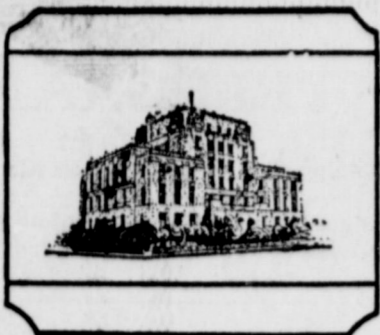

LBJ Appearance At Eastland Political Rally Proves To Be Hoax Rally Termed Success

The Eastland Jaycee political rally in Eastland Saturday has been declared a tremendous success— even though a celebrity who was rumored to be present didn't show up.

Word started spreading throughout Eastland County early Saturday morning that former President Lyndon B. Johnson would be at the Eastland rally to speak in behalf of the candidacy of Governor Preston Smith.

The report has been proved to have been a vicious hoax. Perpetrated by some unknown outside the Jaycee circle.

Rally chairman Richard Rossander received a telegram Saturday morning as follows: Eastland Jaycees

Dear Friends, After learning our republican opposition is to be strongly represented at your rally tomorrow, and still being unable to attend due to prior commitments, have made last minute arrangements for long-time friend and former President Lyndon B. Johnson to appear in my behalf. Best wishes for a successful rally. Signed— Governor Preston Smith.

The telegram was filed at 6:30 p. m. April 17 in Austin and Eastland Jaycee officials have authorized the local Western Union Office to investigate the source of the telegram.

Rossander said Saturday that he had checked with the LBJ ranch headquarters and officials there had no knowledge of Mr. Johnson's appearance in Eastland. The security officers further requested that the copy of the telegram be turned over to local police authorities. Police Chief John Moran has the telegram.

Governor Smith's office was also contacted Saturday by Eastland Jaycees and that office stated that the telegram must be no knowledge of any such arrangements. Word of the former President's visit to Eastland spread fast Saturday morning and news media throughout the area were being alerted. Jaycee President Bob Phillips expressed appreciation to all the candidates and workers who helped make the Saturday event a success. The Jaycees regret any misunderstanding that may have resulted and want to state that the rumor came from outside their official body.

The Teenage Ball Park (Old Fireman's Field) will be completely modernized and improved for maximum use, it has been announced here.

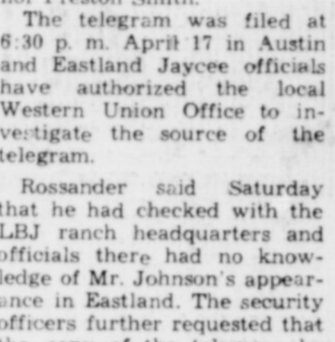
At a meeting Thursday evening at City Hall, plans were finalized for re-vamping the park on North Seaman St. between Main and the T&P Railroad.

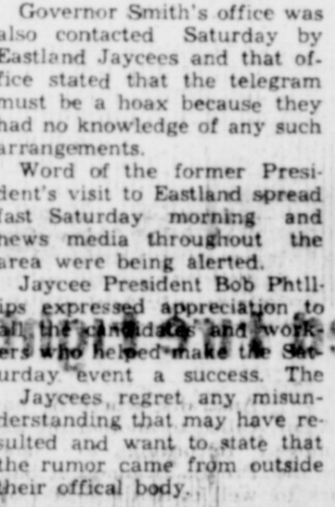
New sound equipment for the public address system is also being purchased. Voluntary labor and equipment has been promised, it was reported.

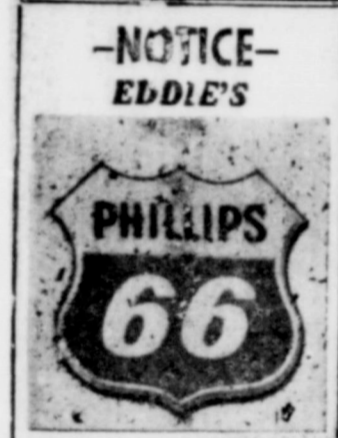

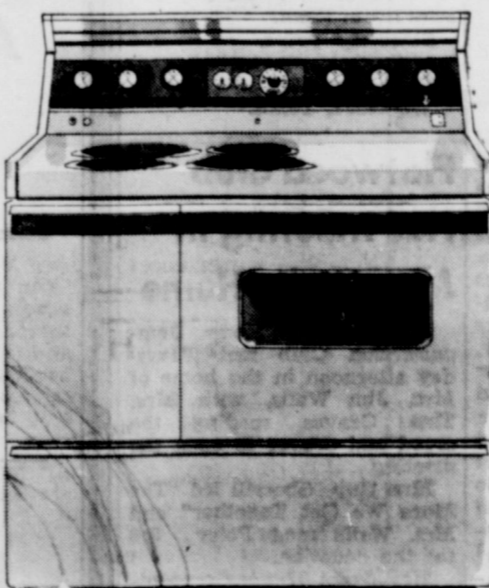

My Dear Mr. O'Brien:

This being a hot election year and as sort of a tribute to my late father and some of his political friends, I would like to tell the voters of Eastland County a true political story that happened many years ago here in Eastland. The story is to be published in your paper.

My Dad was an avid political fan. Some people like football, golf or fishing (however, I never noticed much interest in those things at Eastland until the event of "The 1969 E. H. S. Mavericks". The Lone Cedar Country Club and Lake Leon). And Dad really believed

that the very existence of the county depended on his candidates being elected.

At one time, a friend and neighbor held several positions of public trust one being Judge.

In this race, his opponent was a fiery and well-known lawyer from another county, and at one time, he was a favorite of Dad's, but for some reason, Dad had changed horses.

At that time, money was almost non-existent, times were very difficult, and you could buy a T-bone steak for less than you pay for a hamburger. Dad had one white shirt. The weather, like the political campaign, was hot. My mother would wash Dad's shirt each night and iron it the next morning. But my father never seemed to notice such poverty, because he had a fast horse running in a torrid political race. His horse won and Dad was happy.

Of course, by now, you old timers have guessed that my Dad was Jim Glibreath; the man he was campaigning for was the Hon. Clyde L. Garrett, and Mr. Garrett's opponent, was the Hon. Thomas L. Blanton of Albany, Texas.

Why this story?

Simply because I firmly believe that in Carl Garrett, the people of Eastland County have an opportunity to elect a County Judge that will be very much reminiscent of the late judges: Ed Hill, Clyde Garrett, and John S. Hart.

The combined talents and abilities of these three judges were to the people of Eastland County a great chapter of chapters in the county's history and Carl Garrett grew up in such a heritage as this.

I have known Carl all his life and he was an asset to our country and to his fellow men. He has been a friend to me and my family in so many ways that there is not room to recount them here.

It is then with very much humility, and pride, that I, along with the rest of my family: Jim, Jr. and Beth, do recommend that you elect Carl Garrett as your next County Judge. An in June when we all come in here for our school reunion, and see Carl coming down the street, we then can truly say, "Here comes de judge".

Mrs. Johnson Reports Excellent Aussie Press

(Editor's note: Mrs. Marene Johnson of Eastland has returned from a tour of Australia, where she was the official representative of Rotary Club. This article appeared in the January 15 edition of the Morning Bulletin, Rockhampton, Australia.)

A Texas woman who has been granted the rare — if not unique — privilege of honorary membership of Rotary is at present visiting Rockhampton as part of a three-month tour of Australia.

She is Mrs. Marene Johnson, of the central Texas town of Eastland, who is acting as an ambassador during her travels.

She has already passed on greetings from the Eastland Rotary Club to Rockhampton Rotarians, and will be addressing other Rotary Clubs in various centers she visits.

Before leaving Central Queensland, she will spend a week at the Capricorn Coast as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Evans of Blackwater.

Mrs. Johnson says her main aim in life is to make other people happy, and she has set a definite aim of spreading enthusiasm and energy.

Among other things, she is a member of the National Council of the United States Organization, which provides amenities for United States servicemen throughout the world; a member of the State board of the United Fund; a combined charities organization; and an honorary international member of the Sigma Phi sorority, an organization for young wives and business-women.

She is also a member of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, a radio broadcaster and former journalist, and a noted artist and sculptor.

Mrs. Johnson, who is the widow of an oilman, Mr. Art H. Johnson, has received several honors in recognition of her work.

As well as being an honorary citizen of her town, the George Washington medal, about the equivalent of the OBE, for patriotism.

Until her recent retirement, Mrs. Johnson was postmistress at Eastland for 13 years, and it was during this time that she carried out two major projects which won her special recognition from Rotary.

One was the execution of a spectacular mural made of postage stamps, which is a major tourist drawcard for the town, and the other was the development of an 18ft by 40ft flower garden, an exact replica of the Stars and Stripes which forms the centre for the town's annual Flag Day celebrations.

A focal point of the stamp mural is a United Nations section with stamps bearing the signatures of dignitaries of all countries which were United Nations members at that time.

Mrs. Johnson obtained these in exchange for Rotary commemorative stamps issued by the United States Post Office.

Planning & research for the mural took seven years, and then it took Mrs. Johnson a further 982 hours to fit and glue the stamps in place. The 1827 stamps visible include one of every type every issued in the United States, and several of them are rare and highly valuable.

In the preparation of the mural, Mrs. Johnson washed and counted a total of half a million stamps.

The mural, which at a glance resembles an intricate stained-glass window, is considered invaluable and is situated in the lobby of the Eastland Post Office.

Explaining her unusual hobby, Mrs. Johnson said:

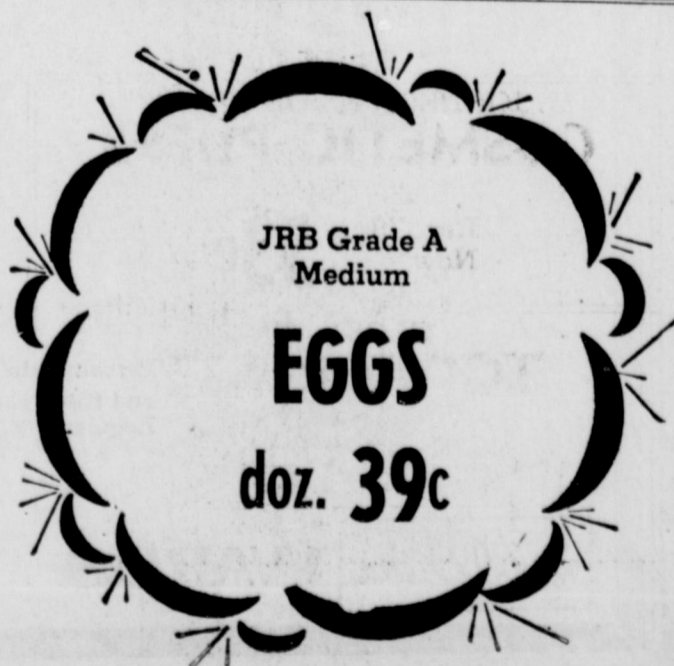

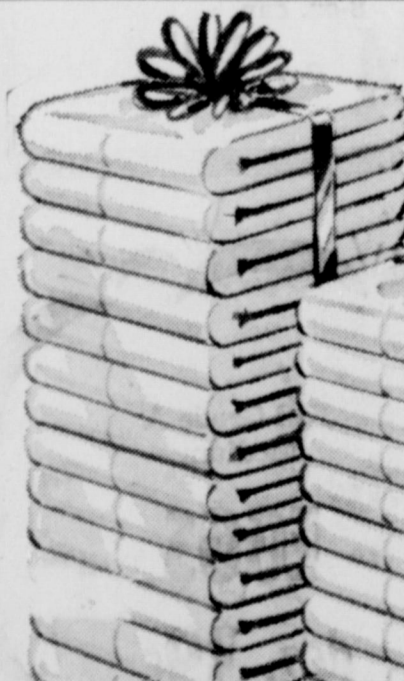

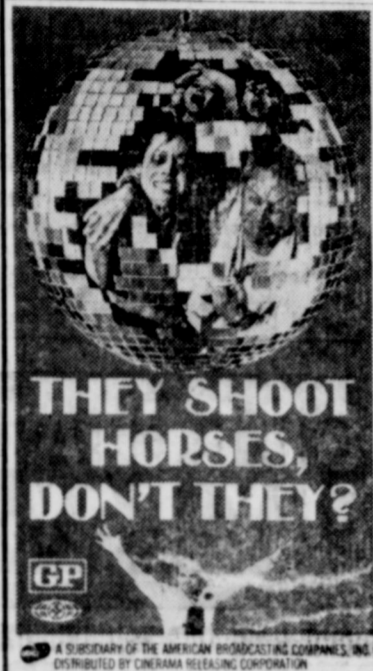

Carbon and Morton Valley are two other communities that are making much progress. Their new water systems provide an excellent opportunity for development and growth in their communities. The leaders deserve a lot of credit for working so hard to improve the conditions of their communities.

What is causing my peach leaves to become red and swollen? This is a question that is being asked by many people this week.

This disease like many other plant diseases must be prevented before the symptoms occur. Peach leaf curl is a fungal disease which attacks the young developing leaves as they emerge from the bud scales. As a result of this infection growth hormones are produced, which induce the leaf to become puckered and distorted.

Ferbam is a fungicide that can be applied in the winter or spring at the pink bud stage for the prevention of this disease. It must be applied prior to the leaves emerging from the buds. Ferbam should be used at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 pounds per 100 gallons of water or 1 1/2 to 2 tablespoons per gallon. If your trees have

this disease, make a note to use this fungicide next spring. Those who use it this year report good control.

If you did not spray for peach leaf curl this year, you could pull off the infected leaves and burn them so that the rate of overwintering inoculum will be reduced.

In most cases only the first leaves are infected and the disease normally does not do any measurable economic damage.

Several meetings are being held in Eastland and surrounding counties to urge farmers to grow Guar. The use of guar products is expanding rapidly and buyers want to get farmers in this area to produce this crop.

This crop grows well on the same type of soils that are good for peanut production. A farmer could expect to make a net income of \$20 to \$40 per acre.

The first of these meetings will be held Thursday night, April 23 at the Eastland County Farm Bureau building.

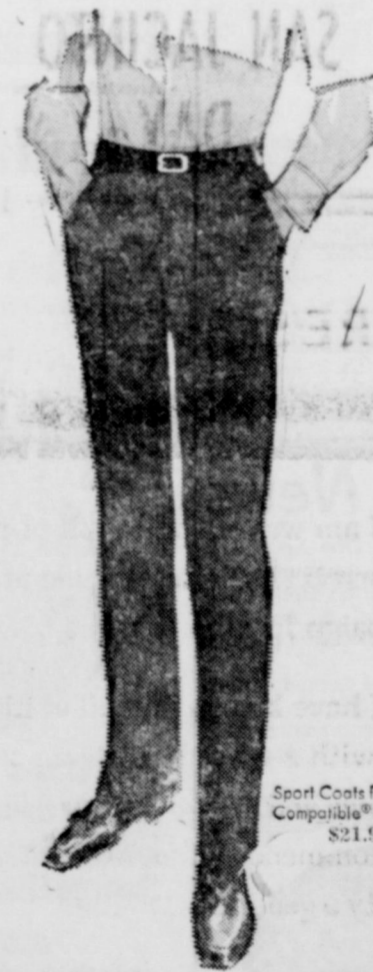
