





PROCLAMATION

BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF EASTLAND COUNTY To All to Whom These Presents Shall Come:

I, Scott Bailey County Judge of Eastland County, hereby declare the week of October 4-10, 1970 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IN Eastland County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, according to the National Fire Protec-tion Association-FIRE'S DAILY TOLL". . . every · . every single day in the U.S. is an average of 33 lives, 1,495 nomes, 196 apartments, 26 schools and college buildings, 10 churches. 22 hospitals and nursing homes, 111 farm buildings, 180 industrial plants, and 219 stores, restaurants, and office buildings."

WHEREAS: fire claimed 12,000 lives and \$2.4 billion in losses last year as a result of ordinary human carelessness — a failure to observe basic safety precautions;

WHEREAS every year about half of America's destructive fires occur in towns under 10,000 population;

WHEREAS we feel that rural America should be specifically included in FIRE PREVENTION WEEK, October 4-10, 1970, we urge all rural citizens of this county to be especially careful in using liquified petroleum products, electrical appliances, as well as oil or gas fired space heating systems; and WHEREAS consideration should be given to pro-

tecting all farm buildings from lightning damage, that all trash is burned in an approved manner, that all heating systems are in proper working order, and that good house-keeping is practiced not only during FIRE PREVENTION WEEK, but 365 days of the year; and

WHFREAS the Eastland County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county have worked together to emphasize fire prevention and protection in the rural areas as well as in cur cities and towns

THEREFORE, I urge all citizens of Eastland County to join hands in recognizing this special period y working together fifty two weeks a year to more fully realize the benefits of FIRE PREVENTION WEEK.

Carlile, whose 1970 crop appears oustanding, said he cultivated the orchard 11 times this year to keep he ground clean, put out some 200 pounds fertilizer per act, and to spray twice. He used a Savin-Zinc-Duter mixture June 4th to control case bear. ers and to treat for rosotte and other diseases. On July 25th, his sparyers used a Se-vin-Sulphur-Zinc mixture for similar prob'

The orche a as planted by Dallas Jobe in the early 1930s and progress in the 160acre orchard has been slow At present, the trees are huge, well trimmed and healthy and the orchard appears ready for peak production. it was pointed out. Hail has domaged the trees several times, but no signs linger.

After a lut the Nimrod Neig Progress. ive Club house, the pecan men returned to the orchard for a demonstration of harves ing and spraying equipment Tree shakers made by Gould, Lockwood and James-Way were on hand. They can handle trees up to 36 inches in diameter and can reach up some four and a half feet.

Harvesting equioment is good investment, Carlile said. You save time, have a minimum of crow loss, and get vour nets at the best time, he said. Harvesing readines cell from \$2 000 to \$12.
