School Enrollment, Taxes Discussed by Supt. Siebert

At in Eastland schools is the highest since the depression here's some 40 or more than was Supt. Wendell Siebert of the East-Club Tuesday.

With a current enrollment of 850, the system stands far ahead of its 711 total at the end of last year, Siebert said. The some 40 or 50 "extra pupils" are not from Olden, he said, and we can but assume that construction work, particularly highway work, may be responsible, but we've had construction for three or four years, so we don't really know where these came from yet.

The student load in high school is good and we've got youngsters graduating with up to 20 credits. We've got 90 in our typing class.

In the school business, it's dangerous to say anything definite, he said, but we see no general wholesale increase in taxation. We'll continue to strive for tax equalization, but there's no across-the-board boost seen.

The consolidation of Olden with Eastland will be a definite advantage, dollar-wise, he said, and we're guessing we'll be getting somewhere between \$19,000 and \$40,000 from the state in bonus money sometime next M. I estimate about \$30,000 is what we can expect.

This would just about be equal to our present \$32,000 annual debt service requirement, he said,— assuming that we don't have to go into a new construction program.

There's 290 in high school and during the depression year 1932, the enrollment stood at 325 in the upper grades, he said. The low was 180 in the mid-1950s.

The possible addition of another bus route could also reduce the amount we might expect from the state, he said.

Eastland District was tapped for an additional \$22,000 in local fund assignment by the State with the addition of the district.

Mr. Siebert demonstrated several pieces of new equipment, bought under federally-supported programs, and which without help, would be impossible luxury, he said.

These included quality but miniature tape recorders, and libraries of teaching tapes which the system is presently experimenting with, first on the high school level, and hopefully adoptable throughout the system.

Kindergarten, the superintendent said that a new state law requires the adoption of such a program, but in its poorly written nature, the law fails to spell out funding, and therefore, the local board, in amnizing the needs, found that it would have cost from \$8,000 to \$10,000 to implement a kindergarten this year. There's just no extra money for it he said. Ranger gets a third of the county's Title One money because of the only county public school kindergarten, which it supports on that program.

The law is going to be revamped and hopefully, there'll be some provisions made for funding. Only about 15 youngsters would have qualified anyway under the present law.

Supporting facilities (lunchroom, etc.) are adequate at the Elementary School in the event another classroom wing were to be built, he explained.

The junior colleges are the best guess for the adoption of expanding technical-vocational training he said, and the high schools would probably go into a transportation program with half days spent in academics and half days in shop training. The public schools in this county just aren't big enough to support the elaborate voc-tec programs envisioned by the legislators.

President J. B. Arther presided and guests included Fred Lewis of Fort Worth. Carl Garrett will have the program next week.

4 More Cents Moves Faster Service Mail

A 10¢ airmail stamp may not get your rush letter on an airplane, but it'll certainly earn top priority movement for it, Local Postmaster Marcus O'Dell reports.

Under a new Postal priority system, a letter with a 10¢ airmail stamp earns just routing even though it cannot be air-lifted, which offers patrons the opportunity to rush a piece of mail for an additional 4¢ anywhere, even though air carriage might not be necessary.

For instance, a letter intended for a Fort Worth address could get special consideration with an airmail stamp even though we don't actually put it on a plane," O'Dell said. Under continuing postal changes, other types of personal mail are getting preference over commercial - type mail, he said.

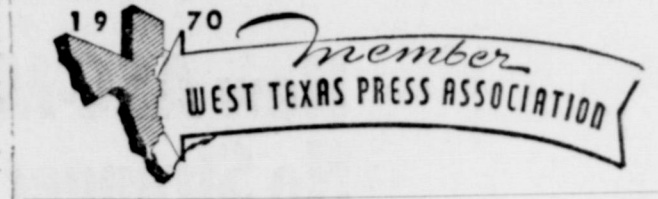

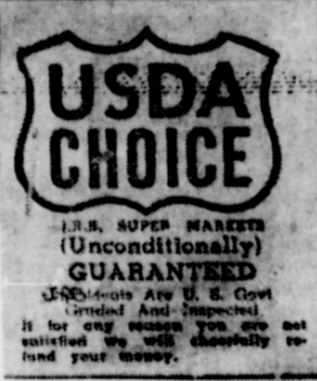

Bill to Encourage Recreation Areas Now Under Consideration

A bill designed to encourage the establishment of fish, wildlife, and recreation areas in resource conservation and develop (RC&D) projects will be of interest to residents of the Leon-Bosque Project.

The law authorizes federal aid to sponsors carrying out an RC&D project plan, according to Gene Gilbreath of Dublin, chairman of the Leon-Bosque RC&D steering committee.

The assistance is limited to water-based recreation, fish and wildlife developments that will be open to public use. Under terms of the ACT, the

federal aid can be used for up to one-half of the cost of needed land rights and facilities for such developments.

The Leon-Bosque RC&D projects embrace Bosque, Comanche, Eastland, Erath and Bosque Counties.

Gilbreath said that this is just one more legislative tool that can be used effectively through the RC&D Project and will help improve recreation facilities in the Leon-Bosque-RC&D Area. A major objective of our project is to increase recreational opportunities on both private and public lands, Gilbreath added.

The Act is designed to encourage water-based developments consistent with a plan found adequate for purposes of the Land and Water Conservation Fund of 1965. It is not available if assistance can be provided under other authorities.

Details for administering this assistance to local RC&D sponsors are being developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Gilbreath said. Groups interested in securing help on this program should contact one of the RC&D Directors or Marion Porter, Project Coordinator of the Soil Conservation Service in Stephenville, who is assisting project sponsors in the development of our resource plan.
