The Mavericks had won five of the six previous tournaments.

2 Injured When Truck Hits Auto, Power Pole

Two people apparently escaped serious injuries in a two-car vehicle accident in the 500 block of East Main Street (Highway 80) in Eastland, Thursday morning. The accident tied up traffic on the highway for some time and also stopped electric power to Eastland for awhile.

James Leon Wells, 26 of Cisco, driver of a concrete truck

which was in an accident with a 1957 Chevrolet station wagon, was treated and released at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Wanda W. Cottle, 38, of Gorman was admitted to the hospital. A hospital spokesman said Thursday afternoon that Mrs. Cottle was suffering from "facial lacerations and multiple bruises". The spokesman added the patient seemed to be "in good condition".

Both drivers were taken to the hospital by an Arrington Funeral Home ambulance.

The truck, which was owned by C. S. Curry of Breckenridge, was traveling west into Eastland when it went out of control on a rain-slick bridge, crossed the highway and struck the east-bound station wagon head on. The truck overturned, hitting an electric utility pole and breaking it. Electric company employees were working to restore service.

City policeman Johnny Morren said damage to the truck was estimated at \$2000.00. The station wagon was a total loss, Morren said.

Another accident occurred shortly after the first one. Cone-shaped markers were set out in the highway while workmen cleared the area. A car grazed one of the cones, knocking it into the path of a 1969 Dodge driven by Georgia Ruth Taylor of Anaheim, California. The Dodge struck the cone, went out of control and hit a curb. Damage was estimated by Morren at \$135.00. Mrs. Taylor, 69, apparently was not injured.

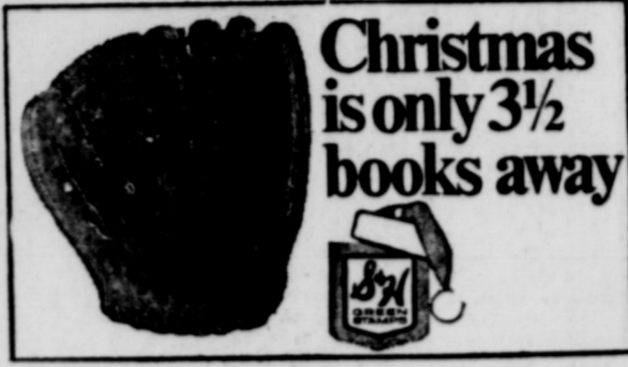

Mrs. Morren was injured in an April 18, 1968 car-truck accident in Cisco. The truck was driven by Daniels, employee of Ankor. Two people died of injuries received in the accident. One of them, Mrs. Beatrice Orlene Noble, was a sister

of Mrs. Morren. The plaintiffs are represented by Turner and Seaberry law firm of Eastland. Other suits involved an El Paso firm, alleging defective parts were used in repairing a truck; an Eastland County woman stated she had been attacked by a dog; and a cattle-trailer dispute between two Eastland County men.

The El Paso firm is represented by Shultz, Hanna, and Burke of Abilene; the women by Kae L. Brockermeyer of Fort Worth; and the plaintiff in the trailer case by Bill Hart of Eastland.

Leon-Bosque Resources Plan Faces Congress

The Leon and Bosque Resource Development Project, covering Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Somervell and Bosque counties is among 12 projects of the nature recommended by the Soil Conservation Service for approval by the Congress, said a telegram Saturday from Cong. Omar Burleson to the Cisco Press.

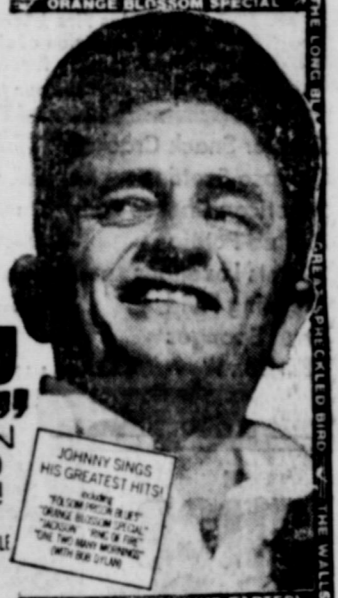

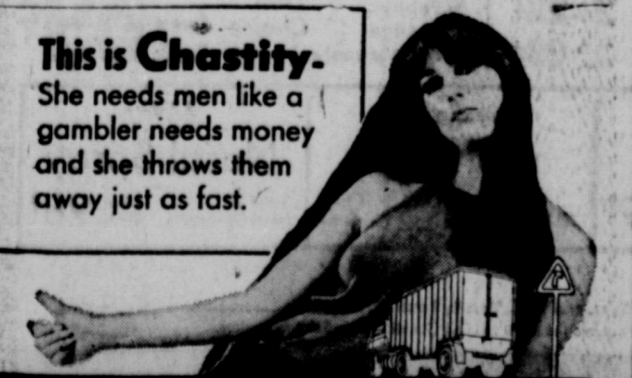

IT HAS BEEN

In recent months women's styles have been the topic of the day. To be sure some of the present styles are horrifying, with the advent of the mini-skirt, see-through blouses and costumes, and now the maxi-coat so long that wearers are getting their feet tangled in the coat causing some near serious accidents.

But when we turn the pages of styles and look at the prevailing mode of the early nineties we find the close fitted basques, heavily boned to all most resemble a tight fitting corset. These basques were made with mutton leg sleeves and high boned collars. Worn with skirts of voluminous widths, a dress of this type required from 10 1/2 to 12 yards of material for a medium size.

1910 brought an ankle length skirt for dress up occasions. They were made of taffeta and black voile worn with severe white linen shirt waists or white voiles elaborately trimmed with rows and rows of insertions, tucks and lace, taffeta petticoats that swished under the voile skirts. Wide brimmed, coarse straw hats with black bands and elbow length black silk gloves and black glove silk stockings worn with wide patent leather slippers with high heels completed a perfect costume.

Then came 1914-15-16 with the pencil slim skirts, ankle length, so slim that a woman dared not try to step up on the sidewalk or try to get into a buggy or into a train. Then some merciful designers came up with a slim, slim skirt slit on each side to aid stepping for the wearer. Even then many women had to be hoisted into and out of trains, buggies and up onto a high step.

Much shorter skirts were introduced in the 20's. Draped skirts were the mode, also overskirts of all kinds and tunics. Satin, bright and shiny, was a favorite material along with crepe-de-chine and georgette crepe. The draped skirt was designed to create a peg top appearance and narrowed hem line. These skirts were topped with a contrasting material of a bright color. Blouses

were heavily beaded with various type beads. Hats were all sizes and shapes from the flower covered turbans, stove pipe styles with a big single cabbage rose perched atop of the high crown. Veils were great favorites.

In the late 20's old timers and modest women were shocked beyond words when knee length skirts made their debut. But as usual when the shock passed women of all ages, sizes and weights adopted the style and short skirts were commonplace. At this point waist lines were dropped below the hip line and short, short skirts were pleated, gathered or circular with a width of four to five yards around. Hats were lovely wide brimmed black lace models with wreaths of multi-colored flowers circling the crown. There were peanut straws and other materials in hat making. Shoes were extremely round, toed, short vamps and high, high heels. Women looked as if they were doing the goose step as they meandered down a side walk. These shoes came in black, red and light blonde kid.

Then not too many years ago came the Can-Can petticoats of stiff rayon net, made of row after row of graduated ruffles edged with lace or satin ribbon. Continually there was a contest to determine which young lady wore the fullest and most elaborate Can-Can under full, full skirts. In walking on an ordinary side walk only two girls could walk side by side, because of the umbrella like petticoat that held the dresses so far out. Tongues wagged and criticism of this style ran high, but the Can-Can remained to live out its popularity and was gone. During the life of said petticoat, dresses were elaborate with trimmings, laces, braids, embroideries, buttons of all sizes and shapes. There were collars large and small, just so there were collars.

After all perhaps women's styles create a relief from talk of crime, wars, marches, riots and every day scandal so lets keep the criticism going and see what we come up with.

Homemaker's Hints

The artificial sweetener cyclamate, recently was banned by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration. If a product contains cyclamate, it will be listed on the label.

Food manufacturers are aligning their products with recommendations stopping the use of the sweetener. Among them is General Foods.

In a recent statement, General Foods said they have halted production of foods and beverages containing cyclamates. Products are Pre-Sweetened Kool-Aid, Soft Drink Mix, Diet Twist Mix, Good Seasons Low Calorie Italian Salad Dressing Mix, Low Cal Light Cal Syrup and Scoop Low Calorie Granulated Sugar Replacement. Conventionally sweetened products will replace them. Other General Foods lower-

calorie foods such as Birds Eye Cool Whip Non-Dairy Whipped Topping and Dream Whip Whipped Topping Mix, contain no cyclamates.

The D-Zerta Low Calorie line will be continued until February 1, 1970. Secretary Robert Finch of the Health Education and Welfare Department recognized the need for certain dietary foods for diabetics and others with health problems.

The company plans to reformulate the products to contain no cyclamates.

The concern about cyclamates is not sudden. But it is alarming! For one thing, use of the sweetener was zooming; U. S. consumption had increased six times in the last seven years.

Nearly 70 percent of this would be in soft drinks.

Winter Comfort and Safety Means Proper Heating System

Looks like it might be a cold winter, John O. Public, and your family's comfort depends on having heating equipment in proper operating condition.

Regardless of the type of heating in your home, there are steps you should take in order for it to do its job — and do it safely.

Fuel burning central heating systems, for example, should be inspected annually to ascertain that vents have no obstructions, that the burner is properly adjusted, and that the unit construction is still sound in all respects. The area around the unit should be kept free of clutter. A qualified heating contractor will make your inspection and inaugurate service for a reasonable charge.

New filters should be installed at the start of each heating season and then cleaned periodically. In most cases, removing them and shaking out the dust, or once over lightly with the family vacuum cleaner is all that is necessary.

Provisions are made to introduce air into central furnaces so that they will have sufficient oxygen for combustion. Invented heating equipment likewise requires oxygen. A window should be left slightly open to introduce additional fresh air into the room.

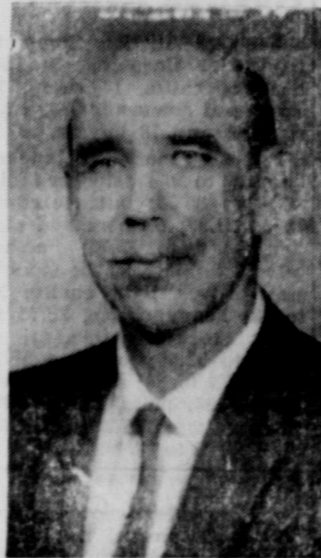
Free standing heaters should be connected to the gas outlet with pipe or semi-rigid copper or aluminum tubing. Rubber hoses can deteriorate and should not be used.

Never use a match to check for a gas leak. If one is suspected, soap suds can be brushed on the connection and if bubbles should appear, immediate action should be taken to stop the leak.

For additional protection, free standing heater units should be equipped with guards to keep loose clothing from the flame.

After all, safety is a simple matter.
