Mavericks to Face Lobos Cisco Friday in 8-AA Test 7:30 p.m. Kickoff

Kickoff time will be 7:30 p.m. While the Lobos are seen as less-than-demanding opponents, the Mavericks could be anybody's ballgame due to the rivalry that exists over long standing between the neighboring squads. The statistics point toward another Maverick win, but fans hereabouts know that the final scores are written inside jerseys and not on paper when these two meet. Cisco surprised a building Maverick team two years ago, 16-0, and nothing would please the Lobos crowd more than repeating this year.



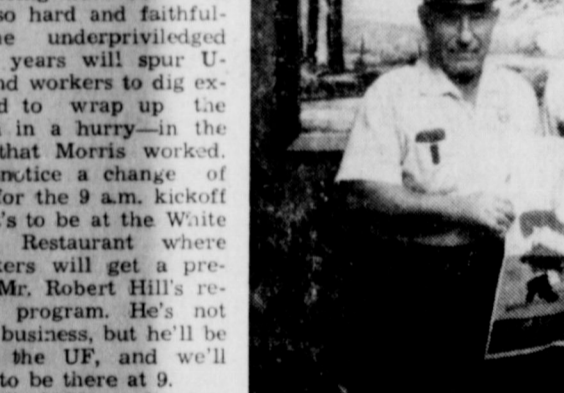
The Mavericks closed out non-district play on a solid note, scraping each of its opponents handily. The Lobos have lost to Ranger, Albany and Breckenridge. Eastland beat Ranger, Albany and Haskell, and wonder where Abilene Reporter News writer Steve Oakley stands when he writes: "Haskell, pressed by the Mavericks to the limit before losing by a deceptive (sic) 25-13 in the season opener."

In other 8-AA action, Ballinger is at Hamilton, Clyde at Winters and Coleman at Comanche. The Lobos will have home field advantage plus the added incentive to be the one to unthroned the Title-Holding Mavericks. Eastland has amassed 110 points while allowing opponents only 26 and Cisco has tallied only 38 to their opponents' 103 — but here again, the games are decided outside the confines of statistical tables.

Fire Prevention Week Signaled by Officials

County Judge Scott Bailey joins with Eastland County Farm Bureau President Jack Cozart and Fire Chief Guy Robinson to proclaim the week of October 4-10 as Rural Fire Prevention Week in Eastland County.

Judge Scott Bailey urged all rural citizens to be especially fire safety minded during this week and every week. "Utmost care should be used in handling all petroleum products," said the Judge. He further stated that "all buildings should be properly protected from lightning and fire hazards should be removed."

Chief Robinson urged all individuals to check their homes for fire hazards. "Many homes fires are caused by faulty wiring, overloaded circuits, circuits overfused or pennies behind fuses and appliances not properly grounded," said the Chief. "Rural fires usually are three to six times as destructive as city fires and are added

because of the time involved in getting to the fire." The chief further stated that "last year home fires killed at least 6,500 people or over half of the 12,100 lives lost."

"The total bill for U. S. fires in 1969 was \$2.4 billion, so be extremely careful not only during Fire Prevention Week but 365 days a year," the chief concluded.

Farm Bureau President Jack Cozart for Eastland County noted that "the Texas Farm Bureau has been active in promoting fire prevention by sponsoring more than 150 graphic fire demonstrations to schools annually, by offering fire extinguishers to members at reduced rates, sponsoring some 100 volunteer firemen to the Firemen's Training School each year, as well as paying a fire department \$75.00 for answering fire calls involving Farm Bureau insured property."

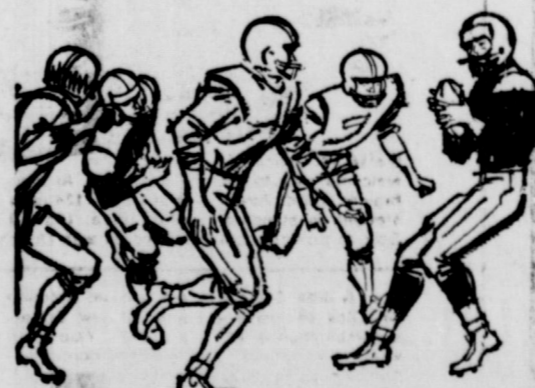

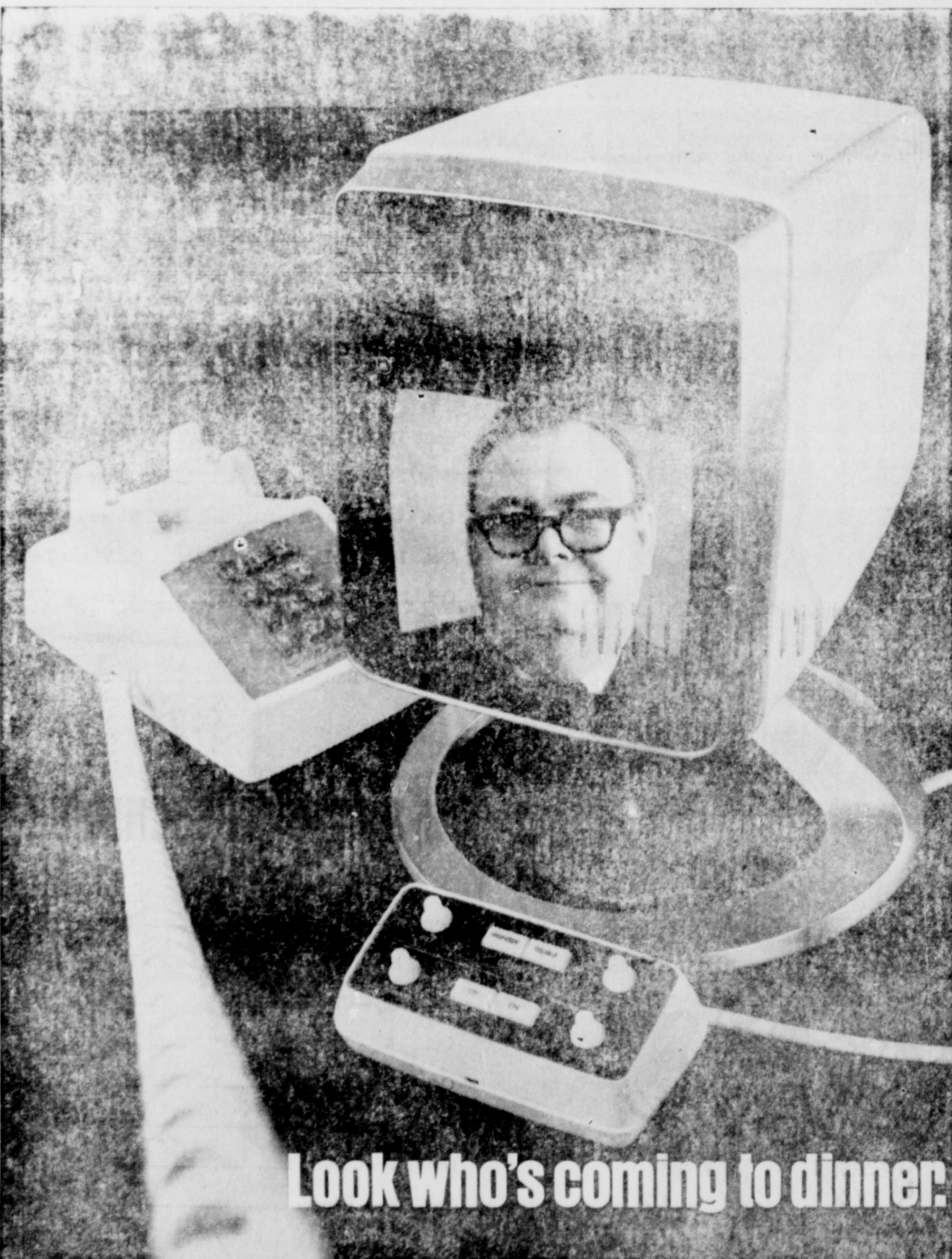

THE GORDON SPOT

It will soon be election time for Soil and Water Conservation District Director in zone 2 of the Palo Pinto District. This zone includes the Northeast corner of Eastland County. It includes all land in Eastland County east of the old Wichita Falls and Southern Railroad right-of-way which runs through Ranger to De-demona. Sam F. Wers of De-demona is the present director. The election will be held in the De-demona school building at 8:00 p.m. on October 14. A program is being planned for the election meeting. All landowners in this zone are urged to attend this election.

Peanut production is probably the largest economic industry in Eastland County. Every person in this county is affected directly or indirectly by this industry. Much of the progress made in peanut farming can be credited to the experiment station in Stephenville. Scientists there developed the Starr variety which is the major peanut variety grown in the Southwest. It was named in honor of the late W. B. Starr of Cisco.

The station was once known as the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, but is now known as the Texas A&M-Tarleton Experiment Station. You will have an opportunity to visit this station and see some of the research work on October 15. This will be one of the most interesting and educational field days you have ever attended. Whether you are a farmer, businessman or house wife make plans to go to Stephenville on October 15.

Peanut harvest is getting under way in Eastland County. If the weather will permit peanut combines will be busy during the next few weeks. A lack of proper equipment adjustment and improper equipment use are the source of large losses to peanut producers in the Southwest each year. These losses are due to excessive split kernels, loose shelled kernels and foreign material. The combined losses due to these deductions amounted to over \$130,000.09 for Eastland County producers alone. There are a number of causes for these losses. Some of the main ones are excessively fast combine field speed, excessive combine cylinder speed, improper combine adjustments, rough handling and walking on loose or bagged peanuts, alternate rain and partial curing in the field, and high air temperature in the field while peanuts are curing. Not much can be done about the last two items but much can be done about the others.

Information supplied by some 25,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will become the basis for the field official crop production estimates for each county and the State. A representative number of farmers and ranchers in Eastland County will be among the 25,000 in Texas receiving the questionnaire from State Statistician Cary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. The questionnaire will be mailed during the last half of October and early November.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers in planning their production and marketing, farm program participation and also for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.
