1970 ELECTIONS Gregory, Jones File in March 4 School Vote

The Eastland School Board has called an election to be held April 4. Deadline for filing was set at March 4.

Mike Collins was named election judge and Johnson Smith, absentee judge.

Terms of President J. T. Gregory, place six, and W. M. Jones, place seven, expire this year. Both have filed for reelection.

The Board set a policy regarding the use of narcotics or alcohol by students. School Superintendent Weldell Siebert said, "The use of narcotics and alcohol by students is not a problem in our school at this time. However, new laws suggest that each school have a policy regarding the problem, in the event it should occur."

This policy was unanimously approved by the board of trustees.

"Any student known to have a dangerous drug of narcotic drug or alcoholic beverage in his possession, or known to be under the influence thereof, while in school or participating in a school-sponsored function, after due notice to the violator and after hearing before the Board of Trustees and if found guilty, the student may be expelled for the balance of the semester and no credits be given to the student for the semester. Any student who shall have been convicted of a misdemeanor or felony for the possession, use, or sale of a dangerous drug or narcotic drug while outside the school may be expelled by the Board of Trustees for the current semester, and no credit be given to the student for the semester."

Massive Rattlesnake Den Found On Ranch Northwest of Cisco

One of the largest "hauls" of rattlesnakes here in recent years was made Wednesday afternoon on the Reuben Coats ranch northwest of Cisco, when a bulldozer, lifting an enormous rock, uncovered a den of the reptiles.

The bulldozer backed off, sealing the den with the rock, and Dr. D. Ball, who combined hobbies of photography and herpetology with artistic as well as scientific results, was summoned.

Dr. Ball captured 10 or 12 of the largest snakes with his equipment and the remainder were killed. There were about 35 of the reptiles, Dr. Ball said.

The doctor will keep the snakes for about two weeks, photographing and observing them, and then give them to Forrest Park zoo in Fort Worth, which has one of the finest herpetology departments of any zoo in the nation.

During the time he keeps

the reptiles, they are never fed or watered. "A rattlesnake," said Dr. Ball, "will live for as much as a year without food and water if he is well treated, kept in a cool place and not excited. He will skrink in size and shed skins as he gets progressively smaller. After each shedding his new covering will have a brilliant hue for several days."

Although Forrest Park zoo has more snakes than it can use, it always accepts further gifts of the rattlers and other snakes. "They told me they could always trade them for other animals," said Dr. Ball. The largest catch of rattlers in which he participated was a den of 133 found several years ago on the former Mrs. Yancey McCrea ranch northwest of Cisco, Dr. Ball said.

Practically all rattlers are found north of Cisco, he said. There are very few in the sandy land area south of town. "That is copperhead country," said Dr. Ball.

He has worked quite a lot with that species of snake also.

The mouth and throat membranes of a snake present a serious challenge to the photographer working in color. The pastel shadings are so delicate that an almost perfect technique in exposure and processing is necessary to capture them faithfully on film.

Among the specimens of reptile life taken by Dr. Ball was a comparatively rare La-Conte snake, otherwise known as a "False Coral." The snake which is thinly scattered over a wide area of the United States, is striped like the coral but has no yellow in its coat. Unlike the deadly coral, it is harmless.

14 Clubs, 70 Jaycees Attend Meeting Here

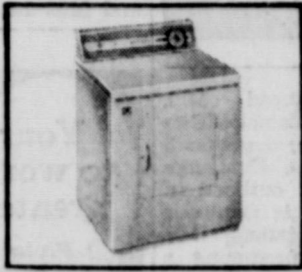

ten basic principles of the Jaycee organization, and was designed for newer members. Pres. Eddie Dyer spoke on

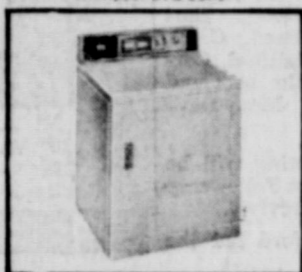
