The alarm was turned in at 2 a.m. and when the firemen got to the club on the northwest edge of town, the roof of the pro-shop had already caved in, Chief Jackson said. "We poured a lot of water onto the game room area on the east end," he said, "to try to save that part."

Three loads of water (3,300 gallons) was taken to the fire in the Rural Truck, he said, and the intense heat prevented a thorough investigation until later Friday and the investigation was continuing.
