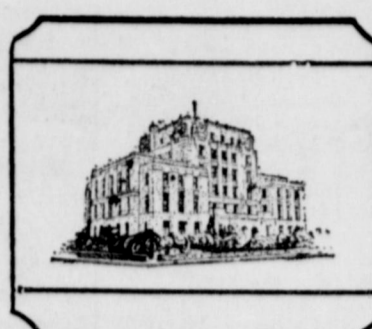

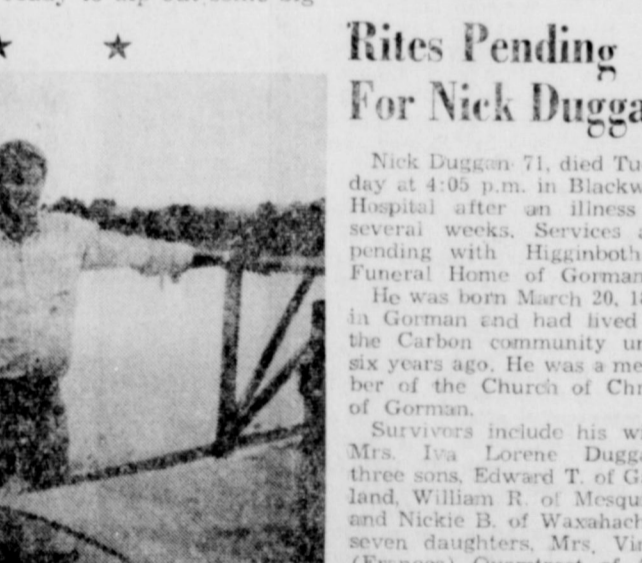

## Eastland Y.C. Helps Organize In Breckenridge

Rickey Alexander of Lubbock, president of the Texas Youth Conference, and Jimmy Sayre, President of the Eastland Youth Conference, met Wednesday with a group of young persons and adults in Breckenridge to discuss organizing a youth conference in Breckenridge.

"We believe a youth conference in Breckenridge would be a meaningful step for this community," Alexander said. "Ideally it will get young people and adults working together, it can replace some of the 'sit across the room and glare at each other' nonaction between the two groups."

Alexander, a May graduate of Lubbock High School, said a typical youth conference involves young persons from many organizations and teaches them community responsibility and leadership in practical settings.

He extended an invitation for local youths to attend the Texas Youth Conference's summer conference July 30-August 2 in Seguin. Some 1,000 young persons and adults will be present for dialogue sessions on current civic and social problems.

Alexander explained that the Texas Youth Conference and local conferences are dedicated to "making youth part of the solution—not part of the problem."

# Monday Rains Break Heat Wave and Benefit Crops

A belt of rainfall extending from north of Cisco to the Brown County line near the May community south of Rising Star, early Monday brought temporary relief from a heat wave and welcome moisture to thirsty pastures and crop lands.

Precipitation measured from two inches north of Cisco to 9-10th of an inch at Rising Star. The May community reported only a sprinkle as the showers faded at that point. The showers covered the western half of the county

and were heartily welcomed by livestockmen and peanut growers whose recently planted crops are beginning to show green in the rows. Although the amount of moisture was less than hoped for, the showers will be a real benefit in setting a good lead of peanuts and reviving pasture grasses, farmers said. The break in the heat wave, which was beginning to do serious damage to soil and plants, will increase the moisture benefit, they said.

## Two Cisco Women Hurt In Wreck; One Critical

Mrs. Bill Childers of Cisco, was in the intensive care ward at Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene in a critical condition Wednesday morning with injuries received in a collision of cars near Morton Valley about 5 p.m. Monday.

Mrs. Paul Farrow, also of Cisco, driver of the automobile in collision with the Childers car, was in Graham Sanitarium under treatment and observation for cuts and other injuries of undetermined extent which she suffered in the accident.

The accident occurred at a depression in the highway according to reports, when the Childers' car, driven by Mr. Childers, was attempting to turn into a residence where a dressmaker for Mrs. Childers lives.

Mrs. Farrow, wife of a Cisco banker, was returning from a visit to Ranger at the time. Mrs. Childers was thrown from the car by the impact. She was taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital and then to Abilene. An emergency tracheotomy was necessary to restore breathing, members of the family said. She is reported to have suffered a concussion, head wounds, a broken jaw and a crushed chest among other injuries.

Mr. Childers received minor injuries. The Childers are a prominent Cisco ranching family. They are the parents of Victor Childers, former principal of the Cisco High School and now superintendent of the Rising Star schools.

A report early Wednesday morning said that Mrs. Childers was still in a critical condition. Visiting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Minton Hanna over the 4th of July holidays were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Basta and their children, Mike and Jim, of Danville, New York.

## Gibson And Huntington Win Lakewood Tourney

Bill Gibson and Paul Huntington, both natives of Pioneer, won the Lakewood Recreation Center partnership golf tournament championship Sunday. The pair registered 194 for the three-day meet. Both grew up at Pioneer and played their first golf on the course which has since been improved into one of the finest 9-hole, 72-par golf resorts in the section. The pair shot a 63 round, four under par, Sunday to take the title. They had led for all three rounds. "This is where we learned to play golf," Gibson said. "Paul and I are both from Pioneer and we began playing here when we were only nine years old. Their performance in the three-day meet reflected their mastery of the 6,018-yard par-72 course. The pair record-

ed rounds of 62-64-68 for a 194, five shots better than their nearest competitors. "We've been driving excellently all three days," explained Gibson, San Antonio, businessman. "Our putting wasn't the same as it has been in the past, though. We missed a lot of chances when we got the ball close to the hole." But they didn't miss enough chances to leave room for anyone to catch them. Jim McAnally and Don Needham fired a 31-34-65 Sunday to jump to second but they were still far off the pace with a 199. Close on their heels were Bill Sikes and Gene Gibson, who carded a 32-33-65 for a 201. Tied for fourth at 204 were Tim Bennie and Ralph Glenn, who shot a 34-35-69 Sunday, and Bill LeMay and Charles Sheppard, who fired a 37-35-72.

## 65 Attend Organizational Meet To Set Up Nursing Home Course

Sixty-five persons from 23 counties were in attendance at the organizational meeting of a new adult course for Nursing Home Administrators held at the Cisco Junior College band hall Thursday evening, July 2. The meeting, concerning the setting up of the new course on the Cisco campus with extensions in Abilene and Brownwood, was conducted by Russell Lyons, CJC's new Technical-Vocational Director. Lyons came to Cisco on June 15 from St. Phillips College in San Antonio, where he held a similar position.

Persons desiring to take the course in either of the three cities must pre-register through the Cisco Junior College Registrar's office no later than July 15. Lyons told the group; and the pre-registration must be accompanied by a \$21 pre-registration fee. The cost of the entire course, to be taught in five sections, is \$130.

Regular registration and beginning of classes will be as follows: Cisco campus, anytime between the present and August 31 for registration, with classes beginning September 1 and held each Tuesday evening from 5:30 to 10:00 p.m.; Abilene, registration at 9:00 a.m. at Hendrick Memorial Hospital, with classes beginning the same day and held each Saturday morning from 7:30 to 12:00 noon; Brownwood, registration Thursday, August 27 at the Brown County Courthouse, with classes to be held each Thursday evening from 5:30 to 10:00 p.m. Lyons said the first meeting for registration at Brownwood would be at 6:30 p.m.

The five sections of the Nursing Home Administrators Course will be: (1) General Administration of the Nursing Home-A; (2) General Administration of the Nursing Home-B; (3) Nursing Home Technology; (4) Personal and Auxiliary Relationships in the Nursing Home; and (5) Financial Management of the Nursing Home.

# For Skillet or Stringer, Fish Farm's Cats Fine

An unexpected outlet for their product has developed, according to the proprietors of Eastland County's new Lake Leon Fish Farm.

Naturally the industrious firm founded by three young, hard-working men expected to sell fresh catfish to the retail and wholesale markets, and they even plan to go into the minnow business later to more-completely utilize every inch of their giant fish farm on the shores of Lake Leon.

But the unexpected outlet developed when an exasperated and unsuccessful lake fisherman came up this week and bought a good mess of fish for his stringer, "you know, just to keep my fishing reputation from sagging," he explained.

The fish farm is located just off the Staff Road, off FM 2214 which circles the lake to the South. Actually the first pond put in, is due north of the Staff Cemetery.

Active in the operation are Fred Williams, Bennie O'Brien and John Sizelan. They've got about a 70-acre tract on a good terrain, and with O'Brien's dozer skills have already constructed and stocked nine ponds. Three more are just about to be filled and stocked. They're planning eventually to get up to about 40 ponds.

The biologists tell them that a pond of some two and three-quarter acres should carry about 2,000 fish per acre.

Ideal depth is from three to five feet. The firm has already opened its retail outlet and reports business brisk. They offer live or dressed fish. Ordinarily they put their product on ice for delivery home, but if the customer insists, they'll put 'em on your stringers.

Channel Catfish farming is booming across the country and appears to be a natural industry for the Lake Leon area. Few feeding programs offers as much gain, but there are pitfalls.

Right now the local fish farm is feeding about a ton of feed a week of floating feed and about as much sinking feed. At about \$169 a ton that adds up to a big feed bill, and the feed is carefully controlled. They weigh the fish in the ponds weekly to determine the amount of feed needed.

The books say that the catfish should gain about a pound for every pound and a half of feed given them. That's assuming a lot of things: assuming the fish eat (which they are doing well now that hot weather is here), and that no undesirable element enters into the picture.

The farm carefully strains all the water which is purchased from the Eastland Water Supply District's Lake Leon source to make sure that unwanted matter (fish eggs, etc.) don't go into the ponds.

Unlike wild fish, the pond-raised fish offer controlled flavor through the diets and the eating is good. The fish now being sold run about a pound or a little over.

The catfish farmers were busy this week filling the new ponds and moving fish from the crowned ponds to new homes.

For skillet or stringer the Fish Farm Cats are A-O.K.

# IT HAS BEEN

Hot weather has been the subject of conversation for the past few weeks. Even with air-conditioned homes and business buildings and churches, electric refrigerators, home freezers and cool electric ranges, we have heard gripes from every corner on how to keep cool. Some of the answers were don't drink iced tea and other cold drinks, stay in the shade, take salt tablets, wear light airy clothing and don't drink beer in the sunshine. These and many more words of advice have been offered.

At the turn of the century only a few people were fortunate enough to own an ice box. And it was rightly named, for it was a small upright piece of furniture made of wood with a small compartment at the top lined with galvanized metal that held from ten to fifteen pounds of ice from the ice factory. In large towns and cities wealthy people had fifty pound capacity boxes. What a luxury! Below the ice chamber was a space with one shelf for keeping food heavenly cool.

There was no such thing as an electric fan. Every window and door were thrown wide open with the hope that a breeze would blow once in a while.

Beds were moved to porches or out under trees in the yard in order to get a wink of sleep during the summer months.

Improvised milk coolers were made in tray form of heavy galvanized tin. These pans were filled with cool water from the well. Milk and butter were set in the pans and covered with cloths wet at intervals to keep milk cool and butter firm.

Ice factories in larger towns ran ice wagons twice daily, making each street. Some housewives bought five and ten cents worth of ice daily while others bought ice only when special company came to visit. For iced tea on Sundays, ten cents worth of ice was bought on Saturday afternoon and wrapped in news papers, clean old blankets or quilts, placed in a washtub and kept until noon on Sunday.

There were no air-conditioned churches or public halls. Church services were held under tabernacles or brush arbors. All women carried palmetto or card board fans to church and kept up a rhythm of fanning throughout the long drawn out service.

Clothing was hot. Women wore two or three heavy domestic petticoats tucked and beruffled with embroidery edging. Corsets and corset covers were a must. Dresses had high collars, close fitting waist lines, long tight sleeves and shirts that swept the floor in length.

Men wore pure wool scratchy pants with long sleeved thick shirts for dress up during the long, hot summer months. Shoes were heavy with high tops. Stockings and socks were long and thick, always black, dark gray or brown in color.

These are only a few of the blessings of by-gone days and why should we ask "How To Keep Cool"?

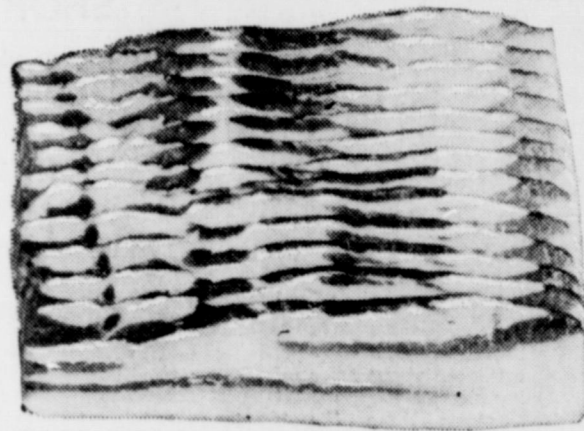
