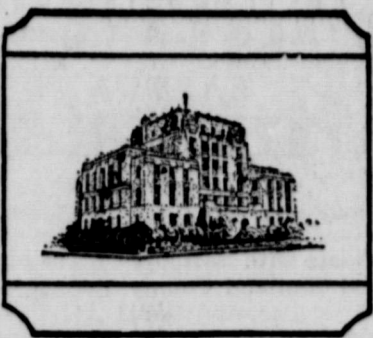

William M. Hooe Buried Friday In Granger Services

William M. Hooe, 51, died at 7 a. m. Thursday at Hickman Nursing Home.

Graveside rites were held at 3 p. m. Friday at Granger Cemetery in Granger with Masonic rites performed by Taylor Masonic Lodge under direction of Arrington Funeral Home.

Born December 1, 1888, in Cuero, he moved to Eastland about one and a half years ago from San Antonio. He retired from the Katy Railroad in 1946 after 43 years of service. He was a member of the Baptist Lodge No. 337 of Waco, Knights of Templar, Lodge 7 of San Antonio, and was a Shriner.

He married Miss Nell Wilcox in 1906 at Granger. She died in 1964. He was also preceded in death by a son, Kenneth W. Hooe, in May, 1969.

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. J. A. Newsome of Houston, a niece, Mrs. Cyrus Justice of Eastland, two grandchildren, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Because of rising costs, school lunches will be raised five cents beginning Monday, February 2.

Students at elementary school will pay 35 cents for lunch. Extra milk will be 5 cents. Junior high and high school students will pay 40 cents for lunch.

Donated Dimes To Pay Musgrove Filing Fees

State Rep. Burke Musgrove said this weekend that he will file for re-election Monday and pay his filing fee with some 1,500 dimes donated by supporters in the 53rd Legislature.

Musgrove said that he would personally file with a sack of dimes in each of the five counties that includes Eastland, Callahan, Shackelford, Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties. "The dimes, a majority of which were donated by supporters in Eastland and Palo Pinto Counties, represent the healthy involvement of hundreds of concerned taxpayers in the election process. These and other tax-

payers seriously question the wasteful state spending trends and the increasing tax burdens," Musgrove explained.

Rep. Musgrove, who voted against and actively opposed the sizeable \$348 million tax bill passed during the last two special legislative sessions, has given numerous speeches throughout the area in which he discussed wasteful state spending policies and other related causes for what he termed an unreasonably large tax bill. Musgrove said that predictions are that another tax bill, estimated to run as high as \$400 million, would face the next regular session of the Texas Legislature in 1971. "The invaluable experience I gained in several of the roughest sessions in Texas history will better enable me to work towards trimming wasteful state spending and in likewise reducing the corresponding tax demands," Musgrove stated.

Musgrove, who just completed his third year in the Legislature, commented that he has had two hard-fought primary election campaigns, his first one requiring a run-off election, and that the frequent and costly campaigns consume a great portion of the two-year term of the office holder. Musgrove was elected for a second term by the largest vote margin in the history of the legislature with approximately 80 percent of the total votes cast in the predominantly conservative district.

During his first term in office Musgrove gained the State's attention when he launched a statewide investigation into the growing drug abuse problem. He later successfully sponsored legislation that provided Texas with some of the strictest, most comprehensive dangerous drug laws in the U. S.

A member of the powerful Legislative and Congressional Redistricting Committee, Musgrove expressed concern for the future of the rural position in the Legislature after the Constitutionally required redistricting that will follow the federal census to be taken this year.

Near-Perfect Banquet Ends Same Kind of Year for CofC

A near-perfect membership meeting Thursday evening climaxed a near-perfect Chamber of Commerce year for the City of Eastland.

It was almost "This Is Your Life" as deserving citizens and visitors were honored for their contributions to the betterment of Eastland.

Receiving the Chamber's coveted Golden Deeds awards were Frank Crowell, owner of Crowell Lumber Co., who plans retirement soon; Ray Laney, who retires Sunday after 20 years as Eastland Police Chief; and Willie Speaker, a 10-year-old community leader who was described as having "won the respect and friendship of everyone in Eastland."

Presentation of certificates of scholastic achievement were made to four outstanding Eastland High School students. They were Nancy Seaberry, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., freshman; Nancy Maynard, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Truman Maynard, sophomore; Randall Treadwell, 16, son of Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Treadwell Jr., junior; and Irene Sullivan, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Sullivan, senior.

A special award was made to Burl Hulsey of Fort Worth, president of Texas Electric Service Co., present for the occasion, in appreciation of the company's contribution of the major portion of the Leon Plant facilities to the Eastland Industrial Foundation for industrial expansion. A new industry, Eastland Industries Inc., is in operation at the site, and will fire up their aluminum casting facilities Monday.

Special industrial awards were presented to Frank Sayre, Eastland Division Manager of Texas Electric Service Co.; H. T. Wilson, president of Eastland National Bank; and M. H. Perry, insurance agent. The three were described as having been the backbone of the 6-year-old Eastland foundation.

Banquet Speaker Reagan Brown, sociologist at Texas A&M University, entertained, inspired and challenged the audience of some 300, gathered at the Eastland Elementary Cafeteria.

Retiring Chamber President Grover Hallmark reviewed the year just ended, and found it highly successful with these modernizations: Perry Brothers, Williams Shoe Store; Darrell's Beauty Salon and Mode-O-Day; these additions: Maverrick Barber Shop, Gold Bond Redemption Center, Kendrick Music Center, Eastland Tire Service, and Eastland Trailer Sales; these announcements of new facilities: Goodyear Service Store and JRB Super Market; and these new industries: Atec Mobile Homes, announced in March, 1969; Eastland Industries, announced in November; and purchase of Romco Pottery by Jimmy Little and House of Webster of Rogers, Ark. The chamber gained eight new members through membership chairman Nolan DeFord.

Wendell Siebert presided the Industrial Awards, called the Foundation a success with over \$200,000 assets and 400 stockholders. The plaque given Mr. Hulsey, signed by directors, said in part "... this is but the latest of your company's contributions to our town ..."

In response, the TESCO executive explained that his company was happy to turn the property back to productive use, after having earlier deciding to dismantle it as a power supply because of economy. "In thirteen years when I came here, I couldn't imagine myself accepting such an office, but today, having worked with others, I find that my concern and admiration for chamber work is great, and I accept the office with humility and gratitude."

Seaberry was especially effective as "revealer" of the Golden Deed Award winners. His warmth and sincerity was matched by the responses by the recipients. Mr. Crowell expressed appreciation for the years of patronage he's had as a businessman and Chief Laney thanked the public for cooperating with the police department so thoroughly. Mr. Speaker expressed appreciation for having had the opportunity of living in Eastland.

Crowell had lived in Eastland since coming here during the oil boom and managed several lumber companies before founding Crowell Lumber Co. in 1927. He has served on the school board for 17 years and has been on the board of stewards for the Methodist Church. A member member of the Lion's Club, he is past president of the chamber.

Laney, who came to Eastland in 1922, graduated from Eastland High School in 1928. He joined the Eastland Police Force in 1944 and became chief in 1947.

Speaker, who also came to Eastland in 1922, has worked as a shoeshiner at Westside Barber Shop since 1924. He is an active church and lodge worker. During the years, I was said, Speaker's "advice, counsel and assistance were sought and freely given on all matters affecting Eastland."

Brown, who is described as "Mr. Community Improvement," told the crowd of approximately 200 that the answer to some of today's problems is in the schools. He suggested putting a ladder in the schools and letting the students climb up for equal opportunities. He said all people are not equal, they only have the equal opportunity to try. He told those present that it would be a good idea to lift some bad qualities of their town and then do something about them. Don't forget the little towns around you, he added.

Brown pointed out that there are four things every human being needs. They are recognition, response, new experience, and security.

Stressing that only two percent of the young generation get publicity, Brown said not to tell the kids short. He said parents "don't have guts anymore and are not setting good examples."

He emphasized the importance of law enforcement quickly.

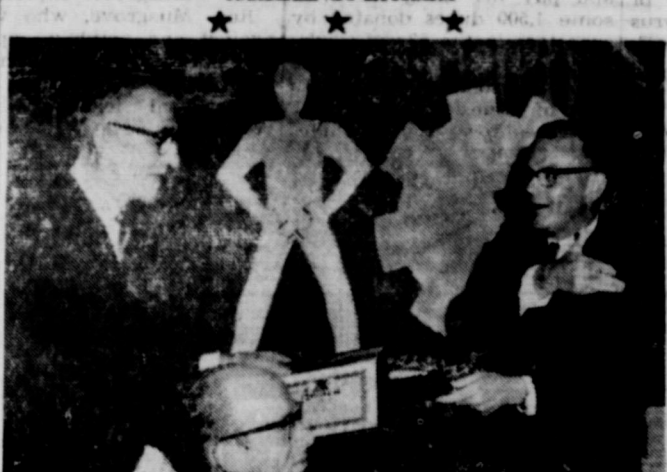

Highway Contracts In County Near 3 Millions

AUSTIN— Contracts for highway construction, including \$2,713,512.00 in Eastland county, have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer E. M. Pritchard and will be in Coleman, Brown and Eastland counties.

In Eastland County, J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc. of Tye was awarded a contract for grading, structures, flexible base, hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement and one-course surface treatment on frontage roads on 3.4 miles of Interstate Highway 20. Low bid was \$2,643,392.52.

The project extends from 0.6 mile east of State Highway 6 to 2.0 miles east of Eastland. R. P. Haun Jr. of Eastland is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 300 working days.

Also in Eastland County, Dahlstrom Corporation of Dallas was awarded a contract for construction of the north fork of the Leon River Bridge and approaches and widening of two culverts on SH 6. Low bid was \$70,119.79.

The project is located in the City of Eastland, northward to 4.1 miles north of Eastland in sections. R. P. Haun Jr. is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which is expected to take an estimated 60 working days.

Strain Brothers, Inc. of San Angelo was awarded a contract for grading, drainage structures flexible base, two-course surface treatment and the AT and SF Railway overpass on 7 miles of US 84 in Coleman County. Low bid was \$1,166,096.68.

The project extends from near Guadalupe Street in Coleman southeasterly to US 67 in Santa Anna. Eric C. Mayo Sr. of Coleman is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 250 working days.

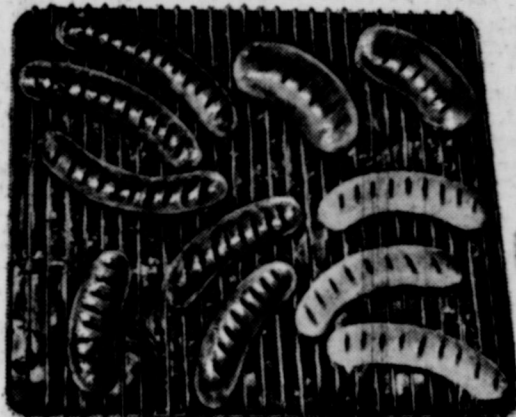

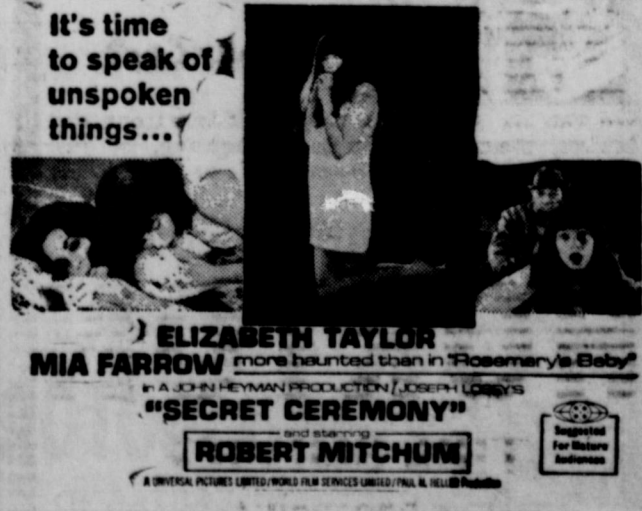

Feb. 2-7 Is Designated 'Farm Bureau' Week

County Judge Scott Bailey has designated the week of February 2-7 as "Farm Bureau Week" in Eastland County. The County Farm Bureau organization will have a special enrollment during this period as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas over the 116,622 figure achieved in 1969.

The Eastland County Farm Bureau ended its 1969 mem-

bership year with 82 member families.

The official proclamation called for citizens "to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Eastland County Farm Bureau."

Governor Preston Smith has proclaimed the same period as "Farm Bureau Week in Texas."

Jack Cozart of Cisco is president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. Membership chairman is Sam Kimmell of Cisco.

The committee chairman said every farmer and rancher in the county is needed "as a member and leader" in Farm Bureau.

Each of us in agriculture has too great an outlay in our business not to do all that we can to protect our investment in capital, time and labor," he declared.

The text of the proclamation issued by Judge Scott Bailey reads:

"Agriculture is vital to the economy of Eastland County, our State and our Nation; and

"The productive efficiency of our farmers and ranchers has helped stabilize food prices and the cost of living for all our citizens; and

"This record of achievement has resulted from educational and technological advancements in agriculture under the free choice system; and

"Farmers and ranchers have recognized the value of joining together in an organized effort to promote and protect their interests; and

"Four out of five farm and ranch families in this Nation belonging to a general farm organization are members of Farm Bureau; and

"Farm Bureau is a free, independent, non-partisan, non-governmental, voluntary organization of families united for the purpose of analyzing, economic opportunity and social advancement, thereby promoting the national welfare.

"I, Scott Bailey County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby designate February 2-7 as FARM BUREAU WEEK in Eastland County, and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

"In official recognition thereof, I hereby affix my signature this 30 day of January of 1970.
