## Demo Candidates Get Back 65 Percent Of Assessments For Primary

Twenty-six candidates in the democratic party county primaries in May and June were receiving checks this week for what is believed the largest refund ever made on primary assessments in the history of the party in Eastland county.

Checks for 65 percent of the seven per cent assessments were being delivered or mailed by Mrs. Scott Bailey, Cisco, secretary of the party's county executive committee.

Refunds ranged from near \$600 to \$6.50. Assessments for financing the primary campaigns were made on the basis of seven per cent of the annual salary in the office sought.

The largest previous refund

was believed to have been in 1964, when the candidates got back 51 1/2 per cent of what they had paid in assessments. In 1966 they were returned about 50 per cent and in 1968 41 per cent.

The 1970 primary was conducted as one of the most economical in many years.

In return for their administrative work and record-keeping, A. E. Crawley of Ranger, county chairman, and Mrs. Bailey, received only \$51.50 each for the six months they spent at their administrative jobs, it was pointed out.

Mr. Reid has served as mayor for the past few months filling the vacancy which was created by the death of Mr. Frank Deaton. Other officers elected included: Jay Staggs, mayor

The commission agreed to have an engineering firm make a study of the water supply to the Hill Crest Area and gave Lewis Tiner authority to have a city map prepared.

## Ranger Junior College Signs Two Longview Basketball Aces

Two of Longview, Texas High School's top basketball stars recently signed letters of intent with Ranger Junior College, according to Ron Butler, head basketball coach and athletic director for the college.

Bobby Satterwhite, 5'11" and Mike Wyant, 6'3" are considered by many to be two of the state's blue-chip high school grads. "I am happy they decided to attend Ranger Junior College," said coach Butler. "I feel they can furnish the leadership for our team. I understand they were great leaders on the Longview team the last two years."

Satterwhite was a co-captain on last year's team. Both he and Wyant played a big role in Longview's success in their 13AAAA district race. Wyant led the team in scoring with 596 points for a 21.2 point average. He played in 28 games and scored 212 field goals and 172 free throws. Satterwhite had 145 field goals and 108 free throws in 26 games for a total of 398 points and a 15.3 average.

Longview basketball coach Maurice Cook rates Wyant and Satterwhite two of the finest cagers he has coached. "I am happy that the boys will be given an opportunity to play college basketball," he said. "I feel Ranger is gaining two of the top players in the state."

## Travis Winsett Murderer Indicted Monday by County Grand Jury

James Henry Bishop, 32-year-old Ranger construction worker and antique dealer, was indicted Monday by the grand jury for the murder of Ranger farmer Travis Winsett, 52, whose body was found June 27 in a cistern of an abandoned, burned, farm

house five miles from Ranger.

Bishop was charged with murder with malice aforethought in Justice of the Peace M. D. Underwood's court in Ranger July 1.

Bishop was advised of his rights and was taken to the Eastland County jail after being charged.

District Judge Earl Conner Monday set bond for Bishop at \$10,000. Trial date has not been set. Bishop is now in custody in the county jail.

Items have been recovered but Emory Walton, district attorney, declined to identify them.

The district attorney coordinated the investigation on the information supplied by Texas Ranger H. R. Block of Brownwood and Sheriff Sublett. The Volunteer Fire Department of Ranger recovered the body.

The search for Mr. Winsett began on Saturday afternoon, June 27, after his sister, Mrs. Hubert Capps, of Coleman, discovered him missing and reported it to Ranger Police.

District Attorney Emory Walton, Kenneth Brown of

the Ranger Fire Department, and Sheriff Lefty Sublett found Winsett's body after a tip from Ranger Police dispatcher Benny Moseley.

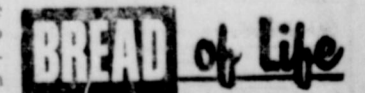
Moseley remembered that the police department log showed the fire department

answered a fire alarm call at the Hathcock farm about 10 p.m. on June 22 at the vacant house where the cistern was located.

Officers theorized Winsett may have been shot late Monday, June 22, basing this on the fact that mail was found in his mailbox on Tuesday.



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

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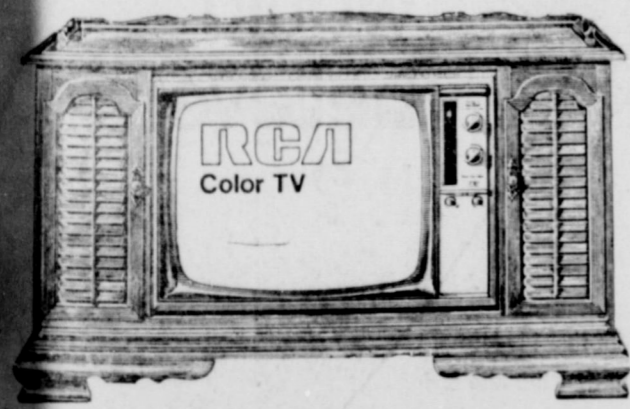

(Editors Note: The following address was delivered at the Oak Cliff Lions Club at a regular noon meeting on Wednesday, June 12, 1968 by the outgoing President David R. Braden. The Oak Cliff Lions Club, with its 435 members, is the second largest Lions Club in the United States.)



Last week as we met to have our Installation Party, a man assumed a station in a kitchen-cum-corridor in Los Angeles. Later that evening he shot and killed a United States Senator — Robert Kennedy — a candidate for the Presidency of this nation!

The next day, as I contemplated this tragic and horrible event, it occurred to me that while attending a pleasant and amusing evening, I had done little then (or in this year for that matter) that you could wrap some serious thought around — I have left that to the guest speaker at this restaurant.

Blackie Sherrod, of the Dallas Times Herald, pointed out in his column of Monday evening that it is time for all those who have a podium to use it; be it a service club, or a sign on the back of a city bus. For two more weeks — this is my soap box, and today I shall use

it in a serious vein! Last I be remembered only as a clown, I would like to remind you today of the motto of Louis International, "Liberty - Intelligence - Our Nation's Safety." It is in that regard that I make this statement. I make it that someone might speak for the COMMON MAN of this nation—

Who leads a common life, Earns a common salary, Has a common ambition, A common dream, And pays common taxes.

I speak to you as the forum of common men everywhere — and as a representative.

All America has been told this past week — over and over again — that we are a sick society.

Gentlemen, I propose to you that I am sick — maybe you are sick too.

### I AM SICK TO DEATH OF BEING TOLD I AM SICK:

By government officials who will not enforce the law . . . By politicians who dance to the tune of minority groups . . . By those in the pulpit and on the college lecture platform who used their office to project the socialist creed of radicals . . .

### I AM SICK TO DEATH OF BEING TOLD I AM SICK:

By idealistic aggressive news reporters and evaluators (of whatever media), who have the audacity to tell me I should believe whatever they believe — knowing I have no vehicle to public-

ly voice my disagreement.

### I AM SICK OF BEING TOLD I AM SICK:

By tuppish entertainers draped in Nehru jackets, feminine necklaces, and a cloak of pseudo intellectualism.

I am sick of cynical attitudes toward patriotism and our American institutions . . .

I am sick of sacrificing the cream of American manhood in political wars we are not fighting to win . . .

I am sick of the decline in integrity and personal honor in this nation . . .

I am sick of the permissive attitude, laxity, and tolerance to pressure groups and the criminal element that is bringing this nation to its knees in lawlessness . . .

I am sick of seeing law enforcement agencies and the laws of this nation emasculated by the Supreme Court and administrators who make their personal creeds the law of the land . . .

I am sick of dirty, unwashed, foul-mouthed — whether you call them hippies, beatniks, or pseudo poor people . . .

I am sick of not being able to take my family to a movie because it is loaded with extraneous offensive matter whose only purpose is to shock . . .

I am sick of seeing the same phrases in the popular literature of the day that I see scrawled on the walls of public toilets . . .

I am sick of so-called edu-

cators and leaders too weakened themselves to understand the value of discipline in the character of a man . . .

I am sick of Congress which legislates out of emotionalism rather than reason, thereby taking away the rights of all . . .

I am sick of being told I am sick with violence because of assassinations by mentally deranged men, fed on a steady diet of violence and perversion and movies — all condoned — even aided — by courts which permit license in the name of freedom . . .

I am sick of riots, of marches, and those who force themselves and their ideologies down my throat without qualification . . .

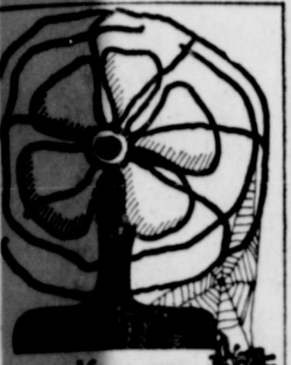

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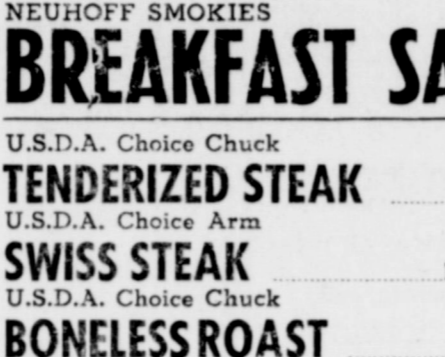

# Trees, Shrubbery Are Revealed As Noise Reducing Plantings

Noise, when excessive, may be classed as environmental pollution, according to Professor David I. Cook, who is heading up the noise abatement project at the University of Nebraska. Nursemen and landscape architects have for years used evergreen shrubs and grass for beautification without special claims for their noise reducing qualities.

A Department of Agriculture study that is well into its third year indicates that noise can be reduced by 65% when trees and grass are used as barriers, John Lee of the Soil Conservation Service at Rising Star, points out. Planting of evergreen shrubs and trees in wide belts with grass in between is found to give more favorable control of unwanted noise, Lee said.

Research is not yet conclusive on the ideal spacing of tall and low growing evergreens for optimum reduction of unwanted noise. The ever increasing public attention being given to industrial and outright "proper noise" should prompt continued research on the subject for more detailed specification for use by resource conservationists in planning noise programs, Lee predicts. Grass, trees, and shrubs have been widely used for conservation treatment for wind erosion control shelter belts for wildlife and domestic livestock, rural and urban beautification and various other farm and ranch uses. With the newly recognized problem of noise as one

of the more pressing environmental problems of our day, the plant kingdom will no doubt be brought to the forefront for solving more "people problems" in the years ahead. Carefully planned noise abatement plantings of evergreen trees and shrubs along the more heavily traveled highways, air lanes, recreational areas, and industrial centers will lead to other significant uses for nursery stock in total resource planning, he added.

Two entomologists from Texas A&M, Phil Hammon and J. W. Smith, will be here to discuss the corn borer and its control.

Farmers who cannot attend either of these meetings may attend the meeting in DeLeon Friday at 8 a.m. These groups will meet at the football field before going out to the peanut field.

## IT HAS BEEN

Forty-five years ago women's styles were before the public for comment and criticism. Mrs. Carolyn H. Radnor Lewis a representative for a famous silk house in New York City stated that women are going to continue abbreviations in the clothing line." She said "women's growing emancipation from clothes will reach its summit in the summer of 1925."

Dictates of fashion said, "two pounds of raiment will clothe a woman, and half of that will be her shoes."

The average ensemble for a woman consists of one step-in, two ounces; one brassiere, one ounce; one pair of sheer hose, two ounces, gown six ounces, and pair of shoes, one pound and a hat, five ounces.

Sheer fabrics were the favored ones. Indestructible chiffons, voiles and georgettes, nets and other light weight materials were in vogue.

In conclusion the fashionist stated, "What we lose below the knee, is made up around the neck and arms. Sleeves will be long and necks high and close fitting."

The same year farmers resolved to plant no cotton, because from the knees to the waist women would demand scanty cotton material and from the waist up it would be less.

Texas farmers were advised to look over the fashion magazines every winter and early spring, and plant cotton accordingly.

At a meeting of the City

Council in Rising Star on September 13, 1925, an ordinance was passed prohibiting the distribution of large circulars, mailing cards on streets and littering up the streets.

Article 143, read: "It shall be unlawful for any one to stick, post, brand or stamp, or put upon the pavement or any public or private place in the city any written or printed advertisement, bills notices or pictures without consent of owner or property party."

Article 144: Anyone who violates any of the foregoing section, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction in the corporation court shall be fined not less than \$5 or more than \$100.

"Handbills 6x9 or 9x12 can be passed out legally but not nailed on poles or tacked up on buildings. Big circulars must not be placed in parked cars. And must not be pitched out of the cars onto the streets by owners of cars when found there."

Local merchants had not been guilty of this practice but merchants of other towns had regularly flooded Rising Star with big circulars and other printed matter. When scattered over town not only created an unsightly scene but became a fire hazard as well.

An ordinance was also passed to prohibit speling by megaphone or otherwise on the streets of Rising Star. This ordinance was rigidly enforced.
