

Top School Talent for CJC Ranch Day Rodeo

Some outstanding rodeo talent from the Cisco Junior College student body and high schools in the area is being lined up for the rodeo that will highlight activities of Ranch Day, Wednesday, March 11, at the college. Sophomore Glen Dyer of Coleman, CJC Rodeo Association president, said.

The association, formed just this year is sponsoring the western style contests, the first full-event rodeo to be held to be held under college auspices.

Only students at CJC and area high schools will be admitted as contestants, Bill Cullins, a freshman also from Coleman and publicity director, said.

Stock for the events is being furnished by Runt Salon of Newcastle. "Mr. Salon has some rough bulls and broncs and spectators should get plenty of entertainment for their 50 cents," said Cullins.

The rodeo program will begin at 1:30 p.m. following a western style barbecue in the college cafeteria. It will be held at the old rodeo grounds just east of the National Guard armory on Highway 183 across from the college campus.

Admission charges will be 50 cents for all adults. Preschool age children will be admitted free.

Deadline for contestant entries is 5 p.m., Monday March 9, at the office of Dean Madison, dean of student activities in the Student Union building, Dyer said. Entry fees are listed on the entry blanks available at Mr. Madison's office.

"The rodeo will go on regardless of whether or not it sleets, rains or snows," said Cullins.

Events will include bareback bronc riding, tie down calf roping, girls barrel racing, goat sacking, ribbon roping by boy and girl teams, pole bending, steer dogging, goat tying and bull riding.

Other events on the all-day program include selection of a Most Typical Cowboy, Most Typical Cowgirl and Miss Ranch Day at an assembly program beginning at 10 a.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts auditorium. Class and campus favorites will also be announced. The students will elect a

sheriff and deputies to enforce the special Ranch Day rules which specify that all participants must wear at least three articles of western attire and also that male students wear beards.

Fines for failure to conform will be assessed by a judge to be chosen from the student body.

The events of the day will conclude with a western dress dance at the college gym for which Tony Douglas and his Shrimpers of Athens, Texas, will play.

**Census Blanks Due 4
Days Before April 1**

With the official opening of the U.S. district census office in Waco last week the active phase of census taking in the 21 counties of the district—including Eastland county—got under way.

About 66 crew leaders and census takers will be selected and trained. Detailed arrangements will be made to enumerate people in institutions, jails, hospitals, colleges, and places other than in home, all in preparation for April 1 when the actual enumeration begins.

Beginning four days before April 1, mail carriers will leave census questionnaires at each residential mailbox. Each family will be asked to fill out its questionnaire and hold it for the census taker. The enumeration of the district is expected to be completed in about five weeks after the census takers begin making calls on April 1.

There are 180 other census districts throughout the country where this method of enumeration will be used. The Census Bureau estimates that about 40 percent of the U. S. population live in these districts.

There are 212 other census districts in which the remaining 60 percent of the popula-

tion live. These districts, for the most part, include the large cities and their suburbs. Households in these districts will also receive census questionnaires in the mail to fill out, but they will be asked to mail them back to the census office in a postage-free envelope that will accompany the questionnaire. No census taker will call at these households from which completely filled out questionnaires are returned.

The Census Bureau says that having the questionnaire in the home for several days gives the family time to assemble information about each member of the household, thus speeding up the census and providing accurate statistics.

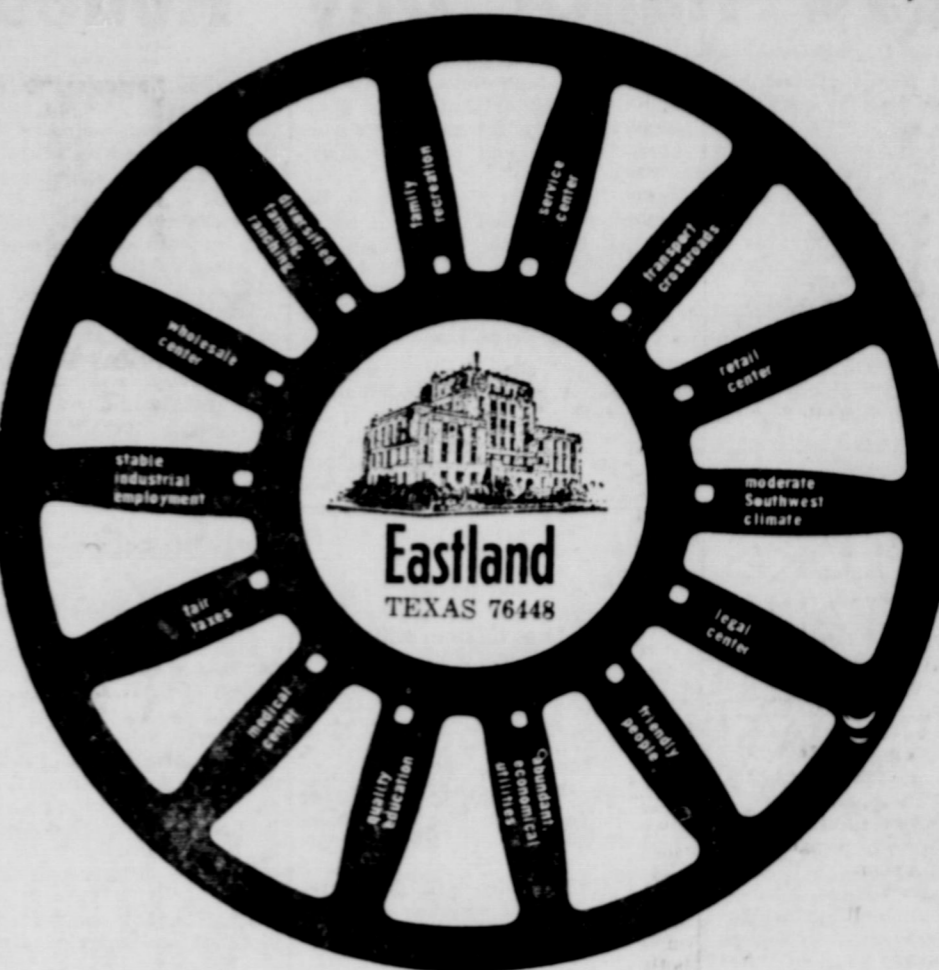

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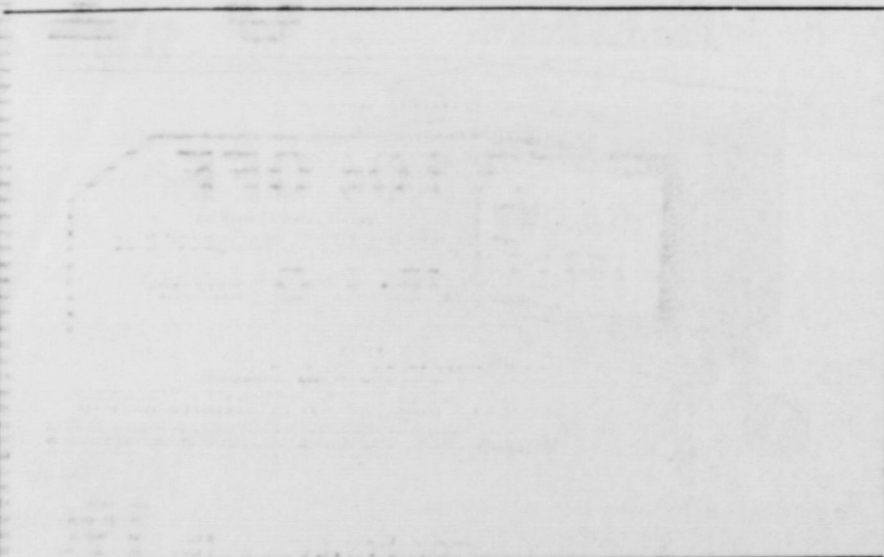

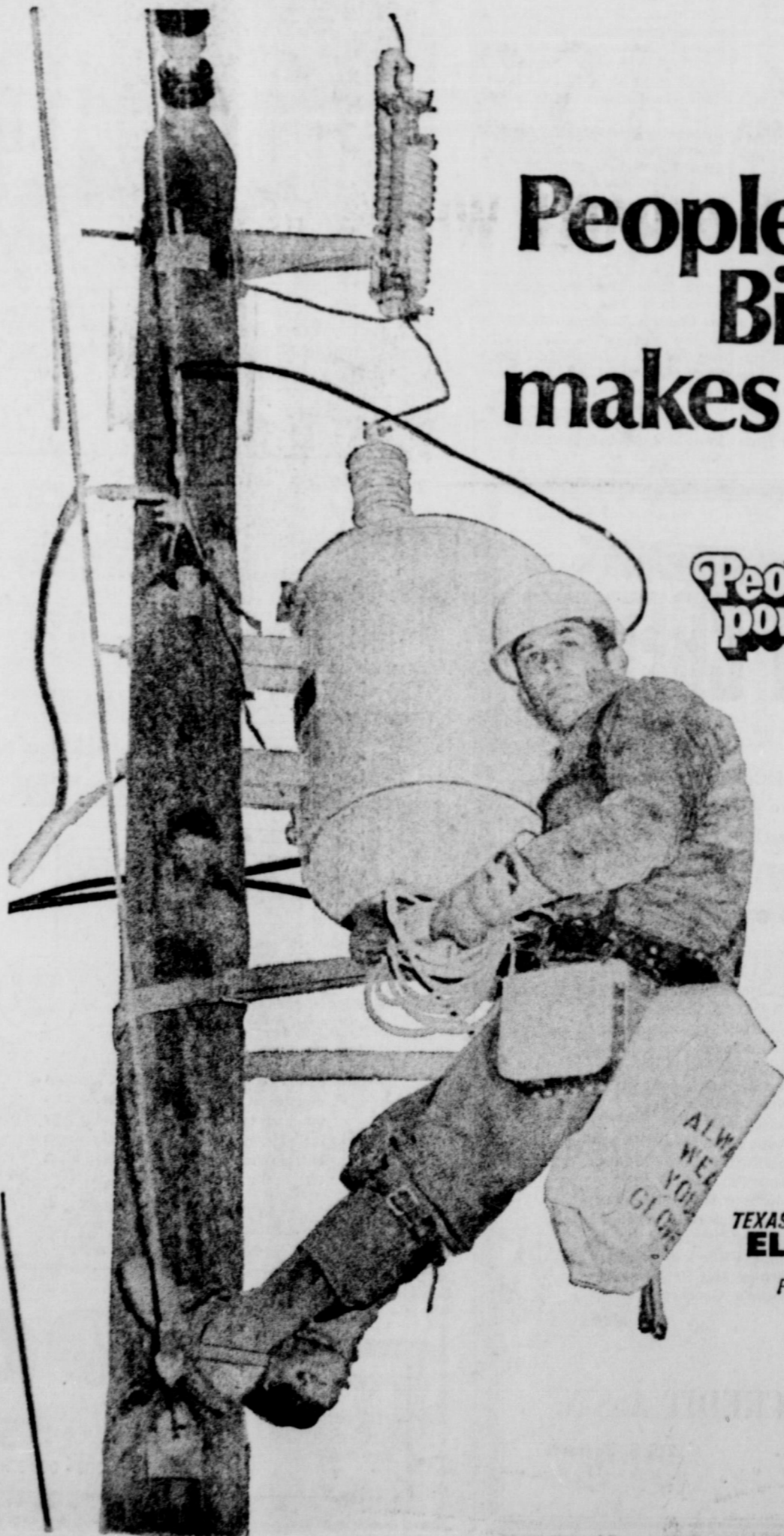

Being a native of Eastland, Texas, and a subscriber, and life-long reader of Eastland newspaper, (Eastland Chronicle, Frank Jones, editor; Oil Belt News, Boyce House, editor; the Telegram and O-nous Dick editor; and now you Mr. O'Brien, publisher-editor) I feel it not only my qualification but my duty to make a few suggestions to the honorable Chamber of Commerce of your city and my home town, through the media of your fine newspaper, The Eastland Texas Telegram.

Every year, Chamber of Commerce all over the nation, and especially in Texas, hold banquets so that they may review the year and the years past, honor such people as deserve honor, and to talk about plans for the future.

Eastland, Texas, U. S. A. has always excelled in this type of action.

However, I believe that there is one award that from year to year is overlooked, not intentionally I am sure. It is just that no one has thought of it. So now I present you with the suggestion that in the future, you give recognition to "The Citizen of the Century" for the year 1970, etc., each year at your banquets.

This award may have to be presented to the recipient posthumously or, on occasion, others may still be living. What you would be doing is creating a sort of "Hall of Fame" that would perpetuate the memory of citizens that have been special in the history of your town, sort of a similar thing to "Baseball Hall of Fame."

First, I would present the name of Miss Sallie Day. She lived 99 years and two months

most of her life in Eastland. The many good things about her are legend.

Next I would present the name of Miss Jane Boles. Her life, spent mostly in Eastland, amounted to almost 100 years, and as far as I know, she was the first colored citizen of our town.

Then I would suggest the name of Edwin T. Cox, Sr. and Ed T. Cox, Jr. for their very presence in the town spelled history in their respective fields.

There are many more, of course, that have contributed so much to the town. Some that I do not know personally as it has been 40 years since I lived there.

But one more nomination please: I would present the name of Mr. Willie Speaker as my all-time, all American citizen of this century of Eastland, Texas. I would not be thinking entirely of his great civic work, nor his church and lodge work, or any other of his contributions to the town.

I would most assuredly be thinking of the fact that he has taken a personal interest in every child, both colored and white, that he ever came in contact with in Eastland, Texas, and he brought this interest to town with him; he did not acquire it after he got here. I know because Shazo Harrell and myself were the first two kids he met upon arriving in Eastland, Texas.

I think it would be well for "the powers that be" in the upcoming 1970 all-time high school reunion in June in Eastland to prevail upon Supt. Wendell Siebert to give Speaker an "Honorary High School Diploma" from EHS & to further prevail upon the head football coach to present Speaker with a football letter every year for so long as he may live, even should he move to Cisco. He deserves it; he has earned it, he is Mr. Maverick Supporter Number One.

Mr. O'Brien, if you print this, and it takes up too much space for news, just bill me for the difference. But please don't edit it. Put her down there just like she wrote it.
