A CLIPPING from The Cross Plains Review gives a little history of the Rising Star area, as follows:

Newspaper editors were a fiery breed back around turn of the century.

Neighboring publishers often carried on running feuds and when there were two papers in the same town, the fireworks was not always confined to the printed page.

During those days Rising Star had competing weeklies Publishers were J. W. Whitaker, father of E. P. (Pop) Whitaker, and George Kornegay. The two met in a general store and each grabbed for his pistol. Kornegay was younger and faster. He fired and Whitaker fell dead.

It is ironic that the surviving editor quit the profession and took up the ministry.





Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association of Gorman, Texas proposes a referendum election on September 24, 1969, under provisons of House Bill 764, 61st Legislature on the proposition of whether or not peanut pro-ducers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of \$1.00 per net ton (farmers stock basis) to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 9-man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage t h e production, marketing, and e of peanuts.

The referendum and elecon will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Gor man, Texas before midnight on the date of the election. Any person within this

state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced peanuts for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the pro-posed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days

prior to the election date. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to September 9, 1969, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.
