NATIVE WRITES OF LONDON

(Editor's note: This is a letter Mrs. T. E. Castleberry received from her granddaughter, Mrs. J. D. Loggins of Upton, England. Mrs. Loggins is the former Miss Donna Rapp.) Dear Grandmother,

We are about sixty miles from London and about four miles from the Alconbury Royal Air Force, where J. D. works.

The sun is shining brightly this afternoon. You don't see the sun very often here. The nights and early mornings are cold, and one needs one or two blankets at night.

It really is damp over here. Our salt shaker is all stopped up. Crackers get soft in only a few days.

I can't get used to everyone driving on the right side of the road.

Most of the women here wear their skirts shorter than they do in the states. Here they dress up when they go to town, none of them wear slacks, and most wear heels. They use a lot of make-up at night, but almost none in the day-time. Women here have nice complexions.

Last Sunday, November 10, we rode the train to London, 60 miles away. It took us two and a half hours, because of so many stops at towns along the way. We arrived about 10:30 a. m., went to Petticoat Lane, where they have a very large sale, like the market in Wetherford, Texas. We were told it takes up about six or seven square blocks. We stayed here till about 2 p. m. and went down to Dover, which took about four hours. Next morning, we took a taxi and drove around. We visited Dover Castle. It is huge so we only went in the main building, which is called "the kee."

We were told it would take two or three days to go over the whole castle. It was said to be at least 700 years old. We saw the White Cliffs and Shakespeare's Mount.

I miss the United States. I miss the drive-in restaurants, where you can go just anytime of the day and get a "good ole hamburger and coke". They have no drive-ins here. Also they don't have grocery stores that stay open late at night. Their groceries close about 8:30 p. m. at the latest and the large grocery stores close about 5:30 p. m.

Their restaurants serve meals at regular hours only. 7 to 9 a. m.; 1 to 2 p. m.; and 6 to 8 p. m.

If you ask for something between these hours, they will serve you tea or coffee and a snack.

You don't see teenagers with cars over here. They ride bicycles or motorcycles. One reason is they can't afford cars and another reason is that gas-

"We are glad to announce that we have reached the \$4,000 figure in our goal to raise \$5,000," the committee said. "Realizing that the last thousand dollars may be the most difficult to raise, we want to remind our local people that we are ambitious to go over the top and have a victory celebration Jan 7th, 1969"

Anyone wishing to contribute to the fund was asked to send their checks to Mrs. John H. Shrader of Route 4, Cisco, who is secretary of the Scranton Cemetery Association. The association was organized

last May 22nd by residents of the community with a deep concern for the future of the cemetery, the care of which could become a serious problem and possibly fall into neglect when the faithful ones who have cared for it so long pass on." Plans call for the \$5,000 fund to be used as an endowment. Interest derived from the fund will be used for perpetual care of the cemetery. The Trust Department of the First National Bank of Cisco will handle the fund without charges and invest the principal in government securities.

ON WEAPON REGISTRATION

Anyone having an unregistered machine gun, sawed-off shotgun, short barreled rifle or other gangster-type weapon, or a device such as a bomb, grenade or land mine, may register it with the Internal Revenue Service without penalty from November 2 through December 1, according to B. Frank White, Regional Commissioner, Southwest Region, IRS.

The gun control act of 1968, signed into law last week, establishes a 30-day period for the registration of certain weapons and destructive devices. The registration requirement does not effect ordinary rifles, shotguns, pistols, and revolvers.

The Gun Control Act Law provides that information or evidence submitted in registering a weapon during this period cannot be used against the registrant in any criminal proceeding arising out of a prior or concurrent violation of the law. However, this would not prevent prosecution for furnishing false information.

Firearms and devices covered by the registration requirements must be registered by filing Form 4467, available at the local post office in duplicate, with Director, Alcohol & Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C., 20224.

"Anyone with a weapon to register," White said, "should write or phone an office of the IRS and obtain copy of Form 4467. Weapons and devices should not be brought to IRS offices for the purpose or registration."

Former servicemen should register any automatic weapon, pistol with shoulder stocks, or other national firearms act weapon they might have as a souvenir of their military days.

Anyone with a bomb or grenade should make sure it is de-activated. The IRS can make arrangements to have the device inspected and de-activated.

The registration requirement for gangster-type weapons dates back to the National Firearms Act of 1934. There is no federal registration and revolvers, although certain controls on the sales of these weapons became effective December 16, 1968, as part of the new gun law.

Firearms which must be registered under the act include shotguns with barrels less than 18 inches long, rifles with barrels less than 16 inches long and altered rifles and shotguns with an overall length of less than 26 inches, and as shotguns or rifles cut down to pistol size or shape.

Other firearms covered by the registration requirements: fully automatic guns, such as machine guns and pistols that fire more than one shot by a single function of the trigger, and firearm mufflers or silencers. In addition, registration is required of all weapons or devices, except for conventional pistols or revolvers, which are capable of firing a shot and being concealed on a person and weapons formerly classified as "DEWATS" — de-activated war trophies.

Destructive devices, such as explosives, incendiary or poison gas bombs, grenades, rockets, missiles, mines and certain projectile firing weapons, namely anti-tank guns, bazookas and mortars, also must be registered.

White said anyone who possesses a firearm or destructive device, as defined by National Firearms Act, and who fails to register the weapon between November 2 and December 1 as required by the gun control act, will be subject to imprisonment up to 10 years, a fine up to \$10,000 or both for each weapon not registered. Under certain conditions, the law provides civil penalties and property forfeitures.

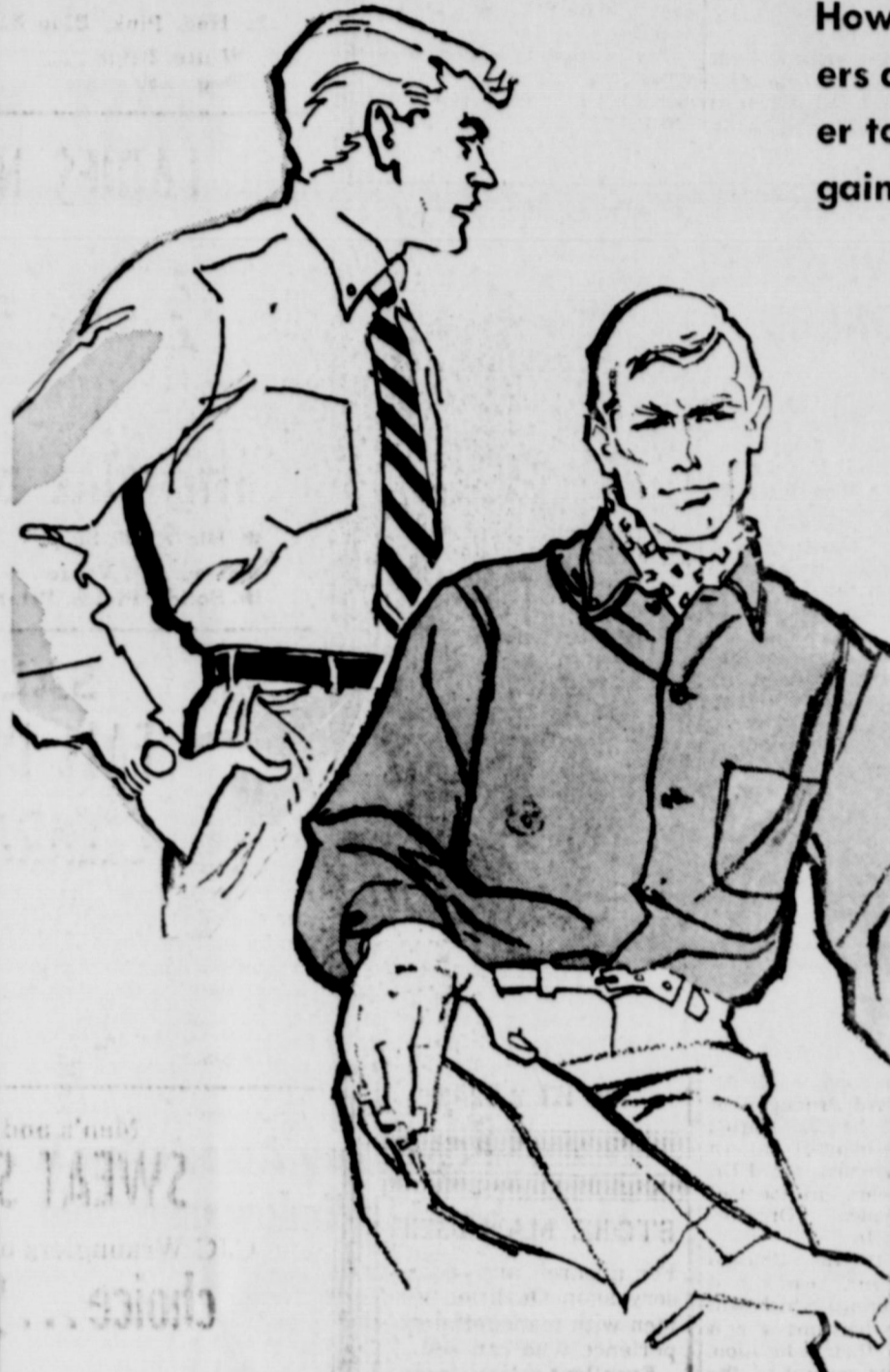

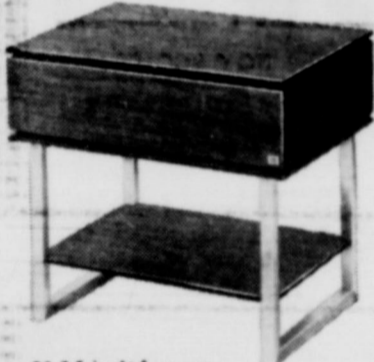

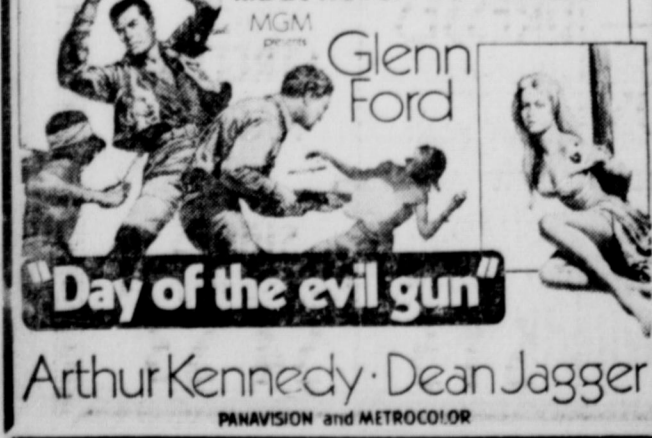

2 County 4-H'ers Go to National Congress Meet

Scores of teenagers from every state are getting ready to attend the 47th National 4-H Congress in Chicago. An estimated 1,650 boys and girls from across the nation will arrive in the Windy City the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Among those who will attend the event, will be Eastland County's own Kathy Kincaid and Bobby Williams.

These two individuals, both 9 year 4-H Club members, will travel, with all expenses paid, to Chicago beginning Thursday November 28 and will return home Saturday December 7. Kathy and Bobby will be traveling with 37 other Texas 4-H'ers to the Congress. Also chaperons will accompany the delegation.

Those attending the Congress have distinguished themselves in some 40 different 4-H categories in their home states. Kathy and Bobby were winners in Santa Fe (over-all achievement) and leadership, respectively. Selection as a congress delegate is based on superior project work. Their accomplishment in citizenship, leadership and personal development also are carefully evaluated.

While in Chicago the youths will hold assemblies to discuss the congress theme: Commitment to Responsibility. A colorful pageant written around this theme will officially open the session on Sunday afternoon, December 1.

According to the Eastland County Extension office, in two half-day sessions in e delegates will hear an address by Senior Editor of Reader's Digest, Charles W. Ferguson; and Judge of the County Court of Philadelphia, Juanita Kidd Stout.

Judge Stout last year was honored as one of eight former 4-H members to receive the national 4-H Alumni Key award. Among other speakers will be Dr. Harold Sponberg, president of Eastern Michigan University, and Dr. Luther S. Roehm, president of Merck Chemical Division, Merck & Co., Inc.

Delegates to the Chicago meeting will see, hear and learn many things which will expand their horizons and contribute to their education. They will tour several of the city's famed museums such as the Science and Industry, Natural History, Aquarium, and the Art Institute.

Entertainment will include a pop concert played by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Arthur Fielder a world renowned conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra. The recently re-

stored Auditorium Theatre will be the setting for still another exciting evening.

The spiritual program centers around the historic Chicago Sunday Evening Club where Bishop John E. Hines of the Episcopal Church, New York City will be guest speaker. Sunday morning the traditional 4-H service will be conducted in Central Church by the Rev. Kenneth Hildebrand.

The Extension office says these two individuals have a momentous week ahead of them. One that they will remember as one of the highlights in their lives.

All entries of 4-H Home Demonstration Club members in the youth and adult divisions of the Bake Show will be sold with proceeds going to the 4-H Council and Home Demonstration Council respectively.

Who can enter the Bake Show (adult and youth divisions), or the centerpiece arrangements division? Any woman or man of youth in Eastland County or adjoining county. All entries will be welcomed, and are due on Friday, December 13 by 11 a. m. when the judging will begin. Ribbons and cash awards will be presented to the top three winners in each division.

The rules and information pertaining to the Bake Show and Centerpiece arrangements are the following:

EASTLAND COUNTY PECAN BAKE SHOW RULES

ADULT DIVISION

1. There shall be five divisions of products with a requirement for each: (a) Pies — must enter one whole pie. (b) Cakes — must enter one whole cake. (c) Candy — must enter at least 8 pieces. (d) Nut bread — must enter one whole loaf. (e) Cookies — must enter at least 8 cookies.

2. All entries must contain Pecans.

3. Anyone, man or woman, may enter products in the show.

4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11 a. m. Friday, December 13, when the judging will begin.

(5.) The three judges will be trained in Home Economics. (6.) Score cards will be used to judge entries in all 5 divisions and cash prizes and ribbons awarded according to score. Cash awards shall be as follows: 1st place, \$2.50; 2nd place, \$1.50; and 3rd place, \$1.00.

7. There will be a Grand Champion and Reserve Champion for the whole show. Cash awards shall be as follows: Champion - \$5.00; Reserve Champion - \$4.00.

8. All entries of Home Demonstration Club members become the property of the bake show to be sold and the proceeds will go to the H.D. Council. All entries, except those of Home Demonstration Club members and the winners must be claimed and removed from the building between 4 p. m. and 5 p. m., December 13, or they will become the property of the bake show to be sold and the proceeds will go to the Home Demonstration Council.

9. Products entered in the bake show, belongs to Home Demonstration Club members and the winners, will be sold, but cannot be taken from the

building until 12:00 - 1:00 p. m. December 14, 1968. The bake show will close shortly after 1:00 p. m., so all products must be claimed no later than 1:00 p. m.

Please bring your products on disposable plates, foil or paper, or piece of stiff cardboard so that there will be no risk of losing cake or pie plates.

YOUTH DIVISION:

1. Any 4-H club member, F.H.A. or F.F.A. or any school age youth may enter the above five divisions. (They will be displayed the same as above, but will be judged separately.)

2. All rules listed above will apply to the youth division.

3. All prizes above will apply to the youth division. (First, Second, Third in all divisions, Grand Champion and Reserve Champion) These prizes will be given in both the adult division and the youth division.

PECAN CENTERPIECE ARRANGEMENTS:

This division will consist of centerpieces and arrangements made from pecans or parts of the pecan plant, such as the leaves. The rules for this show are as follows:

1. There will be three prizes given to the top three entries as follows: First-\$10.00, Second-\$5.00, and Third-\$3.00.

2. All entries must have in the arrangement, pecans or parts of the pecan plant, such as the leaves.

3. Anyone, man or woman, from this county or an adjoining county may enter an arrangement in the show.

4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11:00 a. m. when the judging will begin on December 13.

5. The arrangements must remain in place until noon, Sat.
