Translated into the effect these marital margers will have on the nation's economy makes for interesting speculation. With all these new fam ily groups being formed, the demand for goods and materials will continue to grow The U. S. Bureau of the Census has projected a housing

demand at the rate of 1.2 million per year over the next five years.

In addition to this predicted construction, an addition-al 800,000-900,000 units must be built to replace existing housing and to maintain normal vacancy rate. This adds up to a total housing need of two million units per year until 1975.

"The old law of supply and demand is going to be felt in the housing market in the very near future," according to Joe Butler, executive vice president of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas.) "Lumber prices have been down for some time, but as building starts increasing, the price of homes is going to rise." Butler added that labor and land costs have accounted for most of the recent increases in construction costs, but heavier demands for material undoubtedly will add to the overall price of a home Wise buyers should anticipate the coming boom in home building and look for that new home now." he advises
