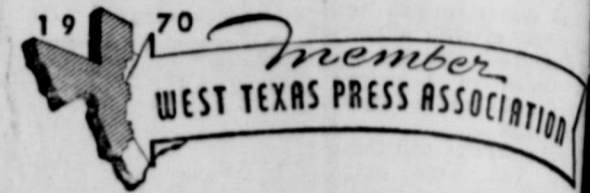

Crackdown on DWIs With 'Breath Machine' Explained

The purpose of using the intoxication "breath-o-meter" by the Dept. of Public Safety was explained to members of the Eastland Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting Tuesday at the White Elephant Restaurant.

Speaker was Robert J. Hutchins, Patrolman Safety Education Service, DPS, and Lt. Jimmy Rhodes of Midland assisted.

The State Legislature determined that the best way to cut down on the increasing auto fatality rate was to cut down on the number of drinking drivers because surveys show Hutchins said that from 40 to 55 per cent of the fatalities are the result of drinking drivers. So the "intoxicated" law was passed last year and went into effect Sept. 1 under which the law requires that a driver give a breath sample upon a valid driver's license. In this case, that he not drive if his alcohol in the blood has reached the intoxication level which has been set at 0.10 by weight.

The figures quoted by Hutchins here are the most recent ones: nationally in 1969, 52,400 people were killed in traffic accidents; two million were injured and \$11 billion in property was damaged. In comparison, in Texas during 1969 there were 94,779 accidents, killing 3,481 people and injuring 216,977 people and doing \$6 billion damage. There were 3,367 killed in Texas in 1967, he said.

The breath-o-meter measures the amount of alcohol in the breath which is equal to that in the blood and brain, Hutchins said. If a suspected DWI refuses to take the test,

an affidavit so stating is included with the DPS patrolman's report.

Kendrick Easter Spectacle Expected To Attract Record Through This Year

Rehearsals were going well this week for the 1970 presentation of the Kendrick Easter Pageant at the big outdoor amphitheater bordering Highway 60 between Eastland and Cisco. The spectacle which annually draws crowding thousands to watch an enactment of Biblical scenes culminating in the Crucifixion and the Resurrection, will begin this year with eleven panoramic scenes from the life of Abraham, including the destruction of Sodom where Lot's wife was turned into a pillar of salt, the offering of Isaac as a sacrifice among others. The life of Christ will be presented in 47 scenes, beginning with the birth and ending with the resurrection. The script for this production has been prepared from the best scenes which have been presented in the past five years. The cast, consisting of people from every denomination and all walks of life, have volunteered many hard hours in rehearsals, in preparation for this production which is called the "Best of the Best."

The pageant has received nationwide publicity through a three-page color picture story in the Progressive Farmer Magazine, with some 5,000,000 copies being sent to the 50 States of the United States. The pageant, presented each year by the Kendrick families; J. H. Pierre, and Phil, and a cast of people from local and area towns has become one of the State's leading events. The attendance for a single performance has now grown to 20,000. It is hoped that through the publicity of the Progressive Farmer and the statewide newspapers, T.V., and radio, the huge amphitheater will be filled to its capacity of 100,000 for the performance. The pageant is held in the Kendrick amphitheater located four miles west of Eastland, Texas, on U. S. Highway 70 as a predawn service beginning at 3:30 a.m. on Easter Sunday. Free parking is available for 10,000 cars, and a concession stand is available on the grounds.

"Make your plans now to attend this year's presentation of the best story ever written," said J. H. Kendrick, "We feel that everyone in attendance will receive a rich blessing as the life of Christ unfolds in true life before you. "Should your club or church wish to attend as a group, you will be recognized preceding the presentation if you will contact the Kendrick family either in advance or when you reach the grounds. "You are urged to bring a blanket to keep yourself wrapped and warm."

Services For J. L. Thornton Sunday at 2:00

Funeral services for J. L. Thornton, 69, who died Thursday in Graham Hospital after an illness of several weeks, will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist Church in Cisco.

Officiating will be the Rev. Mart Agnew, retired Baptist minister. He will be assisted by Rev. James Hall, pastor of the Cisco East Side Baptist Church.

Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery with Masonic graveside rites.

The Dallas Consistory will send a team of high ranking Masons to Cisco to participate in the funeral. Headed by Ed Smith, a 33rd degree Mason, the four-man team will hold the funeral night Rose Croix ceremony at the church.

Prior to the 2 a.m. church service Masons will gather at the Masonic Temple in Cisco and attend the service in a body. Masonic graveside services will also be held at Oakwood Cemetery.

Mr. Thornton, known as "Punk" to his numerous friends, had been a resident of Cisco since the middle 1920's when he came here with the Sweetwater Cotton Oil Company to be employed with the company's cotton gin business in Cisco. He had previously been in professional baseball as a player or manager at Omaha, Neb., Corsicana and Big Spring.

He acquired the gin property on South D avenue with the decline of the cotton economy and established a feed and seed business which, as the Thornton Feed Mill, grew into one of the largest individually owned operations of its sort in this section.

Born at Lingleville, Texas, in 1900, he was orphaned early and raised and educated in the State Masonic Home at Fort Worth. He was a member of many Masonic orders and took a prominent part in the work and activities of the order.

Survivors include his wife, the former Melissa Sides of Corsicana; a daughter, Mrs. Dana Barret of Dallas, N. Y., a brother, Ed Thornton of Benton, Ark.

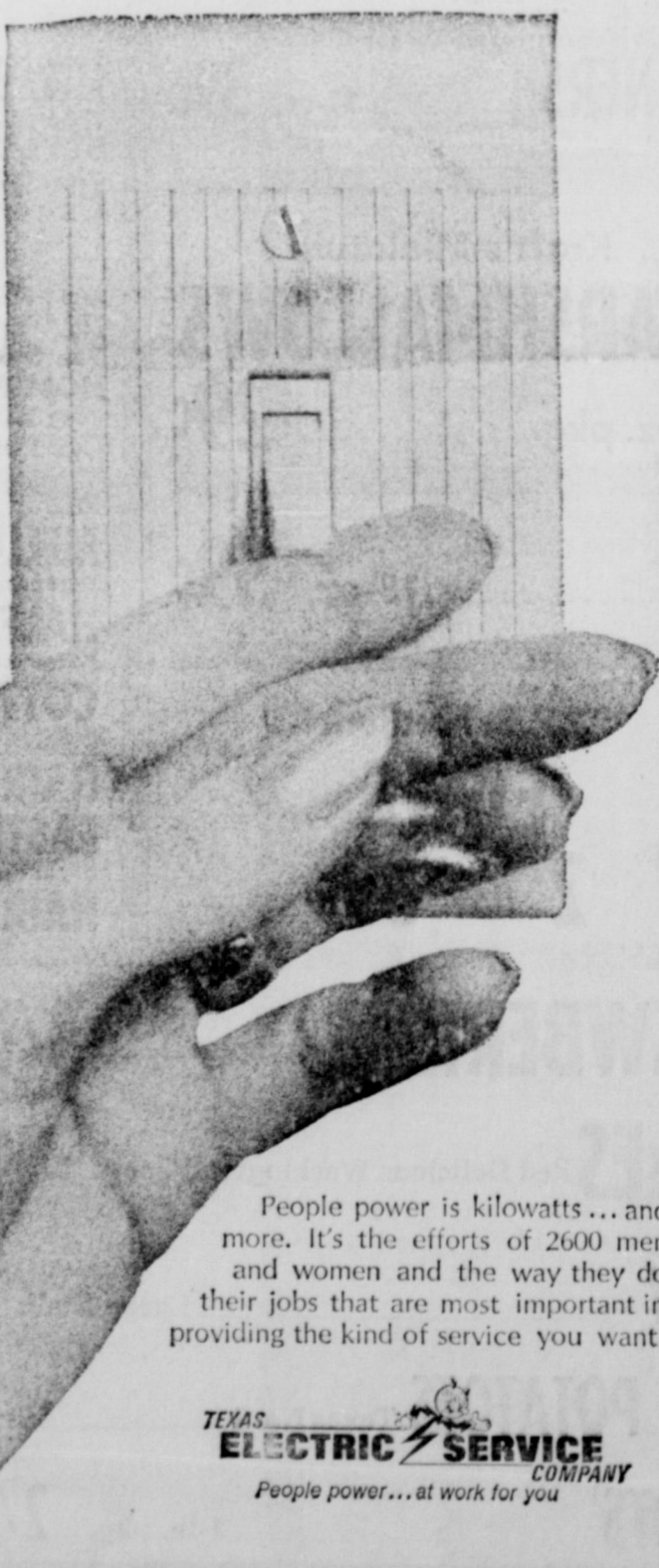

Steimel Cites Record In Bid For Senate Seat

Walter E. Steimel, in a bid for election to the State Senate from the district, this week geared his campaign to what he termed "exposure" of present Sen. Tom Creighton's voting record.

Steimel, 42, who once held one of the nation's highest security clearances, charged that Creighton's record was one "against interests of the people."

He cited the following as a matter of public record: Creighton wrote, voted for and pushed passage in the Senate of a sales tax on groceries, farm machinery and fertilizer, causing costly special tax sessions of the legislature.

Creighton voted against aid to senior citizens in 1935, 1967 and 1969, filibustered and defeated a bill to lower the tax burden on persons 65 and older.

Creighton voted to lower appropriations for teachers salaries and voted against new state schools and for an increase in state college tuition.

The present senator, as budget director in the Senate, helped raise his and other senators' office expense allowance \$1,000 a month, after voters turned down a pay raise for legislators.

"My opponent is an old-time politician who has lost touch with the people," Steimel said. "It's time for a change."

Steimel has pledged to: Fight any attempt to tax groceries. Help senior citizens living on fixed incomes. Make an in-depth tax study to avoid costly tax sessions. Fight rising insurance costs. Keep close personal contact with people of all economic and social levels — small businessmen, working people, farmers, ranchers, housewives, retired citizens and others.

He is a native of Wichita Falls and is a graduate of Trinity University and University of Texas. He practices law in Fort Worth and is licensed to practice before the U. S. Supreme Court.

During the Korean War he held the rare "Q" security clearance as an atomic bomb assembly officer while a Navy lieutenant.

Steimel lives at 4212 South Drive in Fort Worth with his wife, Margaret and their children, Walter Jr., 13, and Stacy Elizabeth, 10.

Proclamation Commends State Jaycee Effort

Texas Gov. Preston Smith signed a proclamation recently, commending Texas Jaycees' assumption of the challenge this week to save an already approved H. E. W. hospital grant of \$140,000. The grant stands to be waived if \$50,000 in matching funds are not raised by May 1.

The Gonzales Jaycees started pushing this project and in October, 1968, the Texas Jaycees adopted the program. Area VI Jaycees became interested in this project and visited the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation facility and helped to advertise the project. The Texas Jaycee Hospital Foundation was conceived in May, 1967. Later it was incorporated and granted non-profit charitable status.

The "Fort Worth Building" at Gonzales Warm Springs, once famed as a place of hope for polio victims, is again almost ready to open its doors to those stricken with physical disabilities. For the past two years the Texas Jaycees have worked at various projects to raise enough money to re-open the vacant building.

As of Feb. 1, the Jaycees are still short \$50,000, which must be raised to take advantage of a \$140,000 federal grant. The hospital could then open.

THE NEED FOR THE BUILDING is staggering. In Texas alone, 6,000 persons need rehabilitation each year. These are people who are now useless, many invalid, burdens on their families and society. Most of these people can become useful, productive people capable of some degree, if not complete, independence, thru proper treatment and rehabilitation. The Texas Jaycee Rehabilitation Hospital will provide services for approximately 300 persons per year. This hospital will give hope and medical care to men and women of every age, creed and color. But, until the funds can be raised, the doors will remain locked, the corridors empty, and hope for hundreds only a dream project. Chairman Richard Rossander of Eastland explained.



Witnesses Back From Brownwood Circuit Meeting
