But the Kokomo people are still as proud as ever of their rich heritage and fine community.





Are Eastland TV Cable Users Deprived of Viewing More Fort Worth and Dallas Metropolitan Area TV Stations.

The Following Letter From the Chairman of Federal Communication Commission to Congressman Omar Burleson Fails to Show Any Reason Why Our Cable System Cannot Show More Metropolitan Stations.

Dear Mr. Burleson:

This is in reply to your letter of February 27,71969, regarding an objection you received from a constituent in Eastland, Texas. Your constituent asserts that residents of Eastland are not permitted to receive Fort Worth and Dallas television signals on their local CATV system but are limited to coverage from Abilene.

On March 8, 1966, the Commission issued its Second Report and Order in which it asserted limited jurisdiction over all CATV systems and adopted rules to effectuate its regulation of the systems. A copy of the Public Notice issued at that time is enclosed. It is a helpful summary of the Second Report and Order and of the extent of the new regulations. Also enclosed is a copy of the text of the Commission's rules.
