Dealerships for Aztec a r e being set up throughout the nation, and the company is naturally quite anxious to get into its own building and start full production. Approximately 25 persons are already employed by the company, even in its temporary location. This number is expected to increase rapidly as construction of the building gets under way. Mr. Blalock states that development of the building and trailers inside, will begin at the same time, at the same

The Foundation has secured a Small Business Administration loan for the building, which will be retired with the lease payments. At the end of 20 years, the Foundation will sell the building it is reported.
