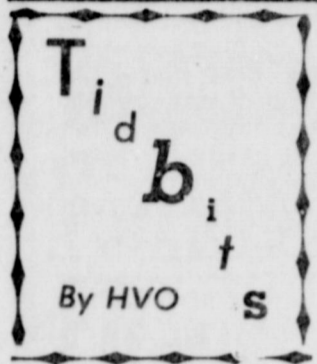

Survivors are his wife of Eastland; one sister, Mrs. Whans Lunsman of Hallettsville; two nephews and two great-nephews.

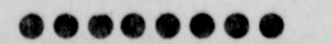
Carl Garrett Is RJC Official

Kokomo, as I Remember it in 1902

My father, who was interested in everything, past, present, and future, asked Mrs. Comer if Kokomo had been named for Kokomo, Indiana. She replied, that when they sent in an application to the government for a post office, they asked that it be named Comerville. The reply was that there was already a Comerville in Texas. They were asked to suggest another name.

Just before 1902, my parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Johnson moved to Eastland County after spending most of their lives in Cooke County.

We lived on the Eastland, Kokomo, Gorman Road. We got our mail at Kokomo, which then, was just a wide, wide place in the road.

On the north side of the road was a building or two. One was a tiny post office.

Mr. and Mrs. Comer had a grocery store on the South side of the road. Mrs. Comer had a studio in the store. Many people today have photographs of members of their family, taken in her little studio.

Soon, Mr. and Mrs. Miney Wheeler put in a general mercantile store on East side of the square.

The Comers then requested that a name be suggested that was not in use in Texas.

The name Kokomo was then suggested. Everyone seemed pleased, and it's been Kokomo ever since.

Kokomo, Indiana, was named for an Indian Chief, who was head of a small tribe of Kokomo, Indiana.

My father priced some of the farm land around Kokomo. Some of it could be bought for

\$8.00 per acre, some for \$12.00 and \$15.00 per acre, depending on the improvements, location and the distance from school.

Of course, that was before King Cotton had been replaced by the lowly peanut as a money crop.

The Simpson Cemetery even then was considered old. And even then, people came from miles around, every spring to clean off the graves, and the grounds. Old neighbors and friends spent the day working and visiting with each other. Dinner was spread in the shade of the trees and enjoyed by all.

Recently, with friends, I visited the Simpson Cemetery, and I think it is one of the cleanest and one of the prettiest I have ever seen.

In the summer of 1902 there was a summer school of two months, taught at Kokomo. The teachers were Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Mullings of Gorman. They lived in a house by Mrs.

Tauner. Miss Ida Tauner helped her mother care for the Mullings baby. Sad to say, the little boy died the next summer.

The school building, as I remember, was a long room east and west with a curtain to divide the room in two, as needed. Drinking water was carried in by the bucket fuls, by a couple of boys. A bucket of water in each room and a dipper in each bucket.

In the east school yard were three grave stones, very near the public road running east and west.

Mr. and Mrs. Mullings were both good teachers. The thing I remember most about them is that he was partial to the girls while she favored the boys. Three fourths of the girls preferred Mr. Mullings, and the boys were partial to his wife.

In those days the second Sunday in May was called

"Children's Day" and every community observed it as such, until a few years later when the second Sunday in May became "Mother's Day", nationally! There was no "Children's Day Celebrations."

In 1903 there was a children's Day program at Kokomo. Men brought their families to the lovely affair. They came in wagons, carriages, surrey buggies and horse back.

There were many little girls, dressed in white, with red paper sashes and bows, little boys were dressed in white with little red caps made of the same paper.

There were marches, drills, tabloid dialogues and music. There were also special songs by the children and talks by the grown-ups.

Everything was a delight to the eye and to the ear.

After a basket-lunch was spread and enjoyed by all, there was more music, songs and speeches. The women and girls were beautifully dressed, though maybe not too comfortably. High collars, long sleeves, tiny waists and long skirts were the vogue thought.

Many of the tailored collars were interlined with fine mesh wire, or one might use three inch width ribbon wrapped around the neck with a large bow in front or at the side. The sleeves reached the hand, the bishop sleeve was new at that time. The favorite waist-measure, 24 inches, which took some doing to achieve.

Drop yokes, sashes and bows were seen a great deal, sometimes the long streamers of the sash were knotted prettily in several places.

Pretty white blouses were worn with black taffeta gored skirts, worn over three pet-

ticoats, the third one had four or five taffeta ruffles that would rustle as the wearer walked, and swish with every step.

Rats were worn in the hair. Hats were broad brimmed, trimmed with flowers and ribbons.

The Eastland County Singing Convention met at Kokomo every now and then, as they do now. But it attracted much more attention because there wasn't as much else to go to.

Kokomo had a group of good singers, then as now. Bud Warren, well known singer and singing teacher, grew up in Kokomo.

About the turn of the Century a popular young doctor, Ott Earnest, came to Kokomo and practiced medicine the rest of his life.

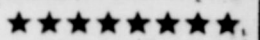
One day my father came in from the pasture and said, "The Mollie Bailey Show is on the road, coming this way." Our house was back a short distance from the road. My younger sister and I scampered down through the skinnery. We

stepped behind some tall bushes. We could see every thing that passed but we could not be seen.

We saw the arrival in cages on wheels. Lions, tigers, panthers, wild cats, coyotes, monkeys, bears, coons, large birds, parrots, beautiful horses, dogs and every thing that goes with a circus. There were three elephants marching down the country road, in single file, the Papa Elephant in the lead, the Mama Elephant and the Baby elephant, leaving their large tracks in the dusty road.

There were women in the carriages, casually dressed, with painted faces and outlandish hair-dos. We saw two clowns dressed and painted for the part. But they did not know they had an audience, therefore they were as dumb as a statue.

I wonder how many others remember the summer school at Kokomo in 1902.

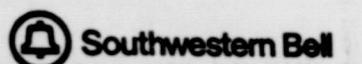
Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

Effective September 1, the charges for long distance calls within the State of Texas will be changed as follows:

- Rates will be reduced on most station-to-station calls dialed direct, without any operator assistance.*
- New one-minute initial period calls will be introduced, at low night rates, for station-to-station calls dialed direct without operator assistance between 11 p.m. and 8 a.m.* This will make it possible to call anywhere in Texas for 22¢ or less.
- Time periods when the various customer dialed rates are effective will be the same as those for interstate calls.
- Rates will be increased on all person-to-person and station-to-station calls requiring operator assistance in any way, except as noted below.*

*Where direct dialing is not available, the customer dialed rate will be charged for station-to-station calls from non-coin phones, on which the caller furnishes the area code and number, and the call is charged to the telephone from which it is made.

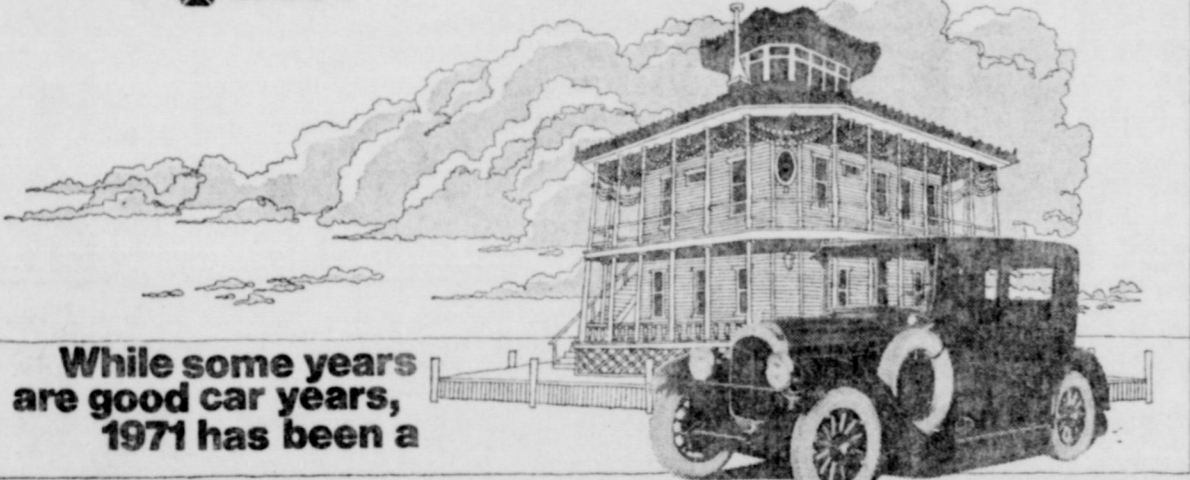

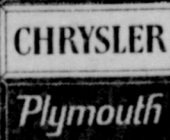
