## It's Ticket-Buying Time Now For 11th Peanut Bowl Classic

Ticket for the 11th Annual Peanut Bowl grid classic are moving fast and fans are being advised to secure theirs early this week.

Final plans are in progress in Eastland Saturday, Sept. 13, for the 11th Annual Peanut Bowl festivities to be held in Eastland Saturday, Sept. 19. The parade list is long and impressive, with the latest entry being newly elected State Representative Joe Hanna of Breckenridge. A complete listing of parade entries will appear in Thursday's edition.



In what's expected to be the greatest meeting ever of the rival Ranger Junior College and Cisco Junior College teams, Maverick Stadium at Eastland will be filled to capacity, sponsoring Eastland Jaycees report.

Reserved seat tickets are on sale at Maverick Barber Shop in Eastland, Dean's Retail Drug Store in Cisco and the Ranger Retail Drug in Ranger, at \$2.50 each. All seating is reserved.

The Wranglers and Rangers are expected to be evenly matched this year for an outstanding football duel.

An added attraction to this year's activities will be a pregame Mass Band show. Approximately 300 members of marching units in the country and surrounding area will perform. Their final number will be a special treatment of "The Star Spangled Banner." Bands slated to take part are Cisco Junior College and the Wrangler Belles, Ranger Junior College, Cisco High School, Eastland High School and Baird High School.

The game which begins at 8 p.m. pits for the 11th time the teams of Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges. Ranger won the first game, played in 1969, and Cisco has taken all the rest.

Halftime ceremonies will include the presentation of Miss Susie Howard, Texas State Peanut Queen. She will be presented a \$500 scholarship by the Texas Peanut Growers Association.

Other halftime activities include performances by the Cisco Junior College band and Wrangler Belles and the presentation of former Peanut Bowl Queens and the present State Peanut Queen's court.

Parade Chairman Herman Alsop has announced State Representative Elect Joe Hanna will be present and will serve as Parade Marshal.

Among the 1970 Queen Princesses will be Martha Thiebaud, Barbara Ritter Carter, Marilyn Hill, Beth Calton, Beth Pearson, and Carolyn Telford.

## Mavericks Maul Indians, 25-13 in Actioned Opener

"Defense" was the name of the game, and for the first quarter, it was a scoreless continuation of November, 1969.

In the second period though it began to break open. The Eastland Maverick defense held, but the Haskell Indians didn't, and the final score for the beginning of another beautiful season for Eastland, read, 25-13 in favor of Coach Shirley Frazier's charge.

Haskell's Franklin brought his lightning, but it struck only twice as the stubborn Mavericks zeroed in on the much-touted back, time and again.

Penalties were abundant (9 for 101 on Eastland and 8 for 95 on Haskell), and fumbles were important keys.

Eastland's first score came late in the second when a Haskell 10-yard penalty set it up on the Haskell 35. Edson Edison grabbed a third down pass at the 17 and Randy Rexroat took a square — out to the five and lunged into the Haskell paydirt for the first score. Two point try failed and the Mavericks led 6-0.

Five plays later Haskell changed that. Franklin broke a tackle and drove 59 yards to the Eastland three before Bob Mace pulled him down.

Two plays later Franklin broke another tackle and squirmed into the end zone from the three yard line. Randy Stone kicked the point after for a 7-6 situation, and that's the way it went into half time.

Early in the third period Philip Smith topped a Haskell Quarterback fumble at the Eastland 29 and the Mavericks put together a sustained drive. Mixing running and passing, Quarterback Craig Lund guided the Mavericks 71 yards on nine plays, only one of which came on third down. That was the last play of the drive as Tailback Ruben Gaeta bullied over from a yard out for the second touchdown. Mace dropped a conversion pass but on Haskell's second play after the return, he made up for it by intercepting an Indian pass and returning it to his own 36.

The teams exchanged fumbles on the next three plays with Eastland taking over on

The closest either team came to scoring was in the 4th quarter when Ranger quarterback Doyle Wells guided the Pups to the Doggies' 13 yard line before a fumble ended the drive. Running backs James Johnson and Cody Bradford made several nice runs during the game in support of Wells' exciting scrambling runs and roll-outs.

John Marshall paced the Eastland attack and had help from tailback Danny Ivory who broke several times for long gainers.

Issue Orocco and Barry Hart spearheaded the Doggies' defense, while Emeterio Vasquez, Cyrus Nash, Quinn Robinson, Mike Wood, and Wells were outstanding defenders for the Pups.

In the 7th grade game Eastland showed a variety of promising running backs in the persons of Ricky Boles, Rex Morgan, Charles Hargus, and Kippie Munoz as the Doggies pinned the Pups 28-12.

Ranger scored first on a 27 yard run by quarterback Larry Beardon, but Eastland tied the game 6-6 on a 30 yard run by Munoz in the first quarter. Then a 53 yard TD pass from Boles to Harvey gave Eastland the lead at halftime 12-6.

1st quarter: Chip Morgan ran 30 yards around right end for six points. Extra failed.

ing lotion, cologne, scented "wash 'n dri's", home permanents, fashion magazines, dry shampoo, lipstick and nail polish.

The USO advises that the United States Postal authorities will not accept packages addressed to "Any Serviceman." However, a gift package may be sent to USO Club Directors at specific APO or FPO addresses. If possible, packages should be gift wrapped and a label attached to each box indicating the contents. This will expedite handling and distribution of gifts through the USO facilities and by air-drop to remote sites.

Donors pay postage from their hometowns to the APO or FPO, and surface mail parcels should be mailed by November 6th to ensure delivery overseas in time for the Holiday season. A complete mailing list of all USO Clubs in the Far East is available at your nearest USO, or the American Legion Post, Phone No. 442-3560.

USO is presently operating 62 facilities overseas, including many clubs in the Pacific area. Last year hundreds of gifts were distributed to servicemen and women in USO clubs, military hospitals, and to isolated units. In addition, monetary contributions from the American people made possible a variety of holiday programs which featured free home-cooked dinners and live entertainment.

USO staff members are already busily planning festivities which will once again help ease the loneliness and desolation of service personnel, many of whom will be away from home for the first time.

This year, share your holiday season with a serviceman overseas by sending a gift package through the USO.

And always remember — "Someone you know needs USO." Mr. Jackson reminds everyone.

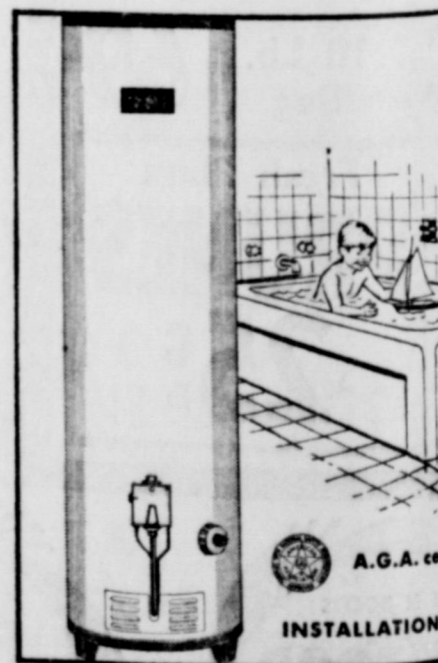

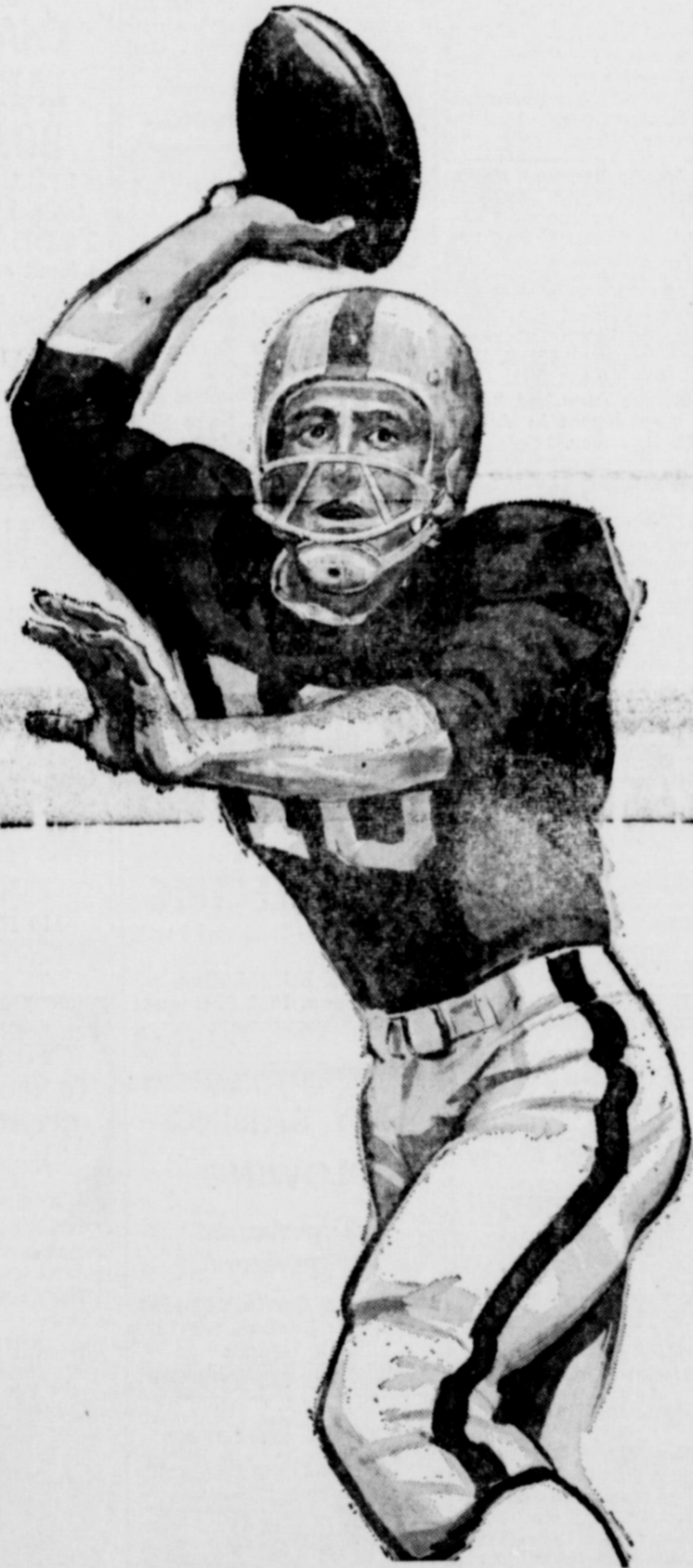

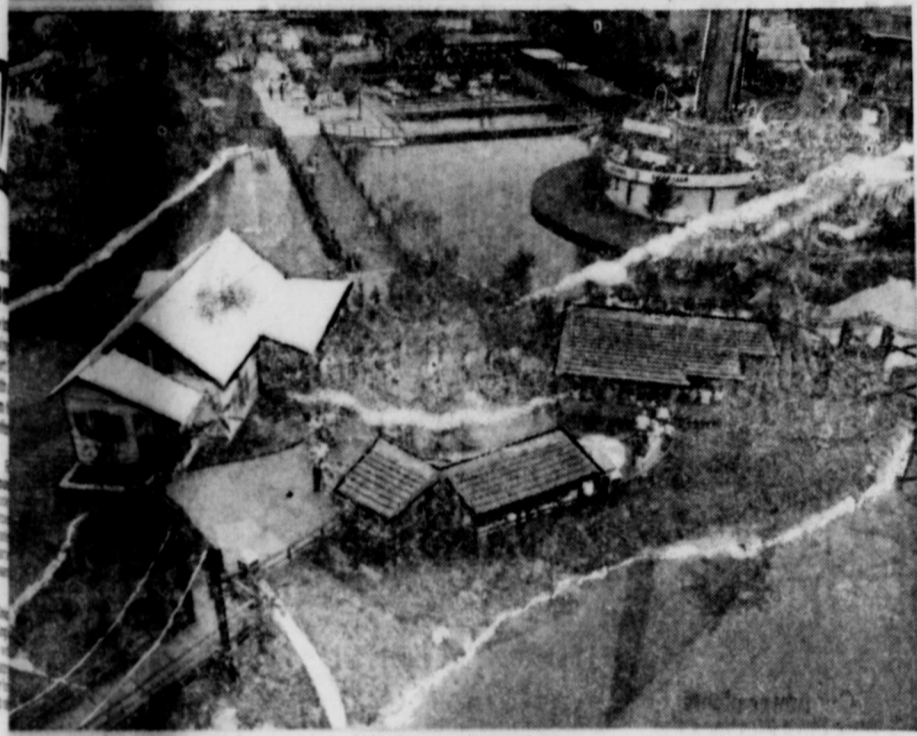

## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO EASTLAND PROPERTY OWNERS

August was an extremely dry and hot month this year, and very conducive to grass fires. And, in this connection, paid city firemen, whose primary job is the protection of City property, were required to be away from the fire station for many hours at a time, fighting grass fires as far as 10 and 15 miles away, where they shouldn't have been.

This unfortunate situation has been brought about by the actions of the City Fire Marshal, since his insistence with the City that he be placed "in charge of paid men and equipment" in the fire department. This situation has been condoned by the City Manager and City Commission since its inception some two years ago. Prior to that time, Volunteer firemen took the rural truck to the scene of rural fires, and paid men stayed at their primary jobs here in Eastland.

As of today, it isn't that way, but it is hoped that this will be changed when the City Commission meets next Monday night, September 21st.

There is no other fire department that I know of, anywhere within the State of Texas, that operates this way. Especially those composed of paid and volunteer members. I respectfully request the honorable City Commission to check with any fire department in these parts, and had they will find that Volunteers drive the rural truck to rural fires, had do it gladly.

The main purpose of the Fire Marshal's requesting, and getting, full authority over men and equipment, was so that he could keep control over the rural truck, even when outside the City Limits, where his jurisdiction ends as Fire Marshal.

On Saturday, August 16, at 4:15 p.m., paid fireman Guy Peel was required to be away from his post from 4:15 to 5:40 p.m. in fighting a grass fire north east of Carbon. Within a few days, the rural truck, with paid men aboard, was out of the City limits on the Matthews place, SE Eastland for several hours, with trucks from Ranger and Cisco present, with the Cisco and Ranger trucks driven, and operated, by Volunteers. Within a few days, the rural truck was dispatched SW of Eastland about 5 miles, with paid firemen Richard Trail driving, and was out of the station for several hours.

More recently, on Sept. 10th, the truck was dispatched to the Tindall place, NE of Olden at 1:30 p.m., with City Fireman Richard Trail driving. This time, the paid fireman was out of the City from 1:30 p.m. until about 10 that night. The Ranger truck was there also, however it was operated by Volunteers.

The following morning, on Sept. 11th, the same fire broke out again, and City Fireman Bud Carmack was required to drive the truck to the scene at 10:55 a.m., not returning until 1:35 p.m.

True, there is an agreement whereby the County pays each fire department within the County the sum of \$50.00 month, for maintenance of their rural trucks. This amount of \$50.00 per month is completely out of the County's pocket, and too small. Some fire departments to the West of here, notably Snyder and Sweetwater, have long ago done away with arrangements of this type, and now charge \$25.00 per call out of the City Limits for the first hour, then \$15.00 per hour thereafter. As you can see, the County here is not getting a bargain.

However, the point is this: City tax payers put up the money to pay salary of the City firemen, and their job is wholly within the City limits, protecting City lives and City property. The Volunteer Fire Department is ready, willing, and able to handle the grass fires out of the City limits, as they formerly did before the Fire Marshal took control of the trucks.

It is hoped that when the Commission meets Monday night, Sept. 21st, this important matter will be on their agenda, and that action will be taken to correct it.
