Lawmen Start Drive to Cut Down Bad Checks

A concentrated effort to curtail the worthless and/or forged check traffic in Eastland County is being launched by the County Law Enforcement Association, in cooperation with businessmen in the county.

"Right now there's \$600 to \$800 worth of these checks in the county, and in most cases, the firms who cash them are the losers," District Attorney Emory Walton told the lawmen at their weekly meeting Friday.

In most cases the checks represent government payment to individuals and these are being taken and signatures forged to get money. The checks are from Social Security, Veterans Administration and other federal agencies, it was reported.

The association is beginning a crusade in each town to help the merchants protect themselves from bad checks. A "stop-think" card bearing the ECLE emblem, local telephone numbers and list of ten commandments on check cashing, are being distributed to all firms who will take them and place them at their cash registers. The Association is asking \$2 from each merchant to help defray the cost of printing because the group has no budget for such.

Members took packets of the check cards at the Friday luncheon meeting at the White Elephant Restaurant. President John Morren, Eastland Police Chief, presided and DA Emory Walton was the principal speaker.

Mr. Walton thanked the officers for their constant cooperation and pointed out some areas in which they can help make their cases stand up better.

He warned the lawmen particularly about the need for filing an affidavit along with the "shown-form" complaints, particularly in felony cases, and touched on several points regarding checks that should be followed.

Two-party checks should never be accepted, he said, and cashers should know their endorser or demand adequate identification. Guests included Burl Horton of Abilene, Carl Garrett of Eastland and L. E. Suglett Jr. of Garland.

Sgt. Jerry Mathews was appointed assistant secretary in the absence of Secretary Douglas Fry of Cisco. A committee comprised of Walton, chairman, Lewis Tiner and Patrolman Mabrey were named to study the adoption of a permanent assistant secretary.

Sgt. Mathews reported on the development of membership cards and charter membership in the county-wide enforcement association will end in April.

W. Q. Verner of Eastland was accepted for membership in the group.

Speaker Walton cited the Ten Commandments for check cashing which appears on the cards to be distributed:

- (1) Don't be afraid to ask questions about a check and its passer. Above all, don't let a stranger hurry you.
- (2) Never cash a check that shows any sign of alteration or mutilation.
- (3) Always demand that a check be endorsed in your presence. If it is already endorsed, make the endorser sign again, and then compare the writing.
- (4) Make sure that a check is drawn by an existing concern or individual on an actual bank.
- (5) Be just as wary of certified checks or cashier's checks as of ordinary ones.
- (6) Never cash checks for juveniles. They aren't legally responsible, and they may be runners for a forged ring.
- (7) Never endorse a check for anyone you don't know to be reliable.
- (8) If you are a merchant, beware of any unknown customer who offers you a check for more than the amount of his or her purchase.
- (9) If a bank book is offered as identification, phone the bank named.
- (10) Know your endorser. All I. D. is printed, legitimate or bogus.

City Begins Complete Study Sewerage Plant

The Eastland City Commission set in motion this week a preliminary study of its continuing sewerage plant problems and hopefully will find the right direction for correcting the problem.

In a special called meeting Thursday evening at the City Hall, Commissioners engaged Leon Decker of the Abilene engineering firm of Yates and Decker to begin a preliminary survey to determine the best route for handling the city's sewerage.

Contract for the study is for \$1,500, to be applied to future construction, it was reported. The engineering firm will evaluate the city's needs and make specific recommendation in a report to be made soon. Sites, capacities, both present and anticipated, and other data will be included in the report.

A comprehensive report on the West Central Texas Council of Governments was given members of the Eastland Rotary Club and guests at the regular luncheon meeting on Monday at the White Elephant Restaurant in Eastland.

Executive Director Cecil Mayes was introduced by program chairman Mayor Mayor Frank Deaton. Mr. Mayes explained that COG was founded in 1966 and now comprises 17 counties over 17,000 square miles in Central Texas. It is one of 21 in the state and 500 in the nation. Rate for membership is three cents per capita, and the Council's projects have been "most successful," Mr. Mayes said. The organization is presently winding up a \$90,000 study on water pollution. 

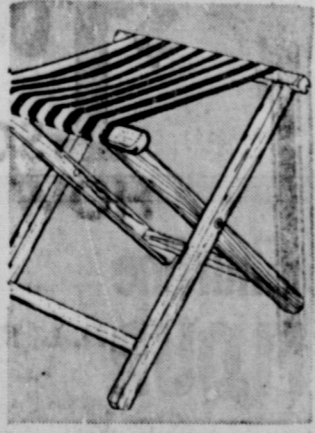

Burleson Cites His Record in Bid for Return to Congress

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic primary on May 2 and the general election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.



Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our district, our state and our nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense" gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every session of the Con-

gress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the executive department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of national defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

For Stronger Nation

"In areas providing for the defense of our country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the federal government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of state and local governments, in accordance with the constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the federal government.

"The federal government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the federal government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The federal government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased." Burleson pointed out "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th district and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

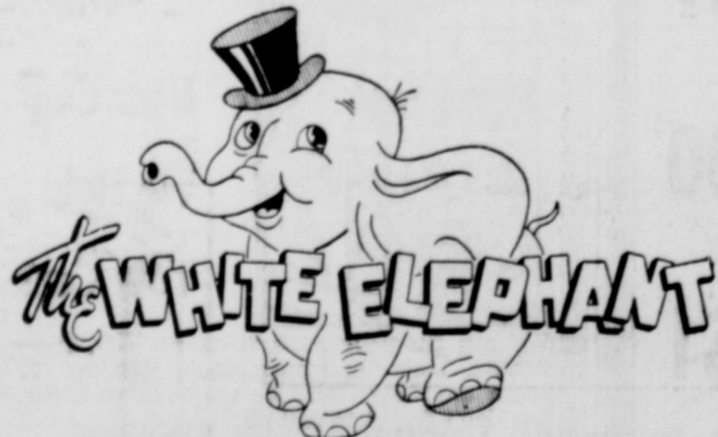

To pay the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association the full amount for expenses incurred in conducting the self-assessment referendum. This amounts to \$8,627.30.

To invite the heads of each farm organization to attend one of our Board Meetings. To consider May 1, 1970 the beginning of the first fiscal year of operation for the

Texas Peanut Producers Board.

To diversify our banking among more than one bank. Banks used are to be determined by the interest rates and the banks' interest in the peanut producers and the peanut program. For the convenience of office personnel in Gorman, the depository bank will be the First National Bank of Gorman, and money will be distributed to other banks from there.
