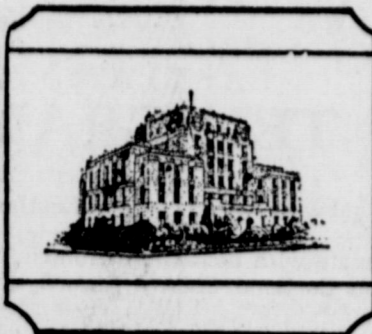

REID, REID ELECTED

The Eastland City Commission now boasts two Reids — no relation — as the result of Tuesday's election.

Incumbent James Reid, mayor pro tem, polled a whopping 331 of 341 votes cast, for re-election. He is vice-president of Eastland National Bank.

Druggist Durel Reid, owner of Eastland Drug, polled 216 votes to defeat incumbent Curtis Koen who got 120 votes.

Holdover commissioners are Mayor Frank Deaton, Jay Stagg and W. Q. Verner.

RE-ELECTED

J. T. Gregory, with 113 votes, and W. M. Jones, with 111 votes, were re-elected to the Eastland School Board election on Saturday, April 4, and L. C. Inzer was re-elected to Eastland County School Board with 111 votes. A total of 123 votes were cast.

Stamey Reviews Programs In Bid For Re-election

O. L. Stamey, candidate for county superintendent of Eastland county subject to the will of the voters in the May 2 democratic primary and the general election next November, this week made the following statement on his candidacy:

"I want to thank the people of Eastland county for the support given the office of county superintendent during my tenure in office.

"We have in addition to the county superintendent, an assistant superintendent with three co-op supervisors and an itinerant librarian with the schools at no cost to the county or the schools of Eastland county.

"I have tried to cooperate in every way with the administrators and teachers to bring about the best schools for the youth of our county.

"During three of the last five years this office sponsored a cooperative program handling the Title-One of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act which brought to the eight schools of Eastland county \$339,007 in federal aid for use in buying equipment, securing remedial teachers, teachers aides and special services.

For the last five years the county school board has maintained a contract with the Department of Labor for "In School" program of the Neighborhood Youth Corps that has helped keep high school pupils in school. This program has brought to the students of Eastland county \$250,000 in wages earned. More important it has been a work training program that fitted these pupils for various office jobs and as a result many of the ones trained during the early stages of the program are now in college preparing for a useful career.

The N.Y.C. Program has been expanded and now we have six counties under sponsorship of the Eastland County Superintendent's office.

"Another service rendered in addition to the routine duties, of the office, has been records for hundreds of people seeking data of their rliest school reports, so necessary at this modern age.

"We invite your questions, interest and aid in keeping this a valuable asset to the people of this area of Texas.

Sen. Creighton Spells It Out During Eastland Reception

One of the toughest campaigns we've ever waged," is the way Sen. Tom Creighton sized up his current race for re-election, for Eastland Counties this week.

At reception after reception in this county he and his wife Sue have been met with many well-wishers and supporters, but he cites his opponent's support by the AFL-CIO as strong opposition. Every vote in Eastland County will help veteran Sen. Creighton, his supporters emphasize.

Sen. Creighton and his mobile campaign headquarters wound up a two-day county swing with a speech for members of the Eastland Lions Club at noon Tuesday. Earlier Tuesday he and Mrs. Creighton were guests of honor at a public reception at the White Elephant Restaurant at-

tended by about 100 people. He also spoke at Eastland High School Tuesday morning. His schedule took him to Breckenridge for a public debate with his opponent on Tuesday evening.

Coming into the county, Monday, he was treated with receptions at Cisco and Ranger Monday, at a barbecue in Desdemona Monday evening, and at Rising Star early Tuesday.

In his Eastland talks, he admitted that he's among the last conservatives in the Senate, and answered charges made by his opponent that he was "against the old folks" and "in favor of a bread tax."

Sen. Creighton explained that he certainly isn't against the old folks, although he did vote against a bill which would, if passed, exempt the over-65s from ad valor-

em tax. The fine print of the bill would also have deprived Eastland County of 25 per cent of its ad valorem tax revenue, (\$42,500) and the City of 34 per cent of its tax revenue or \$25,000.

"And that bread tax could just as easily have been labeled a 'beer tax,' a 'whiskey tax,' or a 'gas tax' but my opponent has chosen to label it a grocery tax," Creighton said.

Yet, I voted for it, he said. I voted for every tax bill except the state income tax bill. I'm against a state income (corporate and/or personal) he said, because an income tax penalizes industrialization. Texas right now has one of the most attractive tax pictures, with a per capita tax load of only a little over \$200. The national average is \$338, and the State of New York has a whopping \$500 per capita tax base.

If we could have broadened the base on the state sales tax, I feel sure that we could have lowered the rate, and still brought in the needed \$270 million needed. We're already committed for that amount and about half of it will go toward teacher pay raises. The state, and the cities, are losing a lot of money on the exemptions from the state sales tax, and if we could have passed an across-the-board sales tax, it not only would have been fair, but also so would have postponed the need for an income tax by at least ten years, he said.

Hitting hard at his opponents support, Sen. Creighton said that he has been singled out as "the man to get" this year, because he's so strongly against the unionization of public employes.

"I'm not aganst organized labor, per se," he explained, "but I don't believe in public employes organizing when they have normal channels of bargaining and settling problems.

Judging from his reception in Eastland County, Sen. Creighton will have strong support here, but expects his opponent to be strong in South Tarrant County.

A veteran of 10 years in the Senate, Sen. Creighton is sixth in seniority. He was introduced at the Lions meeting by Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr.

Brush Control To Be Talked At Cisco Meet

The best recommended methods of brush control will be discussed by Garland O. Hoffman, Texas A&M Extension Service Brush Control Specialist, Monday night, April 13, in Cisco. The meeting will be held in the vocational agriculture class room in Cisco at 7:30 p. m. Hoffman will also discuss the present situation of 2.45-T and research being conducted in the area of brush control.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Cisco Young Farmers in cooperation with Tommy Toland, high school agriculture teacher and De Gordon, county agent.

All land owners interested in the brush problem are en-

couraged to attend. Gordon says Hoffman is the state coordinator for all the brush control work conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A native of Ballinger, Hoffman holds both B.S. and M.S. degrees from Texas A&M with majors in range and forestry management. He is a veteran Air Force pilot of World War II and the Korean conflict and is now a Lt. Col. in the Air Force Reserves.

As a specialist on the Extension Headquarter staff since 1954 Hoffman has written many publications and articles on range management and brush control.

17th County Pecan Bud School Scheduled For April 17 in Cisco

The 17th Annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School is scheduled for Friday, April 17th in Cisco according to an announcement today by DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Agricultural Agent.

The school will be co-sponsored by the Eastland County

Pecan Growers' Assn. and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. The morning session of the school will begin at 9:30 a. m. in the auditorium of Cisco Jr. College. This session will be devoted to discussions, pictures and demonstrations on budding and grafting.

After lunch the afternoon session will be held at Dr. Bill Cardwell's orchard near Cisco. Field demonstrations will be given and everyone will have an opportunity to practice the patch budding and inlay grafting techniques.

Dr. J. W. Worthington, Texas A&M Extension Service Horticulturist, will be the instructor. Pecan producers and county agent will assist with the demonstrations.

Anton White, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers' Assn., said the assn will have bud wood, and graft wood for sale. This will include wood from recommended varieties such as Choctaw, Wichita, Mohawk, Apache, Caddo, and others. The assn. will also sell budding and grafting supplies.

White said this budding and grafting school is one of the largest and oldest of this type in the state. He said over 1,700 men and women from all parts of Central and West Texas have attended the school during the last 16 years and learn-

ed to propagate pecans. Many have attended from surrounding states.

Gordon said there is still a large demand for people who can propagate pecans on a custom basis.

There will be no fee for attending.

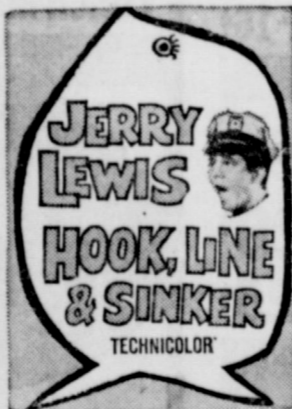
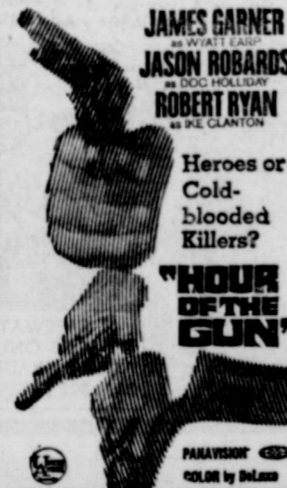

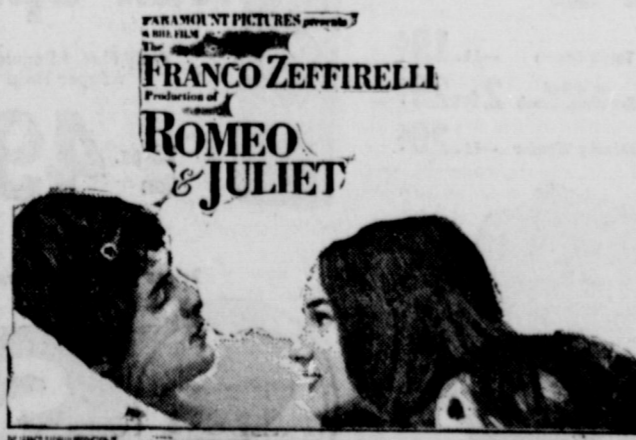
