

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



Grigsby also pointed out that Texas has the largest number of telephones of any state served by Southwestern Bell. In 1926, when the millionth telephone was installed, Texas had 337,000 phones. Today that number has risen to 4.8 million.

Throughout the company, this fantastic growth has resulted in expenditures of more than 5.5 billion on construction during the past 35 years. This represents \$618 for each telephone added.

During 1969, the company's construction program requir-ed an expenditure of \$544 mil-

Present forecasts indicate that 620,000 telephones will be added in Southwestern Bell territory this year. This is eq-uivalent to more than the number of telephones now serving the Fort Worth and Austin metropolitan areas combined.

"Keeping up with the growth of such dynamic area on the way to this 10 millionth telephone milestone hasn't been easy," Grigsby said, "As expansion of our communica-tions systems con inues, we will keep on doing our best to achieve our goal of giving customers the kind of telephone service they want, when and where they want it."





Thanksgiving Service Message

SERMON SUMMARY
By Robert W. Marsh
"MISSING THE POINT" (John 5:9-10) Introduction

"... the man was healed, and he took up his pallet and walked. Now that, day was the sabbath. So the Jews said to the man who was cured, "It is the sabbath, it is not

lawful for you to carry your pallet."

Instead of the Jews' being thankful that a man had been healed, they were concerned about sabbath observance. But Jesus answerd them, "My Father is working still, and I am working." (Jn. 5:17) For Jesus human need took precedence over the usual rule of rest .The Jews had missed the point. They were giving priority to what was less important. They were not thankful when they ought to have been thankful.

We are thankful for the obvious; but what about the not so obvious? Before we criticize the Jews for missing the point, is it possible that we may miss the point as well? What are some things for which we ought to be thankful?

I. The Disobedience of a Child Paul wrote: "When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became a man, I gave up childish ways." (I Cor. 13:11) But we do not become men in a moment. Adolescence, the process of growing up, is necessary and right, but a good part of the process is painful.

The child about whom we need to be concerned is the child who never disobeys. The commandment, "Honor your father and your mother . ." is not to be interpreted so as to justify continued parental domination or authority. Discipline is essential! but the point is this: adolescence is the time in life when we put away

childish ways; and disobedience is a part of the process. The next time your child disobeys, instead of losing sleep, pray a prayer of thanksgiving to God that your child is becoming an adult; that he is taking on that individuality which is God's gift to every man! We may, like the Jews, miss the point. We may complain about the disobedience and not see the greater good. This Thanksgiving, be thankful for the disobedience of a

II. Disappointments of Life

Paul wrote: "I want you to know, brethren, that what has happened to me has really served to advance the gospel : ..." (Philippians 1:12) And what has happened to Paul- Paul was in prison! His ambition had been thwarted and his plans scratched; yet he writes: "... what has happened to me has really served to advance the gospel . . ." Paul is the embodiment of his own declaration: "We know that in everything God works

for good with those who love him . . . " (Romans 8:28) God can turn and often does turn our dissappointments into joy. The ultimate evil he transforms into the ultimate good: the death of his Son into a victory over death. The disciples were as dissappointed a band as we can imagine.

Think of the disappointments of life: the job you were unable to obtain; the girl you wanted to marry; the home you could not build. But out of the disappointment, good has come.

III. The Struggles of the Christian

Paul begins practically every one of his letters with prayer of thanks for the church (Romans, 1 Corinthians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, 1st and 2nd Thessalonians, and Philemon) And the churches to which Paul refers are churches undergoing difficulty and even

Paul struggled; the early church struggled: and the church at its greatest moments in history struggled. "We are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses .

The Christian life itself is a struggle. But suppose we were not conscious of our sins and our failures; suppose we assumed we had arrived- that we were in harmony with God's will and that the details our lives were quite pleasing in God's sight . . . The very fact we recognize our need for God's grace is reason for thanksgiving. They shall call his name Jesus, for he will save the people from their sins." "I came not to call the righteous "Those who are well physician." "Blessed are the poor in spirit . . .' Conclusion

Don't miss the point (as did the Jews). Be thankful for the disobedience of a child; the disappointments of life; and the struggles of the Christian.

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
