It looks as though the City may reasonably expect more from the one -cent sales tax than had been orginally guessed, City Manager Lewis Tiner informed members of the Eastland Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting Tuesday at the White Elephant Restaurant.

The City recently got its first check from the sales tax which went into effect in Oct. last year, and the amount for the quarter was over \$9,000. Tiner had budgeted some \$20,000 for the year, and the city will probably get two payments during its present fis-cal year, which ends Sept. 1.
