first place Conservation Theme

First Place Conservation Theme written by Doug Heyman of Carter High School.

The importance of conservation in Texas grows from day to day. This growing importance is because of our dependence on our natural resources. Mother Nature has provided things we depend on to control our neglect, but the question still remains: "Are we using enough?"

Some states have laws to prevent the misuse of our streams and lakes as garbage dumps.

Most farmers use strip cropping to prevent the wind from blowing good topsoil away. Good farmers do this by alternating a strip of peanuts with a strip of some kind of grain. Water can also take away

much of the topsoil. There are only a few inches of topsoil on our land. A steady slow rain will tend to wash the fertile topsoil away. This is called sheet erosion. A very heavy rain will wash out the nutrients and vitamins in the topsoil, causing it to lose a lot of its fertility. We help prevent this by fertilizing our crops and, therefore, returning important elements to the soil.

Soil and water are the most important natural resources concerning our community. Every year we do more to preserve them for future generations. The growing population makes land and water more important daily. Every acre of cultivated land provides food for millions of people. As Texas we must show an interest in the welfare of our state in order to control and replace the resources we use.

T. I. C. Program To Be In Swing This Summer

The Texas Industrial Commission plans to be in operation by this summer with its unique computer program on completion of data storage in cities in every county across the state.

The new computer program, the result of a year's work by the state agency charged with industrial development, will be a boon to communities and industry, offering both all knowledge necessary in plant location and development of industrial programs.

The final leg of the project, begun recently through the cooperative efforts of the Texas Municipal League, Chamber of Commerce and Industrial Development around Texas.

The Eastern Chamber of Commerce has supplied local data for the project. Gov. Preston Smith wrote all chambers of commerce asking their help in securing data needed at the community level. The Texas Municipal League joined the effort with a cover story in the program in its monthly magazine and a letter to each city manager and mayor asking their cooperation and the Texas Chamber of Commerce Managers Association issued a like appeal to its members.

Specialist To Instruct Friday At Pecan School

Friday, April 17, is the date of the Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School. County agent De Gordon said about 150 men, women and students are expected to attend the annual event.

The morning session is scheduled to begin at 9:30 a. m. in the auditorium of Cisco Junior College. This session will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations on budding and grafting.

The event will be sponsored by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Grower's Assn.

Instruction will be given by Dr. J. W. Worthington, Extension Service Horticulturist. Gordon said Dr. Worthington has an excellent set of visual aids to help make his lecture easy to understand. There will be available several new publications on pecan propagation reports the county agent.

After lunch the group will practice budding and grafting at Dr. Bill Cardwell's orchard one mile west of Cisco on the Old Abilene Highway.

Pecan budwood and graftwood of some of the better varieties will be sold by the growers assn. at the school. Budding and grafting supplies will also be sold. There will be no fee for attending the school and everyone interested is encouraged to attend.
