An Editorial

In our opinion the sacredness of the grand jury system has been violated in Eastland County by petty political littleness.

The grand jury is one of the most important pillars of our society and its business is serious. The men who make up grand juries practically give of their time for unpleasant and thankless, but necessary tasks. They have neither time nor temperament for somebody's minute political quarrels.

Since the violation in question involved advertising, the newspapers got dragged into what turned out to be an embarassing situation for just about everybody,

capable of being embarrassed.

It happened like this: Last Friday, Scott Bailey, county judge candidate, was in the Cisco newspaper office, paying for ads which he had placed in the Ranger paper. He asked if he could see the document, required by law, showing who had paid for another ad which has been running in the Ranger paper. (The ad in question is addressed to Ranger voters and has to do with the recent hospital election.) The candidate was told that the documents are on file

in Eastland and could be seen there during office hours. (The ad is signed 'Pd. Pol. Adv. by friends, and the law requires that records be kept to show who pays for such ads. This newspaper has a record of abiding by the law and this information is available by request.)

No requests were made Monday, but the publisher was called to appear before the grand jury. It is always our policy to cooperate with the courts and law enforcement agencies of every caliber in the interest of justice.

It is no violation of our secrecy oath, which we also getting deserving compliments hold to be sacred, to report that there will around. Jury secretary Tom Hart later referred only to a mysterious "they" who allegedly asked that the grand jury check to see who had paid for the ad. While we strive for accuracy not only in our news columns but also in our advertising columns, we can but point out errors and encourage our advertisers to be accurate in their statements.

The publisher supplied the information, the same information that could have been obtained at our office. The district attorney reported later in the presence the publisher and candidate Bailey that the grand

jury had taken no action on the matter. Certainly any individual or group has the right to request help from a grand jury-provided they can't get help or information elsewhere. And if there is a group interested in the matter of who is paying for political ads, we'd be glad to discuss the matter any-
