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

his new Cadillac over a bluff," Lewis says. A native of Eastland County, Lewis joined Texas El-ectric July 24, 1935 at Eastland Transmission. In 1952, he was transferred to the electrician's crew. During World War II, Earl entered the service as a first class electrician in the Navy's Seabees. He was stationed in the Aleutian Islands and participated in the invasion of Attu. He also served in the South Pacific on the island of Saipan and was discharged a chief electrician.

He will continue to make his home in Eastland and Cisco. "I have property in both Eastland and Cisco, rent houses and such," he says, "and to look after them properly will keep me busy."

His wife, Jo, teaches school in Cisco.
