Hospital after a two-year illness.

Funeral was held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Arrington Hamner Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Eugene Williams, pastor of the First Christian Church officiating.

Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

A longtime physician and civic leader, Dr. Caton was born in a log cabin in Red River County nine miles west of Clarksville, December 27, 1878. He was the son of the late James H. and Mary Sue Chambers Caton. The Caton Community near Clarksville was named for his family.

He worked after school for his father, who had a farm and a cotton gin.

He first practiced medicine in the Caton Community. In 1898, fifteen years before he got his first car, Dr. Caton often made long trips horseback to visit the sick.

He moved to Breckenridge and then to Detroit, where he was living when he entered the army in World War I. He served as a first lieutenant in the medical corps.

In 1902, he married Miss Annie Whitener of Detroit. She died in Breckenridge in 1905. In 1908, he married Miss Jessie Talbot of Montgomery City, Missouri. They had two children, David, who died when he was nine months old, and Nell, who lives in Dallas. Mrs. Jessie Caton died in 1952.

Dr. Caton moved to Eastland in 1919 and practiced medicine here until his retirement, August 1, 1955. He joined the Christian Church when he was 16 years old.

He became a member of the Rotary Club in 1923, the Knights of Pythias in 1899, and the Masonic Lodge in 1906. He was a member of the Eastland Masonic Lodge 467, in which he was a 32nd Degree Mason. He was a member of the Hellah Temple

Shrine, Dallas Consistory; charter member of the Eastland American Legion; state and Southern Medical Associations; Railroad Surgeons of America; Radiological Society of Texas, Academy of General Practitioners, First Christian Church and the Men's Fellowship Bible Class.

He was a graduate of the Louisville School of Medicine at Louisville Kentucky.

He was a past president of Eastland Rotary Club and former member of the Eastland school board.

Survivors include his daughter, Miss Nell Caton of Dallas; a sister, Mrs. Katherine Bailey of Dallas; a brother, Dr. McKee Caton of McAllen; and a number of nieces and nephews.

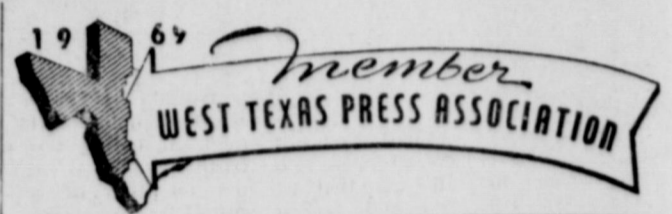

## LEGAL NOTICE

An Ordinance Ordering A Special Election To Be Held In The City Of Eastland, Texas, On The Question Of The Adoption Of A One Percent (1%) Local Sales And Use Tax Within The City; Designating The Day Of The Election And The Polling Place; Appointing Election Officials Therefor; Providing That All Duly Qualified Resident Electors Shall Be Qualified To Vote; Prescribing Form Of Ballot; Providing For Notice Of Election And Containing Other Provisions Relating To Said Election; Providing For Severability; And Declaring An Emergency.

Be It Ordained By The City Of Eastland, Texas:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Eastland, Texas, on the 5th day of June, 1969, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"For adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City and the

officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

City Hall  
Presiding Officers:  
Presiding Judge — Milton Underwood  
Alternate Presiding Judge — Hoover Pittman  
The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Eastland, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

For adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement, or proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the City not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Eastland Telegram is a newspaper published within the City of Eastland, Texas and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.

Section 7. If any provision of this ordinance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions of such ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared severable.

Section 8. Whereas, the City Charter of the City of Eastland, Texas provides that an ordinance providing for election may be passed as an emergency measure and if the local sales and use tax will be

collected on behalf of the City for the fourth quarter of 1969 unless all procedures required under said Article 1066c have been complied with prior to the beginning of the third quarter of 1969, receipts from which tax for such fourth quarter are needed for the benefit of the public property of said City, an emergency as defined in such City Charter is created, necessitating that this ordinance become effective at once, and it is accordingly ordained that this ordinance become effective immediately upon its passage in such cases is made and provided by the charter of the City of Eastland.

# Newest Gorman Hospital Bill Will Provide for 3 Elections

## In Desdemona, Carbon, Gorman

A unique bill by State Rep. Burke Musgrove was passed by the House of Representatives Thursday for a hospital district in South Eastland County and a portion of Comanche County. The Texas Constitution permits the Legislature to authorize an election to be held to create a hospital district and before it can be effective, the proposal must receive a majority of the votes cast by qualified property taxpayers voting in the desired district.

proponents of a public hospital facility to grant this authorization for an election, opposition developed primarily in the Desdemona and Carbon areas to the inclusion of these two areas in the hospital district. Opponents contended that Gorman could out-vote the smaller areas of Carbon and Desdemona and therefore force their taxable properties to be included in the proposed district if the election were held district-wide.

"The bill as passed," Musgrove said, "provides for the fairest solution to resolving the disagreement that has arisen over the formation of a hospital district in South Eastland County."

Musgrove explained that after he was called upon by

ate. If the commissioners courts see fit to call an immediate election in accordance with the act, there will be time for the elections to be held prior to this year's application deadline so that the district, if established, would have time to apply for Hill-Burton funds," Musgrove predicted.

The bill calls for the Commissioners Courts to appoint the original hospital district board of directors and succeeding boards will be elected.

At the same election to create the hospital district, the voters will be given the opportunity to authorize a tax not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 of assessed valuation to financially secure the district.

"The bill also restricts the hospital district from assuming any indebtedness or obligations incurred by existing hospital facilities," Musgrove added.

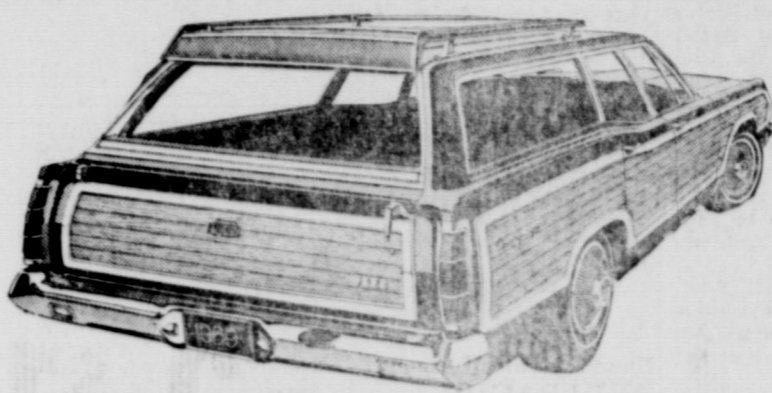

Also receiving 5 points named to the State Democratic Executive Committee at the party convention are Jerry Bloodworth, Ross Caults, Larry Steele, Max Colburn, and Mike Willis.

Each student in a government or history class who voted for Cook will receive an additional 10 points on his final.

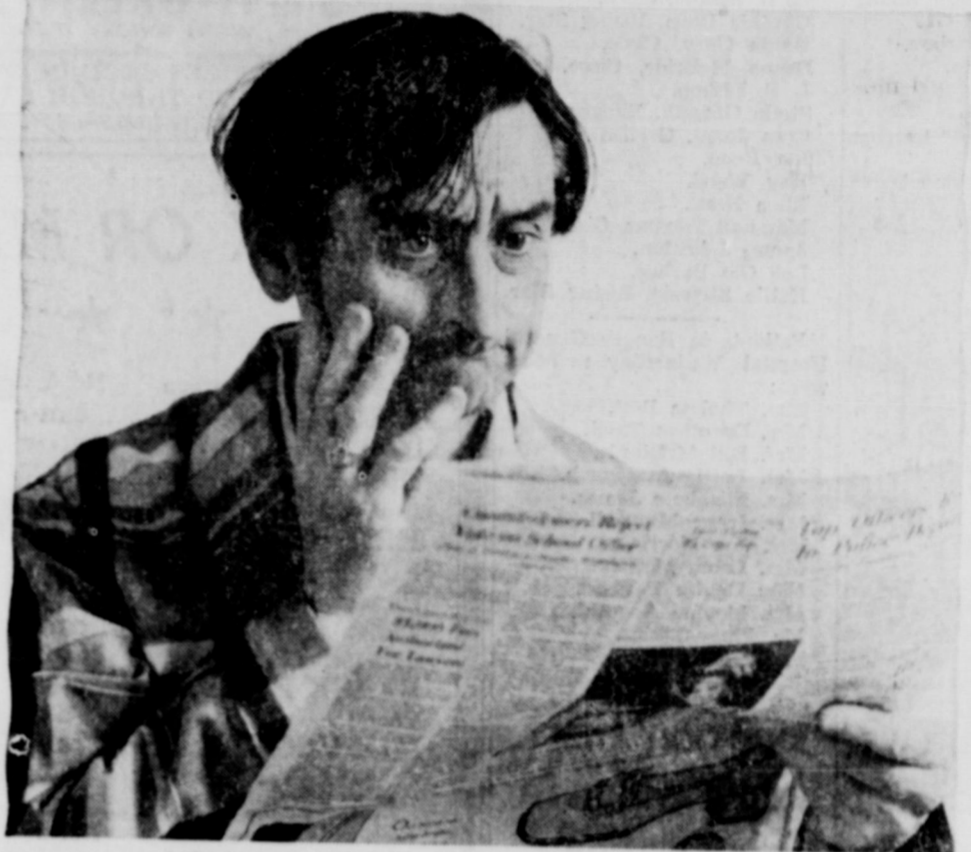

## \$375,000 Month Paid 5,013 In Eastland County by SS Agency

A record of \$375,000 in monthly social security benefits was being paid to 5,013 residents of Eastland County at the end of Dec. 1968, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for Social Security. This compares to \$363,000 to 4,902 persons for Feb., 1968, the month the 15 per cent rate

in the 1967 Amendments became effective.

In Eastland County, 703 people under 60 are receiving benefits. That figure breaks down into 340 under 13, 74, 18-21, and some 294, 22-59. It may be surprising to some that of beneficiaries in the over 60 bracket there are 2,419 women and only 1,866 men in this County.

Many students would have been unable to continue their educations were it not for the 1965 Amendments to the Social Security Act extending survivors and dependents insurance benefits to students until their 22nd birthdays.

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies leaving a widow and two or more children range from \$82.50 to \$434.40 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security. Such payments often have a potential total as much as \$25,000 to \$100,000 and more.
